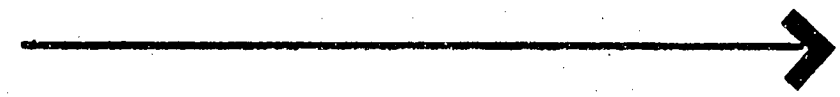

Barkerville News

Barkerville, Monday,
Sept. 9, 1912

C. H. Dunbar, of the Water Department, Victoria, who was scheduled to be in Barkerville on the 30th and 31st ultimo, for the purpose of preparing claims for the holders of water records in this vicinity, owing to an accident to a car did not arrive until the evening of the 30th. He managed, however, to get thro with all of his business here in the one day, returning Sunday as far as Cottonwood.

Caspar Phair, provincial assessor, of Lillooet, paid his annual visit to Barkerville during the fore part of last week. Mr. Phair drove his own conveyance.

W. E. Goepel, inspector of government offices, accompanied by J. K. Moore, general road superintendent, paid a visit to Barkerville during the fore part of last week, for the purpose of auditing the books of the local government office. Both he and Mr. Moore returned south on Friday.

C. F. Boyd, of the government office, drove C. H. Dunbar, of the water department, Victoria, as far as Cottonwood on the 1st of last week, returning to town Tuesday.

The fall sitting of the Co. Court of Cariboo was held on the 5th inst. at Richfield and Barkerville, Judge Calder presiding. The only case on the docket was that of P. Hodnette vs. F. Kibbee, which was adjourned from the Spring sitting, the plaintiff Hodnett suing the defendant Kibbee for \$840 in wages alleged to be due him. The case was first heard at Richfield court house, but was adjourned during the noon hour, and finally finished in the government office, Barkerville. Several witnesses were called on both sides, and after some very conflicting evidence had been given the judge finally decided that the defendant should pay the plaintiff the sum of \$75, without costs. E. J. Avison, of Quesnel, appeared for Mr. Hodnett, and C. H. Dunbar, of Victoria, for Mr. Kibbee.

C. W. Grain, Registrar of the County Court of Cariboo, accompanied by Mrs. Grain, left for Quesnel on a B* car last Friday morning to attend the sitting of the court there, returning home Sunday evening in Blair's auto.

E. S. Peters, of the Assessor's office, returned on Thursday's stage from a couple of weeks' visit with his family in Quesnel.

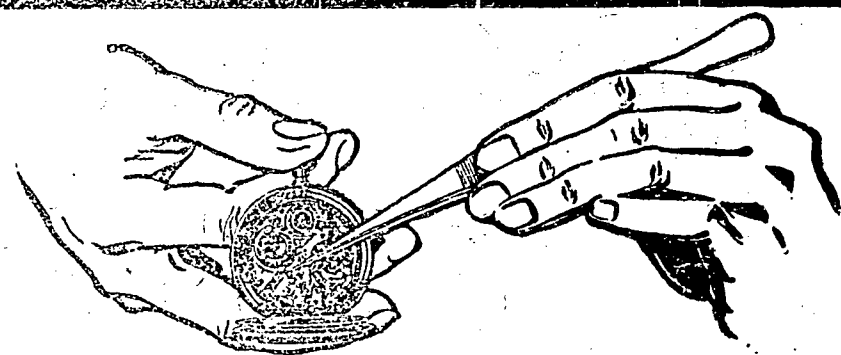
