**Help Prevent
Forest Fires**

Where there is smoke there is fire. An old saying, yet true, much in evidence these days by the many spral smoke clouds dotting the valley. The settlers clearing the debris from land clearing operations. This type of fire, properly managed, is one of the many uses by which fire benefits mankind. During this particular hot spell much burning is being done and we are glad to see this industry displayed, and hope that those who are burning will exercise every care to prevent the escape of their fire. On May 1st our fire laws state that a written permit must be obtained for every clearing fire,—for building camp fires, with instructions as to where they may be set,—that it is illegal to throw away lighted matches or burning tobacco—that it is the duty of every adult person to help in fighting forest fires and to report them by the quickest possible means. Let us all do our best to live up to this law—let us become fire conscious, as this coming season is expected to be a severe one; by the law of average British Columbia is in for a severe season of forest fire fighting. Last year was the lowest for 12 years, and followed two years of exceptionally low fire loss. This fact together with the abnormally hot weather we have experienced lately should exercise more than ordinary care. A moment's carelessness can wipe out in a short time both beauty and wealth. An unextinguished match, a burning cigarette, or a neglected camp fire may start a fire that would make the country unprofitable for industry, destroy beauty, and keep the tourist away from our doors with our playgrounds ruined for years to come. It takes centuries to build a forest, let us do our best to keep them green so that profit and pleasure may be the result.

HIGH SPEED DETOURING

Moore, Indianapolis manufacturer: "To keep from hitting the truck head-on, I had to take the ditch, hitting a ten-inch drain tile, breaking a left rear wheel and blowing out a tire, then made a perfect horseshoe turn on a farm-house lawn and back across the ditch, coming to a stop on the highway right side up, thanks to 'knee-action'." Knee-action front wheels, with their contribution to positive steering control, undoubtedly had a good deal to do with Mr. Moore's luck on his forced detour.

HOME-MADE FROZEN DESSERTS

The widespread interest in Canadian homes, particularly Canadian farm homes, with reference to home-made frozen desserts is responsible for a reprint of a bulletin on this subject issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. It is possible to make frozen desserts with the ordinary utensils to be found in any Canadian kitchen, and with this fact in view numerous recipes are given for ice creams, ices such as water and milk sherbets, puddings, and sauces, together with full directions of procedure. For instance, cream which is twenty-four hours old is more satisfactory for ice cream making than fresh cream. It should, however, be

SANDERS ORE VEINS UP TO EXPECTATIONS

Development of the Saunders veins area of the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mine at Barkerville has been so satisfactory that there is every indication of a richly mineralized zone of considerable size. This is one of the features of a report made by R. R. Rose, which reached the head office yesterday.

This report is apart from that which he is making on the physical characteristics of the whole mine, and while this was expected this week, it will not be to hand for some days yet.

In March, 2,250 feet of crosscutting, raising and drifting was done so that it may be seen underground development is proceeding apace. That the results are so encouraging is highly gratifying.

The Saunders vein area is about 250 feet wide, with the veins interspersed, and it has been drifted on in places to 413 feet in length. The main tunnel which is on the 1,500-foot level, intersects this area, and drifting has been done on vein to both right and left of the tunnel. It is the result of this drifting that Mr. Rose refers to in his report for March. Of a 4-foot vein drifted on to the right of the tunnel, Mr. Rose says he never saw such an encouraging showing of ore. Veins on the right side have been drifted on up to 150 feet.

A 2-foot vein has been drifted on from the bottom of the winze which constitutes the 16th level for a distance of 67 feet. This shows 4 oz. gold.

Details of all the work done will be contained in the report to be made by Mr. Rose, so that shareholders may have a comprehensive idea of what has been accomplished underground.

Production for March was 800 ounces, roundly \$28,000. This was a little less than February for the reason that cyanide tanks were being changed to larger ones.

Altogether, conditions at the mine were never better, and with steady additions to ore possibilities the prospect is good.

Danny Jefferson, 9 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Jefferson, of Big Lake is at present in hospital at Williams Lake. His mother had just finished dressing him, and was called into the next room for a moment; on her return she was horrified to find the child coughing hard and two safety pins which had been lying on the quilt of his crib missing. The pins were closed and linked together. The lad was at once taken to the hospital, and placed under the care of Dr. Shaver. Although the child seems well, it is feared that the contractions of the bowel muscles may cause the pins to open and necessitate a serious operation.

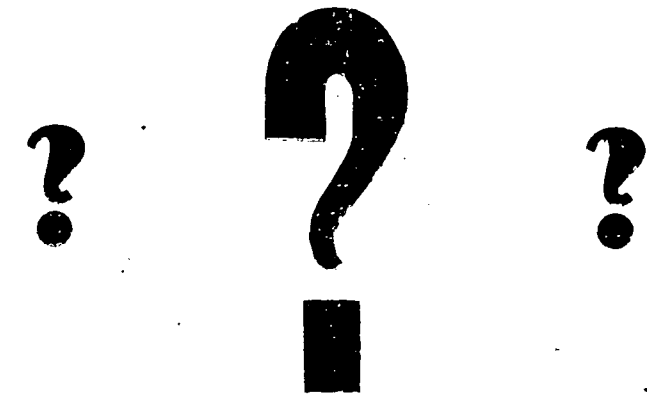
