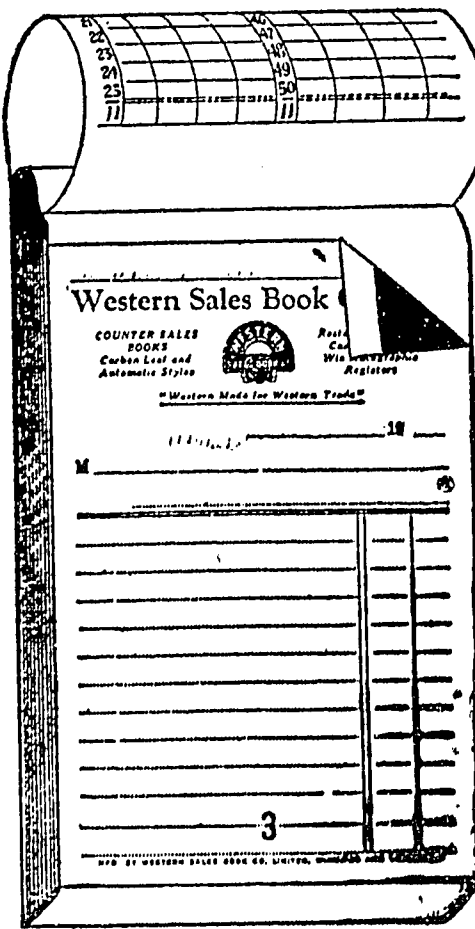

SAFETY FIRST

There are times when good nature

their legs dangling over the side.
In the latter case the danger from
passing another truck too close or
meeting something on a bridge,
with very little room to spare, was
very apparent. A load of happy
youngsters returning from some
jaunt will never sit still very long
and a very little jostling around
might easily send one over the side
altogether. May we therefore sug-
gest that when the kiddies are tak-
en out on a truck, the sides and
back are always added for safety.
It is fairly safe to say that in the
case of an accident the driver would
be held responsible to a certain
extent, if erasonable precautions
were not taken.

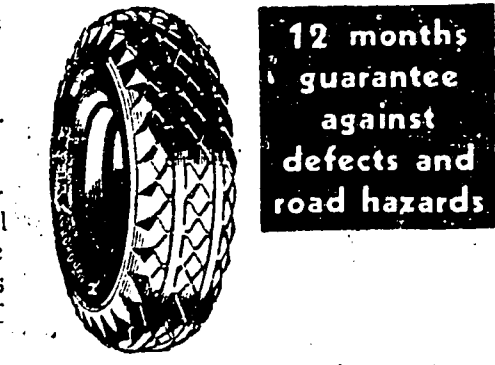

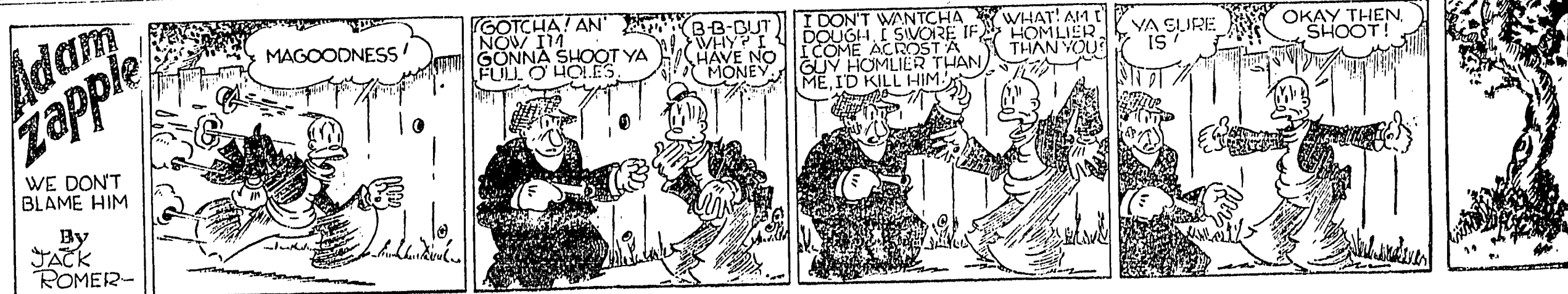

ANOTHER UNWISE TAX

Complaints are being made regarding the system whereby a tax of \$300 is imposed on owners of large tractors used in the mining industry. This tax bonuses bad roads. The mining companies have always been very willing to turn out with these big machines to contribute aid in time of emergency on the public highways. At such times only, do they use the public highways in the Bridge River Country. They claim, and rightly so, that this is an unfair tax.

Owners of the Vidette Mines are said to be considering purchasing a 50-ton diesel. Several other companies in Cariboo, Kamloops and Lillooet electoral districts are in the market for these machines. Could we not encourage development by making it as easy as possible for these people to purchase this kind of machinery and to use it. Such companies are not public carriers in any sense of the word and should not be rated as such. (Bridge River-Lillooet News)
