**Legion Parade on  
Decoration Day**

Owing to pressure on our space last week, we made no mention of the parade on Decoration Day by the Canadian Legion or the service conducted by the Rev. J. Currie Thomson in connection with it.

The Legion paraded at 10:30 a.m., opposite the Cenotaph and under the command of Lieut.-Com. Peers, R.N., marched to the cemetery to conduct the ceremony of decorating the graves of the fallen returned men. Returning to the Cenotaph, there was a brief pause during which the two minutes silence was observed and Last Post played. The Legion then dismissed and proceeded as individuals to the United Church.

This opportunity of paying respect to Rev. J. Currie Thomson was seized by a very large number of Legionnaires in the district and the congregation arrived from all parts to bid farewell and Godspeed to the most popular secretary the Legion has ever had.

For his part, Mr. Thomson preached a most profound sermon which was listened to intently by a packed assembly. At the conclusion of the service, the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers" could have been heard from a considerable distance. As the members of the congregation left the church Mr. Thomson shook hands with everyone and said good bye to those he did not expect to see before leaving us at the end of this month. Currie will be with us for another week or two and we hope to have the chance of showing him our appreciation of his work among us at a later date.

**LOSING COMPETENT ENGINEER**

West Kootenay's loss is Cariboo's gain may well be said on the occasion of the transfer this week of district engineer Wm. Ramsay from Nelson, to become public works engineer at Williams Lake. In fact, Cariboo is doubly fortunate—it secures an engineer of proven ability and a citizen of sterling worth.

No written word is required to convince of Mr. Ramsay's highway building capabilities. Every highway in Creston district has had attention under his supervision during fifteen years, and considering the financial difficulties of the past three or four years no apologies are necessary for valley roads when compared with similar localities elsewhere in the province.

When William Ramsay took charge in West Kootenay this section had travel facilities little better than wagon roads. In the transformation that has been worked the valley has received pretty near the maximum of efficiency at about the minimum cost. And at a time when graft in highway matters was much heard of, no charge of misuse of public funds was ever heard against the departing engineer.

And the efficiency shown in his work was equally emphasized in his dealings with employees and the public generally. He was a good listener, careful as to his promises, and a great believer in what's worth doing is worth doing well.

After his successful experience in making highways out of wagon roads and trails in the Kootenays, Mr. Ramsay should render even better service to the department in his new district. And here's hoping that the term "Ramsay Road" will be heard in Cariboo with the same sincerity in its utterance as applies here when a local autoist travels the many and varied betterments effected during the reign of Ramsay, from Goatfell to Kuskanook, and on around Kootenay Lake. —Creston Review.

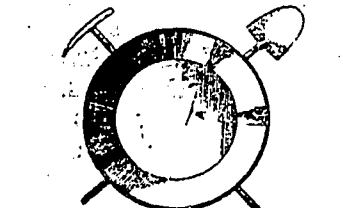
**SPRINGTIME**

**MINING NOTES**

Vancouver, B.C.—Ira B. Joralemon, well known geologist and mining engineer, returned this week from a trip of investigation and inspection at the Cariboo Gold Quartz mine near Barkerville.

Mr. Joralemon expressed himself as being well pleased with progress being made and his principal recommendation to the Board of Directors is to "put the mine on a paying basis at once."

This recommendation came as somewhat of a shock to the group of shareholders in Vancouver who had harbored the impression that this was just what the management had been trying to do since the mill was first turned over more than a year ago. While the full text of the Joralemon report has not been made public or handed on to the shareholders, President Burnett in a carefully worded statement tentatively promised that possibly it would be given out at the time of the annual meeting of the shareholders on May 30th.

Barkerville.—The Newmont Mining Corporation is a busy portion of Island Mountain these days. In addition to rushing the development work on the mine, the management has a big crew busy on the installation of the new 60 ton ball mill that is being set up. The corps of mining engineers have worked out a cyanide method of treatment for the concentrates that they believe will result in an exceptionally close saving of values and hope to be in production in the very near future.

Vancouver.—Since spring has opened up and freight has started into the Cariboo District over the Cariboo Highway, there has developed considerable criticism among the truckers on account of the high and varied taxes imposed on freighters over this highway. One freighter announced that if taxes were reduced and the freight trucking taxed in proportion to what is paid in like industries, he would be able to land freight at a profit from Vancouver to the mines at Barkerville at a lesser cost than the railroad charges from Vancouver to Quesnel. He cited the following as an example of the taxes imposed on freighters. Seven cents per gallon on gasoline, a truck license of \$65.00 a driver's license of \$4.50, and a toll tax of \$2.00 per ton total weight including weight of truck. These charges of course must be added to the freight rate and are paid in

the end by the mining operator in the Cariboo. A movement is under way now to lighten the tax burden on freighters in as much as it all amounts practically to a direct tax on the cost of development of mines.

**BUS OUSTS REINDEER**

From Lapland comes the latest trade-in story. Up in that semi-Arctic country, where roads are practically non-existent, horses cannot be used in the deep snow, and the favorite form of transport service is by reindeer and pulk, the latter being an amphibian sled found nowhere else in the world. Last year they built a road from Karasjok to the Arctic coast, and many reindeer and pulk owners in Karasjok bought cars, trucks or buses. One reindeer driver bought a bus which was the first General Motors product to be seen in the town. To the dealer it seemed fitting that the discarded outfit of the new bus owner be absorbed in the deal, and that explains why the General Motors Export Museum at New York is clearing a conspicuous place to receive one genuine reindeer and pulk from Santa Claus land.

## LOCAL BALL TEAM WINS 1, LOSES 1

Quesnel dropped the first game 10-5 to Williams Lake last Sunday, but came back with a last inning rally to win from the Cariboo Gold Quartz team 8-7 in the night cap. "Doc" English got smart support in the game he pitched for the Lake. The Quesnel boys hit him hard but he always worked himself out of any tight corner he was caught in. On the other hand Howard Harnden twirled good ball but could not get the necessary support from the local boys to pull out on top. Williams Lake took an early lead and held it throughout. The Gold Quartz brought down enough players to make two full teams. They are smart ball players and were, on their showing, the best of the three teams playing Sunday. In Walters they have one of the smartest backstops that have ever been seen in this part of the country. Ross, who pitched for the miners is a steady twirler with a good change of pace. Kimberly who plays first and manages the team is a well known B. C. baseball star. He was one of the best twirlers ever to have performed in the last Vancouver senior league.

Quesnel played really smart ball behind heady pitching by "Chubby" Taft to win the game in the last of the sixth. With the score 6-7 a close call found Len Sherman and Taft on the bags and Howard Harnden at bat. Howard's hit brought home the two runners to put Quesnel in the lead for the first time 8-7. Harnden went into the box for the last inning and turned back the miners to win the game.

Taft at short for Quesnel and Moore for the Lake made some remarkable catches in the first game. Forster with three hits out of six times charged a bat and Mac McGuire with five hits out of eight turns were the chief hitters in the two games. The Quesnel lineup was as follows:

header and the second against Barkerville. On the seventeenth the boys will be in Prince George to meet the northerners. On the 24th the boys journey to the Lake to meet the cowboys on their home grounds in another swatfest.

Uniforms will be on hand before the Dominion Day meet. They are white with blue stripes and red lettering. They will be kept with the outfits and issued before every game to be on hand for years to come if this policy is followed.

Anyone wishing to play ball is invited to turn out Tuesdays and Thursdays. The boys want the best team possible for the town and all those on the team at the present time are turning out every night. There are still some weaknesses in the lineup and if any reader feels they can play better ball than some present member of the team come out to practise, Quesnel needs you.
