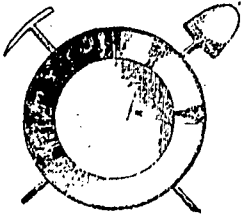

MINING NOTES

"GINGER" COOTE FLIES TENTION MILL INTO TASEKO

"Ginger" Coote, well-known pilot for the Bridge River Cariboo Airways, has just completed the flying in of a ten-ton pilot mill that will soon be grinding on the ore of the Taylor-Windfall property in the Vintewar section of British Columbia. During the past week he has transported some 16,000 pounds of supplies and equipment as far as Taseko Lake. The average flying time from Seton Lake to Taseko Lake is ninety minutes. Pilot Coote finds that the best time to work is from four a.m. until about ten a.m. and on account of the better air conditions has been doing his freight during these early morning hours. So far he has had no difficulty in keeping the crew of miners supplied with all of the necessities as well as looking after the transportation of freight and passengers.

PLACER PROPERTIES TAKEN OVER

The placer boom that is now on all over the Upper Fraser River section of this district is proving a boon to prospectors in as much as they have no difficulty in disposing of their locations cash if they do not see fit to work them themselves. There is a ready market for placer ground of known values and during the past week several deals have been made for properties that have been operated by their original stakers since early spring.
C. W. Moore, well-known miner, has recently taken over the holdings of Frank Norn and his two sons on the lower Cottonwood River between Quesnel and Prince George, and William McClement and associates of Cloverdale have taken over the holdings of Valudus and Glass, a small hydraulic property near here. The new owners plan on installing additional equipment and working the property on a larger scale.

BIG DREDGE ON WAY

The first big dredge to start recovering gold from the Fraser River is now on its way to the scene of future activity. This week it was towed from Vancouver, where it was manufactured, to New Westminster at the mouth of the Fraser. The two big tugs having the dredge in tow will go up the Fraser as far as possible and then turn the job over to smaller craft to complete the trip.
J. Hume Robertson, Engineer in charge, stated that with the new equipment he will be able to handle ten thousand yards of gravel per day, and owing to the most favorable weather conditions will be able to operate every day in the year. He plans on dredging a strip of ground roughly one half mile in length and a quarter of a mile in width to a depth of thirty feet. Values ranging from 40 cents to several dollars per yard were indicated in the preliminary prospecting. Work will be started at once on the power plant at the mouth of Jones Creek and it is planned on having this completed within the next ninety days.

PROSPECTORS FIND HIGH GRADE ORE IN HORSEFLY

Considerable interest has developed in the upper Horsefly section of Cariboo district, in the neighborhood of Elbow lake, and Ross mountain. Gus Haynes and Charles Gotcheen struck a very good vein of quartz and after working down into it with some powder, they found gold all through the rock. They pounded up some of the ore and to their surprise got 6 ounces gold. About 50 claims have been recorded. The property has been inspected by several miners who testify to the discovery.
It would appear that Douglas Lay's surmise, when resident engineer, was correct, for it is apparent at Antoine creek that the old Ward channel has been found, as the gravel is the same and the gold is getting very heavy.
Allen McDonald, field man for Britannia, was inspecting properties in the Keith'ey area.

POWELL RIVER SYNDICATE TO MINE IN CARIBOO

Preliminary development of mining prospects by syndicates is much in order, and a large number of syndicates have been organized in recent months. This has become the favorite method of getting started, and eliminated much of the initial expense attending the incorporation of companies. Syndicates have been formed in all parts of the province and the neighboring states to work in British Columbia.
One of the latest is in Powell River, where large newsprint paper mills operate, with capitalization of \$100,000 to develop 35 claims in the Sugar creek area of Cariboo district. Myron C. McLeod is chairman of the syndicate; B. M. McIntyre secretary and trustee; D. K. Macken, trustee.

For the first time in the mining history in British Columbia, a complete ball mill has been flown in from the head of rail transportation to the scene of operations by plane.

By the discovery of the late Sir Ronald Ross of the relationship between the mosquito and the spread of malaria, eventuating in a similar discovery regarding yellow fever, not only saved millions of lives but established millions of acres of potentially fertile land in tropical and subtropical areas of the world to be placed under economic crops. 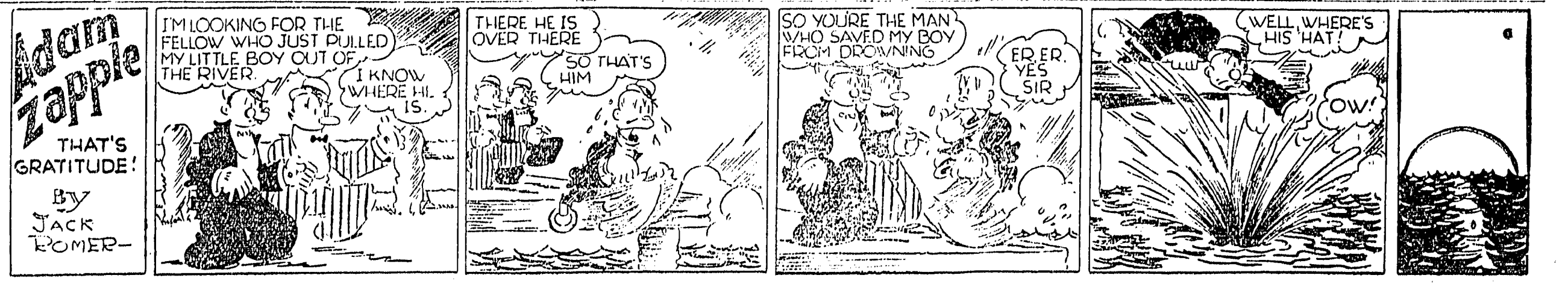

MANY MINERS SEARCHING CARIBOO RIVERS FOR GOLD

(Western Canada Mining News)

Carson McGuire, of Quesnel, who is a visitor to Vancouver, reports marked activity in placer operations in the Cariboo this summer and states that for the meantime unemployment is a thing of the past. The bars on the Fraser and Quesnel rivers are lined with operators, mostly equipped with engines and pumps, and they are recovering from \$6 to \$12 per day per man as a minimum.

Up country on the Cottonwood, Lightning creek, Willow river and Williams creek, and their tributaries many successful pining jobs are under way, and it's anticipated that the gross production from placer operations in the Cariboo will be greater for 1934 than for a great many years.

Herman Neilson, who has been working a good bar on the Fraser near Macalister with Ray Williams, has gone back to the States. Before leaving he disposed of his ranch property to Jim Williams.

E. D. Woodburn has on display in his office some peculiar rock formations recently dug up by some prospectors. There are four of them, and according to Mr. Woodburn they were all recovered close to one another. Two are shaped like fish, one like a clam and another like a bird. There is much conjecture by those who have seen them as to whether they are fossils or just freak formations caused by water action. It would be interesting to have them sent to the B. C. Museum and have expert opinion on them.
