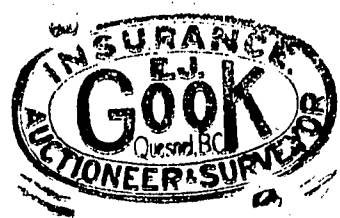

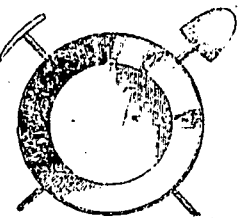

MINING NOTES

GOLD QUARTZ STEPS UP PRODUCTION

It is currently reported that production is being stepped up at the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mine on Jack of Clubs Lake, and that the management has at last started milling stopping instead of development ore. According to rumor, the July output of the company will practically double the best previous month's recovery.

DREDGING OF FRASER RIVER TO GO AHEAD

Preparations to dredge the bed of the Fraser River for placer gold are going ahead, and while there is little doubt among mining men as to the values claimed by the various dredging companies, the question is being raised as to whether or not it will be possible to make recovery of these values with a suction type of dredge.

One well known expert stated this week that to the best of his knowledge and belief, a suction type of dredge had never so far been successful in recovering placer gold in paying quantities, owing to the fact that boulders are invariably encountered in the beds of streams or rivers containing placer gold. Owing to the action of a suction type of dredge of the bed of a stream, these boulders will "nest" at the intake of the suction pipe and "pyramid" until it is impossible to raise them. The same conditions obtain in operating an hydraulic elevator, but in the latter instance, the work is above ground and the boulders can be handled, while as he points out in dredging below the surface of the river it will be impossible to scatter them. He also contends that it will be impossible to recover any major portion of the gold save on bedrock and states that from drill tests he has personally made, the bedrock of the Fraser is too deep to lend itself to dredging operations of a profitable nature.

In the meantime, however, the efforts of the latest recruits to the army of gold seekers in British Columbia are being watched with a great deal of interest.

LOST CHANNEL BELIEVED TO BE FOUND AT KEITHLEY

Carson McGuire, who with partners has been looking for the lost channel on Keithley Creek, reports that their development has finally uncovered the rim of an ancient channel above the falls on Keithley and that they feel confident that they will soon have the pay. In the past this was one of the best "pay" creeks in the Cariboo. Literally millions of dollars in placer gold was extracted from its gravels in the past, but the pay was lost at a certain point. Miners drifting on bedrock encountered a solid wall of rock that could not be passed and after numerous side drifts which met with the same obstacle, abandoned the ground. Up to that time the creek had been producing 28 ounces of gold to the set—phenomenal pay. Acting on the theory that when the gold was laid down, there had been a waterfall at the cut-off point, McGuire and associates started prospecting, and believe they have proved their theory.

Here and There

S. S. Empress of Japan arrived at Victoria recently with one of the largest passenger lists in the past three years. There was a total of 577 from the Orient and Honolulu. The liner was also heavily booked for the westbound trip from Vancouver and Victoria.

Speaking at Toronto recently before members of the International Building Owners and Managers Association, E. W. Beatty, K.C., chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, doubted the wisdom of "too elaborate planning" in national economies. Mr. Beatty did not think the present system of society was wrong except in the "way in which it is applied."

The Canadian Pacific Railway will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the completion of its transcontinental line next year. It was November 7, 1885 that Donald A. Smith, later Lord Strathcona, drove the last spike at Craigellachie joining east to west and Atlantic to Pacific.

Hon. Charles A. Dunning, vice-president and general manager of the Seignior Club, Montebello, Quebec, has been elected a director of Barclay's Bank, Canada. The former Federal Minister of Finance is also president of the Ontario Equitable Life Insurance Company.

After one of the most remarkable and successful meetings ever held by a religious body, the Oxford Group left the Banff Springs Hotel for the East. Many of them sailed from Quebec by S.S. Empress of Australia for England. The next house party will be held at Oxford July 1-14.

Speaking at the Admiral Beatty Hotel, Saint John, Sir William Clark, British High Commissioner to Canada, claimed that the real source of Canada's troubles in connection with marketing agricultural produce lay in the un-economic expansion of agricultural production by industrial countries, especially some of the larger European countries which are normally importers.

Music, moonlight, glorious lake breezes with 600 miles of sailing on the Canadian Pacific's Great Lakes ships Assiniboine, Keewatin and Manitoba are at the disposal of passengers on the company's lines this summer at low cost. The offer promises to be very alluring to Canadians and visitors to the Dominion as well.

Quebec Province is alive with fetes, celebrations and gala events this year marking the anniversaries of some of the most memorable events in its history. Among them and the most important is the 400th anniversary of the discovery of Canada by Jacques Cartier in July 1534.

A Mediterranean-African-South America cruise in the 22,000-ton liner Empress of Australia, visiting 21 ports in the Mediterranean, Palestine, Egypt, East and South Africa, South America and the West Indies will be operated next winter. It is announced by the Canadian Pacific. The cruise will take 96 days, leaving New York January 18, 1935 and returning there April 24.

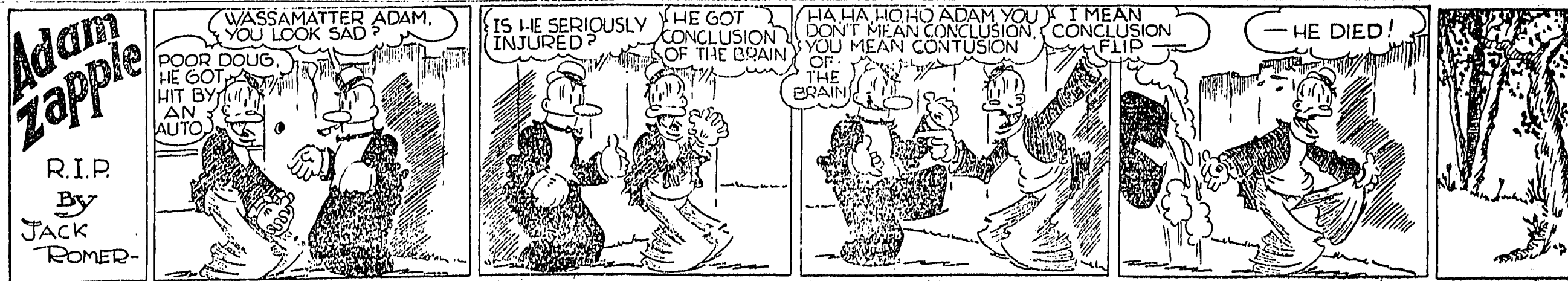
