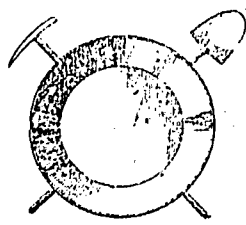

MINING NOTES

**RICH STRIKE OF QUARTZ
ON PROSERPINE**

It was reported here last week
that a rich strike of quartz con-
taining free gold has been made
on the Proserpine Syndicate hold-
ings on Proserpine Mountain. The
new ore was encountered in the
Warspite tunnel and while of course
gratifying to the management was
not unexpected. Development at
depth is going ahead rapidly and
while it is a bit early to look for-
ward to the installation of milling
equipment at this time, it is pos-
sible that a pilot mill will be in-
stalled during the coming fall and
winter if present favorable indica-
tions continue.

**CORONADA EXTENSION CUTS
COMMERCIAL ORE**

The report is current in Barker-
ville today that the Coronado Ex-
tension has cut commercial ore in
their development tunnel that is
being run on the east side of Wil-
low River opposite the mouth of
Mosquito Creek. Mining men are
interested locally, and take this
news as particularly interesting in
as much as it extends the gold
belt of the Cariboo a distance of
three miles to the northwest, and
proves that the existence of gold-
bearing ore is more extensive than
has hitherto been admitted by some
mining engineers and geologists.
The location of "pay ore" at the
mouth of Mosquito Creek promises
to be one of the important discov-
eries of the year, and the develop-
ment of this property will be watch-
ed with a great deal of interest.

**MORE MEN TO WORK ON
CARIBOO KING**

Encouraging reports are coming
in from the Cariboo King property
located on the south end of Jack
of Clubs Lake. Working with a small
crew, superintendent McGowan has
been driving ahead since last win-
ter and at the present time is
just approaching his objective.
Samples of ore shown in Barkerville
from the face of the development
tunnel are of the same type and
general character of ore that have
been developed on the Cariboo
Gold Quartz, the Newmont and the
Proserpine properties. The manage-
ment is inclined to be reticent
as to their recent findings, but the
samples shown are very encourag-
ing and the fact that they are put-
ting on more men is considered sig-
nificant locally.

**HIXON CREEK CARIBOO WILL
OPERATE IN AUGUST**

Fume construction by the Hixon
Creek Cariboo Company is proceed-
ing at the rate of 250 feet a day and
should be complete by November
according to Rupert W. Hagen,
who is in charge of the work. The
work, he states, will be sufficiently
advanced for the company to be-
gin washing for gold about August
15th. The company has taken over
the leasehold properties of the
Brian Briscoe syndicate of Prince
George.

**BULLION MINE TAKEN OVER
BY MOND INTERESTS**

The fact that English capital is
definitely moving into the British
Columbia mining industry was de-
monstrated this week when the
fact became known that the Mond
interests of England had taken
over the well-known Bullion Hy-
draulic Mine in the Cariboo District.
The Bullion Hydraulic property is
located on the south fork of the
Quesnel River near Hydraulic.

The property has been developed
very extensively and in the past
large sums of money have been
spent in developing to the point of
production. Owing to a lack of
dumping ground it was necessary
to drive a long tunnel through
which to pipe off the tailings, and
just as this was practically com-
pleted it was blocked by a slide.
This has been since removed and
with the placing of orders for the
latest in hydraulic mining equip-
ment, the big property should be
put into production in the imme-
diate future.

Along the same lines it is re-

ported that the big Lightning Creek
placer proposition, Consolidated
Gold Alluvials, has been taken over
by English interests said to be the
Carreras Tobacco Company. It has
long been a known fact that this
outfit has been financially inter-
ested in the property, and the news
that they have taken over entirely
is not unexpected. A crew of ap-
proximately one hundred men are
working on the Consolidated Gold
Alluvials property and the man-
agement hopes to be in production
this summer.

**BARKERVILLE ACTIVITY
SUSTAINED**

An exchange from Seattle, Wash.,
states: "Everything points to a
period of sustained mining activity
in the Barkerville area, and al-
though it has been overshadowed
of late by the Bridge River boom,
appearances are that its great min-
eral potentialities will bring it for-
ward."

**NEW RIDING TAKES IN PEACE
RIVER COUNTRY AND PART
OF OLD CARIBOO**

Bridge River and Lillooet find
themselves in the new Cariboo Rid-
ing (Federal) as a result of the re-
cent redistribution announced at
Ottawa.

The Cariboo Riding embraces the
following huge area: Northern
Boundary, 60th par. lat.; Western
Boundary, from head waters of
Bute Inlet along the 125th par. to
60th; South Boundary, from Mount
Albani to Mount Selkirk, which line
passes below Owl Creek, through
Lillooet Lake; Eastern Boundary,
from 60th along 120th, taking in
Mount Robson and Tete Juan
Cache.

Cariboo now includes the Peace
River Block and north beyond Ft.
Nelson almost to Liard River; the
entire Grand Trunk Pacific coun-
try from Tete Juan Cache to Takla
Lake. Prince George is the largest
town in Cariboo Riding.

Bridge River, Lillooet, and all
parts of the Lillooet Provincial
Riding, east of Birken and north
of a line running east and west
through Owl Creek will vote in the
Cariboo. Ashcroft and Spences
Bridge will be in Kamloops for Do-
minion voting purposes.

A four-day hike among the
flowering Alpine meadows below
glaciers of the Yoho Valley, Aug-
ust 3rd to 6th, is the 1934 objective
of the youngest outdoor society in
the Canadian Rockies. This infant,
less than a year old, was born last
summer of the enthusiasm of 50
hikers who named themselves the
Sky Line Trail Hikers of the Can-
adian Rockies.

For the past seven weeks, the amount
of United States wheat in
Canada has been shown as two
bushels. On July 6th last year the
amount was 3,950,798 bushels.

The export of Canadian cattle to
Great Britain for this year up to
July 12th totalled 26,115 head as
compared with 23,961 during the
corresponding period last year.

BATHING TRAINS

A new innovation introduced by
the English railways is the opera-
tion of special trains known as
"Bathing Specials," now running
from London to Brighton's new
£0,000 seawater pool, which holds
more than half a million gallons
of seawater changed every three
and a quarter hours. A balcony
seats 1,400 spectators and it is e-
quipped with sunray lamps. The
water used is heated by 11,000 volts
of electricity, and every hour 160,-
000 gallons of water are taken out
and passed through the plant room
for cleansing and purification.

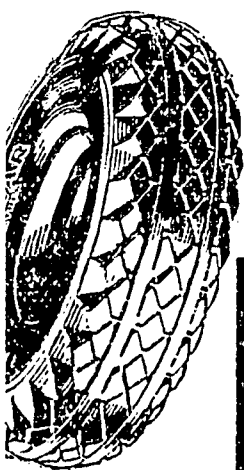

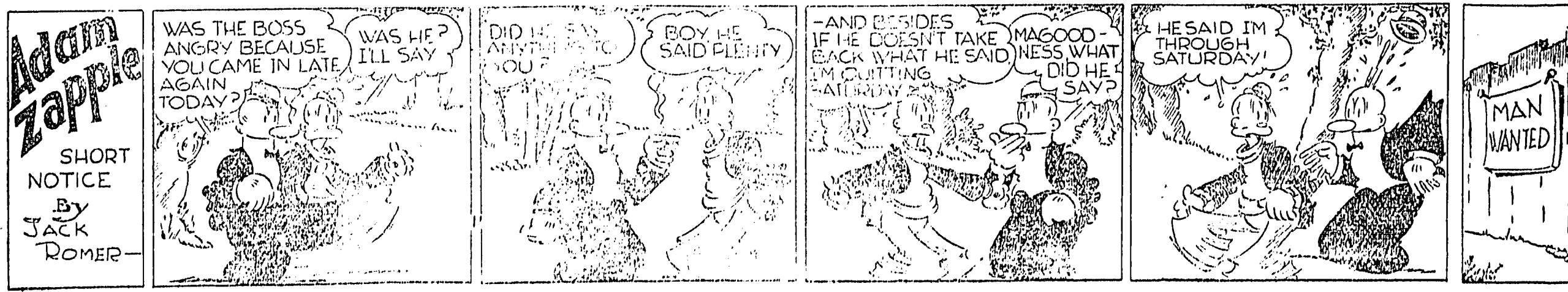

Victoria—Coal and Oil reserves on all sections of the Cariboo District not already licensed or leased were set up by Provincial Government today.

Prince Rupert—The U. S. Army planes were forced to land at Prince Rupert on account of fog.

Seattle—It is expected that ships will sail again from Seattle on Monday. The strikers having voted in favour of arbitration.

Toronto—A Bank robbery took place at one of the branches of the Bank of Montreal here. It is understood about \$28,000 was taken by the bandits.

Minneapolis—Minneapolis is under Martial Law brought about by the "Truck Driver's strike."

Vancouver—Henry Kiesel and his sons have resigned from the boards of Vancouver Breweries and Distilleries.

Vancouver—The heat wave continues west and north. In Alaska a record was established 100 degrees in the shade. Kam'ups 104 deg. Moose Jaw 100 deg.

Regina—The latest standing of the parties is now Liberals 50, C. C. F. 5.

"Q BOAT V. C."

It is announced that Captain R. N. Stuart, V. C., D. S. O., is the new skipper of the Canadian Pacific liner, "Empress of Britain", in succession to Captain Latta. Captain Stuart is 48 years of age. He began life in a sailing barque and after only three years of apprenticeship was in his first shipwreck—the frail vessel struck a rock and went down in less than five minutes. The way in which he got his V. C. was this. He was in the Q-ship Pargust. In July 1917 the ship disguised as a British merchantman was torpedoed at close range. A "panic" party (you remember the old dodge) under Lieut. F. R. Hereford abandoned the ship at once. They in their lifeboat decoyed the enemy submarine to within fifty yards of the Pargust. The submarine took a heavy list. Her crew camoured out of the conning tower holding up their hands. It was after a ballot that Captain Stuart (then Lieut. Stuart) was awarded the V. C. The particulars were not published until after the war. Four months later another submarine adventure won him the United States Naval Cross "for extreme bravery". He was in charge of the cruiser Tamerisk, and he so manoeuvred his ship that he was able to bring safely home a United States gunboat, the Cas'n, after she had been torpedoed by a German submarine.

Of the new incorporations published in the last issue of the British Columbia Gazette—Five were for mining companies.
