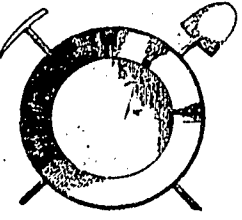

**MINING NOTES**

**BRITANNIA UNCOVERS HIGH-GRADE VALUES AT KEITHLEY**

According to reports that just reached here, the Britannia has uncovered some high-grade values at their workings on the Midas and Jane groups of claims that they have been developing above Keithley and right alongside of the Cariboo Yankee Girl property. Mr. Brennan, assistant General Manager of Britannia, is on the ground looking after the affairs of the Company and is greatly interested in the richness of the new showing.

**CEDAR CREEK REPORTS HIGH-GRADE VALUES**

The group of Victoria capitalists who have been working a crew of miners on development work on Cedar Creek report that they have discovered high-grade values in coarse gold in their workings. Cedar Creek has been the scene of a score of finds that have paid handsomely in the past, but the present discovery promises to develop into the best so far located.

The present holders have a good camp completely equipped and plan on developing their new find into a producer in the shortest possible space of time.

ulated as resulting from buried intrusives, only visible on the surface in the forms of sills and dykes."

The paper then goes on to state that there has been a great deal of speculation as to the identity of the "grey" and "black" sulphides.

The following minerals have been identified in the samples submitted: Gold, galena, sphalerite, pyrite, quartz, galena-bismutite; cosalite; telluride (variety unidentified), ankerite. It further states that free gold occurs abundantly in many of the samples, but is most prominent in the galenobismutite and cosalite. Referring to the Galenobismutite it goes on to say this very rare mineral is of considerable interest because of its association with gold in Idaho. It has been determined by chemical analysis and by etching tests under the microscope. It is massive and therefore differs from its usual form of occurrence. It will be noticed that this mineral is high in lead and low in bismuth when the analysis is considered. Free gold is associated with this mineral occurring through the sample as fine stringers and occasional small nuggets. Cosalite mineral is also very rare but its chief claim to interest is because of the fact that like the galenobismutite it is intimately associated with the gold which occurs in the mine. The mineral is usually veined by gold, which also occurs as scattered nuggets. Sometimes the gold in the cosalite amounts to as much as ten per cent of that mineral by weight. Often the gold can be observed in the cosalite with the unaided eye, but sometimes it is only to be seen under the microscope in polished sections after dissolving the cosalite in acid.

Quartz is by far the most important gangue mineral and occurs abundantly throughout the mine. Several samples of quartz which did not contain visible gold were assayed and none gave even a trace of the precious metal.

The paragenesis of the ore has not yet been worked out. It is probably as follows, the oldest mineral first: pyrite, quartz; galena and sphalerite; ankerite (?); cosalite; galenobismutite, and gold.

But the outstanding feature of the paper is that Dr. Warren states the mineralogical significance of the deposit as follows:

"A study of the ores leaves no doubt as to the deep seated origin of the gold."

We publish these extracts from Dr. Warren's paper as it will no doubt be of great interest to those not only interested in the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mine, but to the many others engaged in prospecting in the Cariboo. Dr. Warren is well-known; and regarded as one of the leaders in the geological circles of Canada.

**B. C. POLICE COST \$611,501; TOOK IN \$1,573,000 TAXES**

Acting as revenue collectors, British Columbia's police force took in \$1,573,789 in the calendar year 1933, it is shown in the annual report of the department.

Most of this, of course, was thru the motor licence branch, which took in \$1,423,848. Police court fines produced \$28,715. Game licenses brought in \$36,143. In trade licenses collected \$23,768; fishery fees, \$23,928; in amusement taxes \$1990, and the remainder for a variety of reasons.

At the same time the operation of the force cost \$611,501, of which the provincial government directly was charged with \$536,789, the remainder being paid by the municipalities which are policed by the B. C. force.

**NEW METHOD OF HANDLING FROZEN GRAVELS**

He was succeeded on the bridge of the Britain by Captain R. N. Stuart, V.C., D.S.O., U.S.N.C., R.D., R.N.R. Captain Stuart was promoted to the post of commodore of the Canadian Pacific fleet.

Indicating the trend towards greater production and recovery of business, substantial increase in the second quarter of 1934 as compared with the corresponding period of 1933 is shown in the recently published production figures of Consolidated Mining and Smelting, one of world's greatest mining companies.

Driving a highly decorated locomotive into the Canadian Pacific Railway depot at the end of the Calgary-Edmonton run recently, A. N. Hobkirk, veteran engineer, completed 43 years of continuous service with the railway, most of it at the throttle of an engine. "I have always liked my work and I hate to quit," said Mr. Hobkirk.

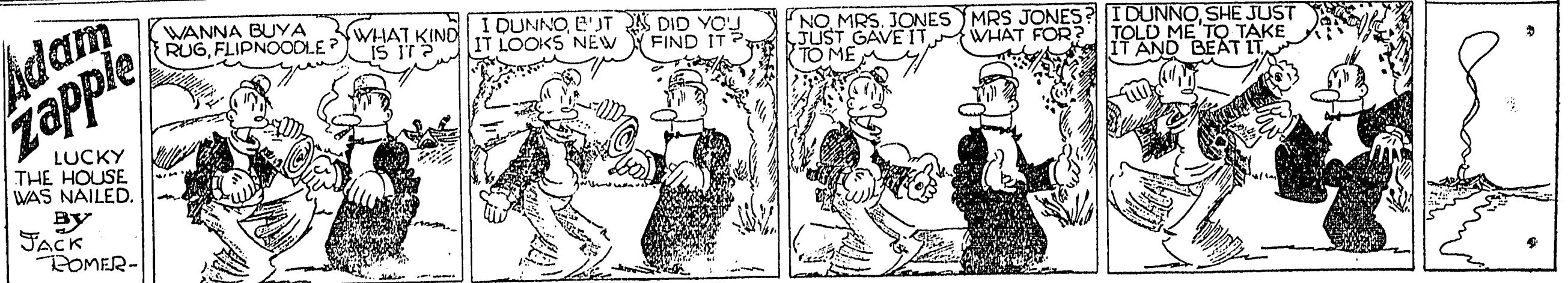
