MINING NOTES

PLACER MINERS PLEASED

Placer mining during the present season has shown a decided improvement, and can be classed as the best for many years. In almost every section of the Cariboo a considerable number have been busily engaged following both the rivers and creeks, and the returns obtained by most of them have at least furnished a grubstake. In many instances some quite coarse gold has been recovered in good quantities. It is hoped that with the lowering of the rivers and creeks this activity will continue to the end of the season. It is quite obvious that many of the prospectors have adopted better methods of working than in former years which no doubt accounts for better saving of the gold.

TAYLOR-WINDFALL MILL GRINDS \$100 ORE

The Taylor-Windfall mill that started milling ore on the Taseko Lake property last week is grinding away on ore that runs close to one hundred dollars per ton. While the mill is only rated at ten tons per day, owing to the quality of the ore competent mill men assert that it will be able to mill from twenty to thirty tons of this ore daily. They have been at diamond drilling with excellent success and as a result have demonstrated that the deposit covers an area of approximately sixty-five feet in length and values to a depth of approximately three hundred feet. While the sensational values found on the surface only go to a depth of from twelve to fifteen feet, the assays from the drill cores show that commercial values extend as far as the drill has penetrated. The ore will be mined by the "glory hole" method for the present at least. The result of the first cleanup of the mill will be looked forward to with intense interest by mining men all over the north.

The Taylor-Windfall is located in the Whitewater section of British Columbia on the border line between the Bridge River and Cariboo districts.

MUCH ACTIVITY SHOWN AT KEITHLEY

More activity in placer mining in this district than in many years. The Moorhead Mines with headquarters in Seattle, Washington, have a crew of eight men at work and are putting in a ten-mile ditch line which they hope to have completed by late this season.

The Bullion Mine has let a contract to the Jamieson Construction Company for the building of a ditch from Polley to Moorhead Lake. The contract will amount to an expenditure of from ten to twenty thousand dollars.

The Bullion Mine is at present piling with two giants and as soon as their additional power is completed, will be in full production. Mining men who have had an opportunity to "pan" in the Bullion pit report high-grade pay dirt.

MOTHERLODE ON TASEKO TO BEGIN DEVELOPMENT

R. H. "Pat" Stewart, well-known mining engineer and formerly connected with the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company, has returned from the Taseko Lake District where he went to make an examination of the Mother Lode property just across the Taseko River from the Taylor-Windfall mine in the interests of a strong group of Vancouver financiers and mining men.

Upon his return he reported favorably to his associates and advised that they accept the property and begin development at once. According to the terms, the Vancouver group pledge themselves to furnish development capital to the extent of seventy-five thousand dollars, twenty per cent of which is to be available at once, arrangements have been made to put a crew on the property immediately and prospecting will be carried on with a diamond drill. Jack Pederson, well-known mining man interested in the Mother Lode property, accompanied Stewart on his trip. They flew into the property but owing to an accident to their plane were forced to walk out.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN CEDAR CREEK LITIGATION

It is announced that Judge Robertson has reserved judgment in connection with the Cedar Creek litigation. The case was heard at Williams Lake, where Judge Robertson was relieving Judge Calder who is on vacation.

A despatch from Toronto states that the Stock Exchange and Ontario Securities Frauds Commission announce officially the intention of conducting a thorough investigation into ore conditions at Wayside Mines. They plan to send an investigator to the property.

PLACER AND LODGE MINERS COMPETING IN OUTPUT

Real "dyed in the wool" placer or "gum boot" miners in the Cariboo District of British Columbia are jubilant this year over the results that are being obtained along the bars of the Fraser River and on the various creeks of the Cariboo.

Owing to the most favorable water conditions known in years and coupled with the advanced price of gold, there has been more activity in placer circles than there has been since the pioneer days when the Cariboo was the greatest source of placer wealth in all the north. Creeks are being worked and new areas are being prospected that in the past have been considered of too low a grade to be profitable and the results that are being obtained are proving that the Cariboo as a placer camp is one of the best districts in Canada.

Several years ago when lode mining was just starting in this district, the placer miners were a bit jealous of the findings that were being made by the quartz prospectors. It is a known fact that a real placer miner seldom has any time for a quartz miner and by the same token a real hard rock man looks upon placer mining as a kind of makeshift way of recovering gold. However, as placer had long been the backbone of the mining industry in the Cariboo, its followers professed to scorn the possibilities of the Cariboo ledges and many stated that it would be a long time before the lode gold output of the section equalled the placers.

This year was looked upon by both sides of the controversy as a test year. The Cariboo Gold Quartz was in production and several other properties are getting ready to go into actual milling. Then came the increase in the price of gold and hordes of placer men swarmed over the district. Every bar in the Fraser had its crew busy with rockers and sluice boxes. Lowhee Creek with an abundance of water went into production early. Over on Lightning Creek, Jim Williams was taking out money as was the Eldorado Company and the Last Chance near Stanley. Slough Creek was producing and good results were being obtained on Gagen Creek by Armstrong.

The French Creek Company started taking out money on French Creek and all over the district

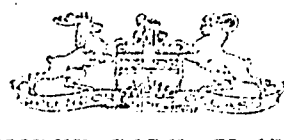

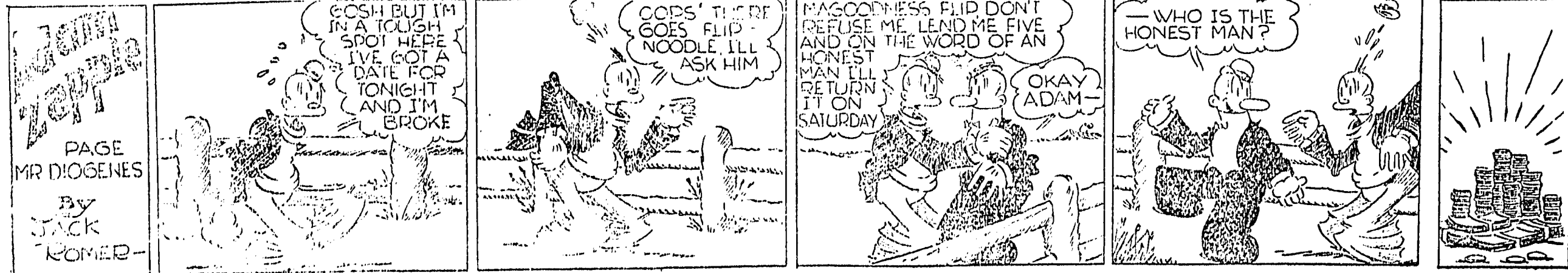

Cariboo Historian Sees His District

Louis LeBourdais, Yukon telegraph operator, returned Wednesday from a trip into the Taseko Lake district.

"Some people," he said, "spend their holidays outside," meaning the city, "but I've done that too, and will do it again, no doubt, but this year I thought I'd look over some of the country I've never been into, and some that I've wanted to see for several years."

And this is what he has been doing for the past three weeks. His first trip took him to Keithley Creek and over the Snowshoe plateau to the head of Cunningham, where he was met by George Riviere—with a saddle horse (and wasn't he glad). He spent the next four or five days with Riviere hiking the hills (on horseback) and then headed south for Taseko.

He was to fly in from Shalath last Saturday, but Cootie's plane was held up at Vancouver by bad weather so he spent the intervening time between then and Tuesday morning at Alex Philip's Lodge at Alta Lake.

Proof that Louis likes variety when travelling is evident from the different conveyances he made use of in returning to Quesnel.

Leaving Rainbow Lodge at 1:45 a.m. Tuesday by train he was dropped off at Bridge River in the sleeper the P.G.E. leaves there for the accommodation of its Bridge River patrons, at 6:15. Picked up there by one of Neal Evan's Transportation cars he was taken to Shalath, about a mile and a half distant towards Lillooet.

At Shalath he boarded one of the same company's planes, piloted by R. L. Cootie, and flew to Taseko where he met Jim Donnelly who was headed for Quesnel via the Chilco Ranch with the Donnelly pack train. With him were Marvin Baker, Joe Bouchie, Jimmy Johnson and Oscar Lind. He expects to reach Quesnel today.

Leaving Taseko where is located the Windfall Taylor mine, Louis was landed by plane at Williams Lake at 3 o'clock the same afternoon. From Williams Lake Louis decided to put a long coveted plan into effect, that of hiking. But he picked a bad night. Two travelling salesmen heading south gave him a lift as far as the crossroads, near the 150-Mile House. From there he again set out and was picked up by a passing meat truck which turned into the Horsely road at the '53.

Two miles beyond the turnoff he was offered a lift by a Likely-bound truck but decided to accept lifts from no one but those who "looked as if they were going places." And as a consequence he had to hoof it right through to the '58 where he was given shelter for the night by the Leonard McCarthys. Not a single car passed through from 9 until midnight.

Next morning three fishermen bound for Tye Lake—with a trailer behind carrying a boat—gave him a lift as far as Deep Creek, where the new fish road turned off. From there home he made it by truck, a big one carrying five tons of fresh-picked fruit from the Okanagan. Louis leaves again Sunday for Manson Creek and the great open spaces north of Stuart Lake.
