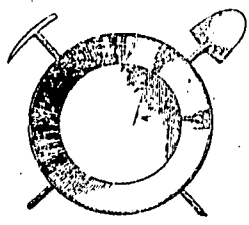

MINING NOTES

1500 OUNCE BRICK FROM CARIBOO QUARTZ FOR JULY

Substantial progress is being made at the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mine on Jack of Clubs Lake. Development work is going ahead and ore bodies are being proven and developed ready for stoping. The mill is running steadily and is gradually being stepped up to capacity. The month of July was one of the best in the history of the mine, and a brick was shipped for the months run amounting to approximately 1500 ounces.

The management expects to be milling in excess of one hundred tons of ore per day within the next thirty days. Recovery at the mill is satisfactory. A few problems in metallurgy are being worked out in a satisfactory manner and Colonel Rose, Mine Superintendent hopes to be running on stoped ore exclusively early this winter.

Some promising new surface discoveries have been located and will be investigated during the coming Fall and Winter. One of the most promising of these is the new vein that has been traced over from the Newmont workings where considerable development work has been done. On the Cariboo Gold Quartz this vein appears to increase in size and shows better values.

PLACER MINERS COUNT ON LARGE OUTPUT

Placer miners in this district have had one of the best years in their history as far as an adequate supply of water for sluicing is concerned. Rainfall has been fairly consistent and with the sluicing season practically half over the prospects for a banner year are favorable indeed. On Lowhee Creek the pay ground has been holding up to its usual average and their final cleanup this year will be a substantial boost to the placer output of the Cariboo. Cobb and Warren on French Gulch are sluicing daily but will not get into full production until they finish the building of their big ditch. However they are piping on good pay and will take out considerable money from this the latest of the placer producers of the Cariboo.

Encouraging reports are coming in from other sections of the district where placer miners are active. Keithley, Horsefly, Cottonwood, Stanley, Windgam, and in fact all sections of the Cariboo are doing well owing as mentioned to the fact that there has been no shortage of water. Some sensational values in hard rock are reported to have been found over on Willow River and locations are being fled. Details are not available at this time.

TAYLOR WINDFALL IS SHIPPING THIRD GOLD BRICK

The Taylor Windfall Mine located on Taseko River in the White-water district is now well into production and has joined the ranks of bullion producers of British Columbia.

This property under the able management of E. J. Taylor has been brought along from a mere prospect earlier in the season to an operating mine turning out in the dollars per day. The small ball mill that was flown into the property early this summer has been set up and is working perfectly. This enviable record of progress would have been even better if delay had not been caused by the Longshoremen's strike on the outside which delayed the delivery of the milling equipment from San Francisco.

The first gold brick to arrive weighed 52 ounces and was the result of milling only 14 tons of ore. This was followed by a second brick weighing 100 ounces and it is reported that a third brick is even now on its way out.

Taylor Windfall is capitalized for only a half million shares of which some 400,000 have been issued. Encouraged by their present success and the fact that diamond drilling has demonstrated good values at depth the management is already planning on installing additional milling equipment this winter.

Selfish Propaganda

Sidney Norman the mining writer, in an article written a few days ago, has attracted considerable interest and press comment. The Bridge River-Lillooet News quotes the following in its editorial columns: WAKE UP, B. C.! A private dinner occurred a few nights ago at which a worthy effort to develop an important natural resource of the province was discussed and the usual complaint voiced about lack of public support.

What's the matter with the so-called leaders in Vancouver, anyway? Can't they realize that a city in the size of Vancouver—good sports as the people have proved themselves to be—must eventually near the saturation point of speculative investment, and that such a condition is imminent, if it has not already been reached?

Great capital is being poured into S. Africa by English investors, and equally great sums might be turned this way if those who are supposed to be leaders would broaden their vision and forget for a little while the daily chicken-feed commissions that seem to be the sole object of life for so many of them.

Great Britain is ready to help develop any part of the Empire, but information about British Columbia has been so meagre, so haphazard and unreliable, so premeditated by selfish propaganda, that most Britishers don't pay any attention to B.C., and care considerably less.

It is time a concerted effort were made to overcome the tremendous handicap under which this province seeks the capital necessary to develop her mineral resources in an almost untouched empire.

TOKENS AND COINS

Collections of coins and tokens is a very interesting hobby. Even the Bank of Commerce has a valuable collection. At the Centennial celebrations in Toronto, the bank loaned the earliest British-Canadian coin, struck at Newark (Niagara-on-the-Lake) in 1794. This coin shows Neptune pouring out the waters of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers to irrigate the province of Upper Canada.

Scarcity of authorized coinage and the great variety of coins used in Canadian currency 100 years ago is well illustrated in the collection of the bank, including copper tokens circulated by the banks in those days and "leather money" then in use. The "holey" dollar of Prince Edward Island and a leather note issued by a merchant of Charlottetown are included.

MILLION DOLLAR GIFT TO MCGILL UNIVERSITY Recently a cheque was received by McGill University for one million dollars from the Rockefeller Foundation for the Department of Neurology. The foundation previously contributed \$232,000 to this department.

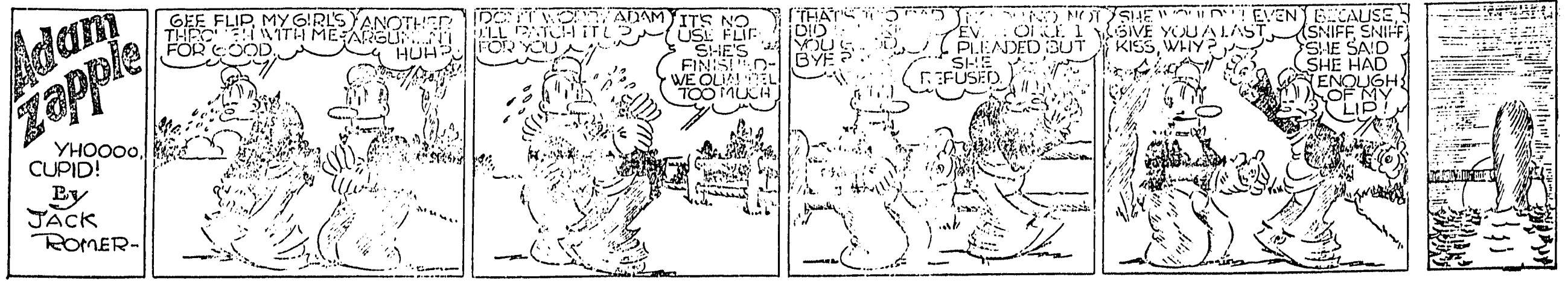

HIKERS FROM THE PRAIRIES

Right from the heart of the prair-
ies, Saskatoon, where wheat is sup-
reme and apparently furnishes
much stamina and nourishment,
three tired trail-weary overland
hikers, W. J. Barker, E. C. Barker
and Bill Grant, arrived at Quesnel
on Wednesday night, after spending
about seven weeks on the trail and
overland trek from Burns Lake.
The Barker boys are sons of Mr. O.
Barker chief despatcher for the
Canadian National Railways in the
prairie city, and Grant is the son
of Mr. Peter Grant, of the staff of
Saskatchewan University.
Leaving Burns Lake on July 2nd,
they struck south on the highway
to Franco's Lake which they crossed
on the government ferry, putting
them on the highway to Ootsa Lake
on the north end of which lies the
little settlement of Ootsa Lake.
From there they hit the tall timbers
by trail around the lake and at the
south end took a boat to descend
the Ootsa River over the Ootsa rap-
ids into Intahtah Lake, which they
traveled to the south end by boat.
Again they took the trail and swung
south, hitting the Nechako river,
south-facing, they returned to the
Nechako river, where they picked
up the trail again, finally emerging
at Tateluz Lake around which it
was very rough going over a mus-
sage country, and the fact that they
took the wrong side of the lake for
the best trail, from there they con-
tinued south to Kuvukuz Lake,
around it, and due south to Euch-
nko river, fording which they had
a very difficult time.
From there they went south again
on an Indian Rancherie at
Khuskus Lake, where they rested
and did considerable trading with
the natives for food, to replenish
their sadly depleted stock, as one
of the boys stated "We could hardly
control ourselves from over-eating,
our appetites were so keen".
Then east and south east along
the Cogiestiko river, where again
they made a crossing by fording,
and proceeded overland to Nazko
river, where the Nazko Trading
Post is situated. Here they rested
staying with Mr. John Hansen, in
charge of the post who treated
them very royally. Again proceed-
ing south they hit Puntchesakut
Lake, from which place to Quesnel
is a very well defined road, a dis-
tance of some seventy miles.

A together they covered over 300
hundred miles, and were very en-
thusiastic over the country, for this
was the first trip into the moun-
tains for E. C. Barker and Grant.
They planned in detail for the trip
and seem to be in good shape as
their packs averaged in the neigh-
borhood of sixty pounds each, and
included a tent.
After a good rest, and notifying
their parents by telegraph of their
safe arrival in Quesnel, E. C. Barker
and Grant left for Prince George
to take the Canadian National for
Saskatoon, while W. J. Barker will
stay to visit several mining prop-
erties, and probably finish his vac-
ation by panning for gold before
returning.

Unless something is done in the
near future the road past the Over-
waitea store and perhaps the store
itself will collapse. For some time
there has been a continual land
slide just here and at the begin-
ning of this week the road itself
dropped about a foot. At present
any car using the main highway
is in danger of breaking a spring.

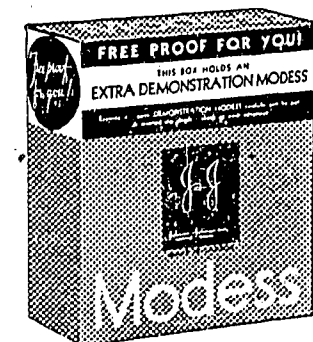
