HYDRAULIC WORK ON HIXON

Hydraulic operations will commence this month at the property of Hixon Creek (Cariboo) Placers, it is announced by Brig.-Gen. J. Duff Stuart, president of the company who, with R. H. Gale, vice-president, and R. Harry Gale jr. managing director, have returned from a recent inspection trip. The first cleanup is to take place about October 1.

This operation which has now been proceeding in its initial stages since March, 1932, has been entirely financed in London, and numbered among the shareholders are men prominent in British business. The operation will start with one huge monitor which will wash the gold bearing alluvial drift down from the benches of Hixon Creek into a flume which at present extends from a dam at the canyon for a mile and a half and is to be extended farther when necessary to reach more gravel.

GOLD DUST IS COMING AGAIN INTO CIRCULATION

Gold dust is again becoming commercially important in trade and commerce in the Cariboo. For years in most of the local business houses the gold scales of Pioneer days have been stored in the attic, but owing to the rush of prospectors to the surrounding creeks and the results of their labors with pick, pan, rocker and long tom, gold dust is once again becoming a popular medium of exchange. Of course most of the larger cleanups go to the Bank where they are exchanged for currency but the small or grub stake operator is having no trouble returning in his ten dwt. or single ounce of hard won dust from the streams that swell the Fraser for his monthly needs of bacon, beans and an occasional "quart" from the Government institutions. Old timers all over the district are welcoming the return of the "gold poke" and swear that it presages the end of the depression and the return of prosperity.

BALL MILL ON TAYLOR-WINDFALL EXCEEDS CAPACITY

The ball mill recently installed on the Taylor-Windfall property is surpassing the expectations of the management in the matter of production. While of only a ten ton rating it has demonstrated that owing to the easy crushing quality of the ore it is possible to put thru easily double and possibly three times the rated capacity. The diamond drilling that is being carried on to prospect the ground has demonstrated that the ore of Taylor-Windfall occurs in a cone shaped deposit and that the high grade values are in layers or sections interspersed with lower grade but commercially profitable ore.

Development work on the Mother Lode property located just across the Taseko River from the Taylor-Windfall is now underway. This ore is distinctly different from the Taylor Windfall and occurs in a wide zone ranging from thirty to sixty feet in width and assaying from a trace up to sixty dollars per ton.

The Mother Lode was recently taken over from Jack Pederson and associates by a group of Vancouver financiers who will have charge of the development.

DUSTING OFF OLD MINING REPORTS
Price of Gold the Cause.

GOLD, with its high price is having a far reaching effect. The Financial Post of Toronto, states that the demand for old mining reports, also for geological reports, is greater now than ever before.

The Canadian Department of Mines at Ottawa reports that old maps and surveys, which have been lying for years on dust covered shelves, some for over thirty five years, are now being taken down and playing a very active part in the present intensive search for gold across Canada's mineral belt. Many areas that have escaped notice are now coming to the front,

and in view of the present price of the yellow metal, new possibilities arise for profitable operation in sections where lower grade ores are known to exist, and the notations on the geological mappings by the early geologists are of great interest. The Bureau of Economic Geology states that requests are pouring in for reports and maps of districts that were almost forgotten.

Ten Long Years Ago

After several postponements, the hull of the big dredge being erected at Antler Creek was launched on Tuesday of last week. Barkerville residents opened the event with a dance on the floor of the big machine on Tuesday night.

Messrs. A. F. Curtis and George Duolos left on Sunday last for Soda Creek, where the former will have charge of the installation of a large pipe line and ditch for J. Hargreaves on Springfield Ranch, for irrigation purposes. The new ditch will augment the present system and will enable Mr. Hargreaves to increase his hay crop three-fold.

H. Beech, gold commissioner at Barkerville, accompanied by Mrs. Beech and their two children spent the week-end in town, guests at the Travellers Rest.

TRAINLOAD OF FRUIT SHIPPED

From Kamloops, the first whole train fruit shipment was shipped last week over the Canadian National Railways. The train consisted of 30 cars, the valuation of the fruit being over thirty thousand dollars. During the loading process, which was at the rate of four carloads per hour, the railway authorities gave every cooperation, keeping a switch engine always busy all day and no delay of any kind whatsoever occurred during the period of making up this record shipment.

LILLOOET MEMBER SUGGESTS C. N. R. TAKE OVER P. G. E.

Part of the solution offered by the Member for Lillooet in the Provincial Legislature that the Canadian National Railways take over the P.G.E. and if so a cut-off may be built from Clinton to Ashcroft, which was the suggestion made by the Sullivan report in 1921 to the Oliver Government, and to take up the rails from Lillooet to Howe Sound, using that as a motor highway.

The P.G.E. is the heaviest burden the province has to carry, and interest since the project was started.

up to the present time is in the neighborhood of \$40,476,000. It is stated that the amount of interest paid out by the taxpayers would provide sufficient money to build a house costing \$2,500 for each of 16,190 families. The P.G.E., according to C. H. Tupper, M.L.A., one of the directors of the road, states that it is making a net profit on operation. The burden of the debt now places a capitalization of \$200,000 on every mile of the railroad from Squamish to Quesnel.

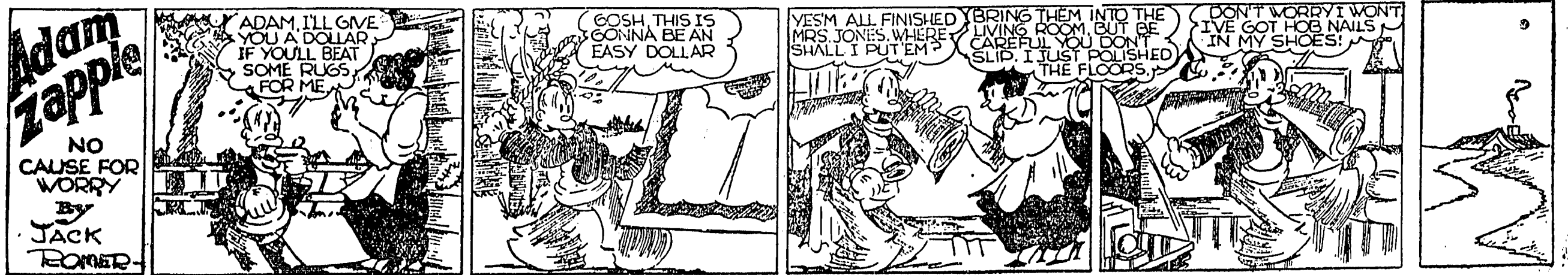

MR. J. A. FRASER, M. P. ADDRESSES BOARD OF TRADE AT WILLIAMS LAKE

On Monday last at Williams Lake, Mr. J. A. Fraser, M.P. addressed a very well attended meeting of the Board of Trade at which he outlined the banking and currency legislation, also the Marketing Act, with its cognate acts, the Debt Adjustment Act, and the Canada Farm Loan Act amendments. Mr. Fraser stated the main reason for the Marketing Act, was to return to the producer as large a proportion of the consumer's dollar as possible, so that we may retain on the land a greater number of agriculturists, many of whom have gotten into financial difficulties during the depression.

Referring to the Debt Adjustment Act, the speaker said its purpose was to provide a Court at which the agriculturist debtor and his creditor may submit particulars of their financial difficulties in much the same manner as the Bankruptcy Act provides for commercial and industrial concerns to adjust their matters by compromise.

Coming to the Farm Loan Act amendments, Mr. Fraser stated the legislation passed at the last session removes many of the restrictions from the Board, and provides an additional twenty-five million dollars for the purpose of loaning to those who have effected compromises with their creditors, and to give the agriculturists a fresh start.

At the conclusion of his address, Mr. Fraser was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for the clear and concise manner he had placed before the meeting the work of last session. The Pres., Mr. C. Tyson, was in the Chair and Mr. Lockwood acted as Secretary.

Among other attractions at Barkerville on Labor Day will be a stand selling Hot Dogs, coffee, ice cream and peanuts. Look out for the sign of the "Bower Inn" and you will be able to warm up or cool off according to the weather.

Last Saturday and again Thursday the Rodeo Serenaders, who proved such an attraction here six weeks ago, gave dances in the Bergeron Hall. On each occasion the hall was well filled with patrons who thoroughly enjoyed the music and singing provided for their entertainment. It is to be hoped that this orchestra will be able to pay another visit to Quesnel and district next year.
