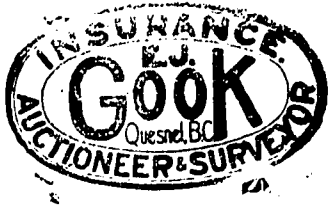

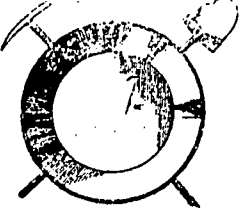

MINING NOTES

WINGDAM FORGES AHEAD

One of the largest individual mining camps in the province, apart from the very large operators is being constructed at Wingdam, at the holdings of the Consolidated Gold Alluvials of B. C. there, where operations are under way to recover the gold from a deep channel of Lightning Creek. The latest addition is a 30 x 53 four-story building for general purposes. There are also a number of other structures, such as residences, office, bunkhouse, storehouse, and shafthouse, all with electric light and the whole plant is now being electrically operated.

LARGE PERCENTAGE OF COARSE GOLD ON SLADE PLACERS

Slade-Cariboo Placers Ltd. who have been operating on Mosquito Creek in this district are reported to be in good pay. Recent cleanups show an unusually large percentage of coarse gold as well as plenty of the finer dust. The management has had a full crew at work all season and the results obtained by their cleanups more than justifies the crew. They are planning on working right through up to the Fall freeze-up, and from present indications will add materially to the total cleanup of the Cariboo for the season of 1934.

LIKELY DISTRICT ACTIVE IN PLACERS

Placer operations in the Cariboo are attracting the attention of mining engineers from all over the West. During the past few weeks qualified examiners from Eastern Canada, Washington, California and Colorado have visited this district looking over the various placer prospects and properties with a view of becoming interested. The Moorehead property has been examined and a deal is reported in the offing for this property.

Cedar Creek with a twelve year production record behind it under the management of the Cedar Creek Hydraulic Mines of Victoria is having a good year and according to report are working ground that is running an ounce of gold to the cubic yard—truly sensational values for a hydraulic property.

E. T. Fitzimmons who is interested in placer ground in the Barkerville District is reported to have optioned his Cedar Creek holdings to Barney Boe, well-known mining man from Vancouver. Mr. Boe is planning on an intensive campaign of development work in the immediate future. The abundance of water for sluicing coupled with the fact that this year has seen more prospectors in the hills than in years is responsible for the increased interest in placer mining in this section. Then again the increased price of gold is an added incentive.

Messrs. Craig and Brindle have been doing their assessment work on their group of claims adjoining the Thompson group at Downie Pass while on the Thompson group proper the owners have uncovered a vein and sunk to a depth of about 20 feet, the values running \$2.80 to the ton. Mr. A. M. Drum who has been on the latter property left on Tuesday for Portland, and will return again next May.

Dry Gulch Hydraulic, also at Stanley have built a new dam, and still have some men working. W. C. Mading left with his family for Seattle on Monday and will return as soon as possible to continue his work at this property.

C. J. Seymour Baker, who for many years worked on his property at Island Mountain, near Barkerville, which is now being developed by the Newmont Corporation, is on his way from England. Although an octogenarian, Mr. Baker has made annual trips to the Cariboo, returning to winter in England.

cently by a government lottery in New South Wales, Australia. In a French national lottery last year tickets to the value of \$12,000,000 were sold and there were not enough to fill the demand. Millions have been collected in the past from Britain, the Continent, the United States and Canada through the Irish sweepstake and Spanish Christmas lottery.

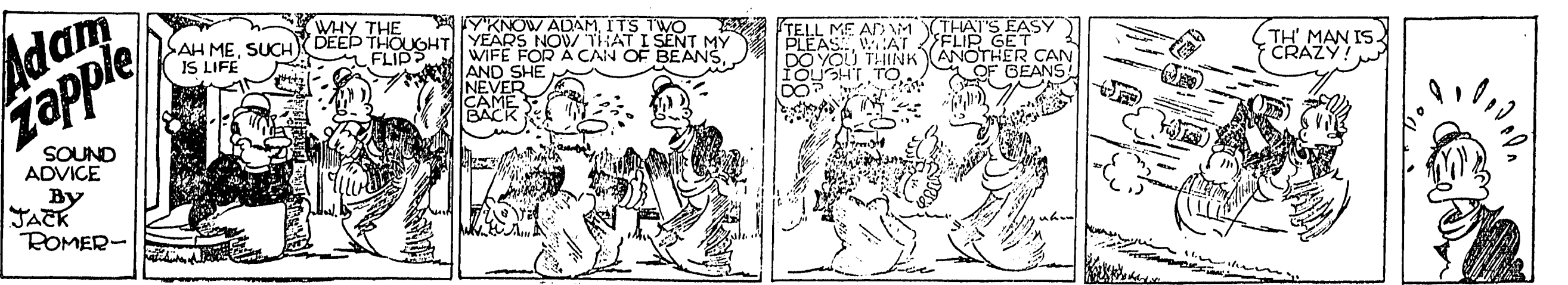

The Consolidated Company of Trail is working a crew of forty men on its big drag-line operation on Slate Creek. Company officials maintain a discrete silence as to results, but the general opinion is the men are working in good ground and that the results are quite satisfactory. The two McCorkell operations on GERMANS and Manson are proceeding satisfactorily. LeBourdais says there is no bunk about the finding of the 24-ounce nugget in the hydraulic operation of R. C. McCorkell on GERMANS. He did not manage to get his hands on the nugget, but there is no myth about the finding of it and it is still on the creek. Bert McCorkell is working a crew of ten men on his drag-line operation on Manson and is reported as having a very successful season. Including the men employed in the three operations named there are more than one hundred actively engaged in mining in the district this summer.

For the considerable part of his holiday Mr. LeBourdais has been up in the air. While at Fort St. James he made a flight to Takla Landing, from there to Burns Lake and back to Fort St. James, and later from Fort St. James into Slate Creek. He says he is becoming air-minded, and has found in flying the one means of travelling in which his feet don't get sore. He also finds it an exhilarating feeling to be able to look down on the world instead of having the world looking down on you.
