make any accurate computation of ore reserves, I think it safe to state that the ore indicated in the workings should be ample to supply the mill for many months ahead.

Costs have been high in the past, but with the development of the property in charge of an experienced technical manager, these should show an appreciable improvement. It is evident that operating costs generally will need to be still further reduced if only satisfactory profit is to be attained on the present scale of operations.

Only a fractional portion of the company's mineral claims has as yet been explored. The Pinkerton series of lodes has just been reached, and developments of this group should prove highly satisfactory. The B. C. vein lies within easy reach of two points on the main adit, and this should be tapped and explored as soon as possible. I shall be surprised if this wide lode does not eventually provide a large profitable tonnage of ore.

In short, I am satisfied that the property of the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mining Company Ltd. is a most promising one and definitely warrants and should amply repay prudent exploration and systematic development.

Binn's Conclusions and Recommendations.

Conclusions and recommendations over the signature of R. S. Binn, partner of the firm of McCarty & Binn, mining engineers, London, are as follows:

The mine can only be said to be in the relatively early stages of development. A great deal of systematic and intelligent development is required to prove it and place it on a satisfactory profit-earning basis. The results of work so far accomplished are highly encouraging, and in short, we are favorably impressed with regard to the future prospect and potentialities of your property in general.

The geological features are satisfactory; the area being a more or less intensely shattered one, structural features are favorable to ore deposition, while geological deductions certainly indicate that the deposits are deep-seated and will lie to great depth.

Any idea that the mine is an established producer on a profit-earning basis must be abandoned.

Urges Development First

The present policy of pushing on and increasing mill output before the mine is sufficiently developed to warrant same should be altered to one which puts mine development first and foremost. In our opinion it would be much better even to curtail mining and milling operations temporarily and increase development, thus to build up a sound and substantial tonnage of ore reserves. Only when the ore reserve and development position warrants, should milling operations be stepped up, and we recommend two years' supply of "positive" ore (i.e., fully proved ore according to the technical definition of that term) ahead of milling requirements as a safe margin. "Indicated" ore i.e., certainly not good enough, since it is impossible to calculate such tonnage and grade with any degree of accuracy.

The foregoing presages an intelligently conducted intensive development campaign, and this, in our opinion, is exactly what is required. Fortunately the company has ample funds with which to prosecute this work, having sold substantial blocks of shares during the past year at a premium; hence it is not forced to depend on profitable operations for the time being, but can settle down to systematic development.

What Development Should Aim at.

The development programme should aim at: 1. The exploration and development of the cross veins. 2. The exploration and development of the B. C. vein in depth.

With regard to No. 1, taking all things into consideration it will be obvious that the main adit level offers the best facilities for this work. We, therefore, suggest that this horizon be the main base of operation.

Besides disclosing and blocking out ore, development work will, of course, enable a close study of all geological details to be made, from which can be determined such important questions, for example, as mode of occurrence of lodes or groups, structural features affecting ore deposition, etc. The elucidation of these and other allied geological features is of the greatest importance, supplying as it will, invaluable data for the efficient and economical development of the property in the future.

Without wishing to appear hypercritical we would say that development to date has not always been carried out in a manner to facilitate these studies. For example in most cases, drives have been stopped when either the veins or values petered out, whereas had they been continued much more valuable information would have been to hand than is now the case.

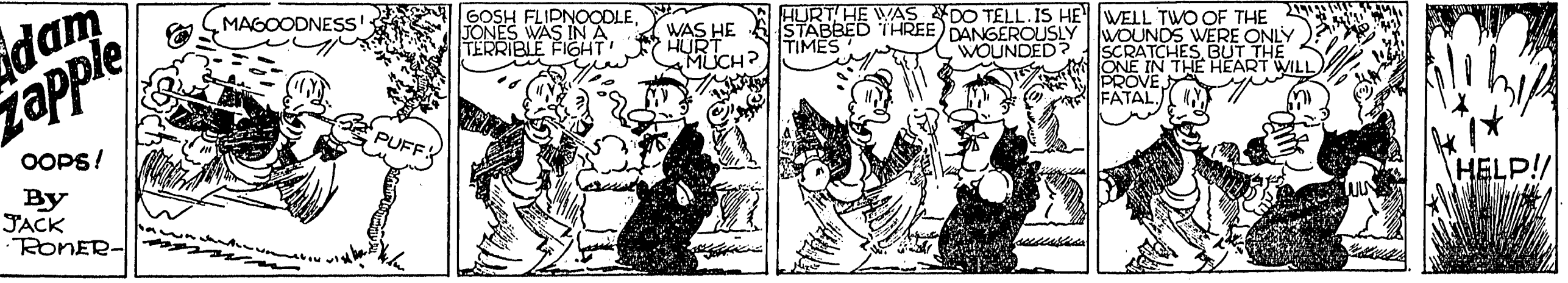

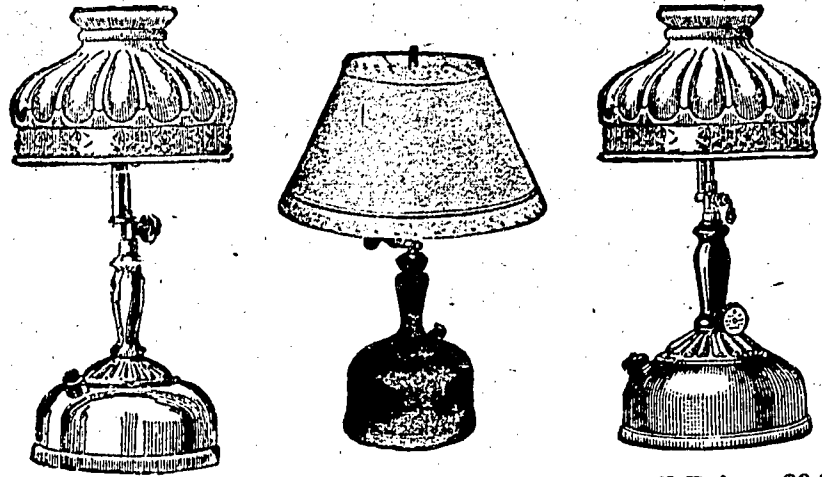

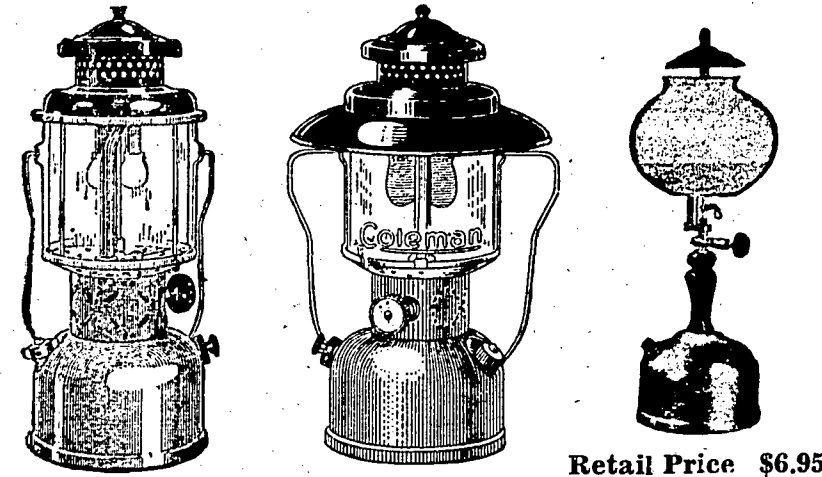
