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**MINING NOTES**

**BAR MINERS ACTIVE IN THE ALEXANDRIA DISTRICT**

We continue to hear excellent reports of the activities of the bar and bench miners in the Alexandria district. For the last four months Monty Smith, Louis Westergarde and Ben Griffin have been operating a hydraulic outfit about one mile from Louis Thompson's and have obtained good results all the way along. With a small pump and engine they have been able to work quite a stretch of gravel and are well pleased with the returns so far.

The Cariboo should be proud of these small operators, for by their work it is proved that there is still abundant gold in the rivers and creeks and the lie direct given the statement that placer gold in the Cariboo was worked out 30 years ago. "Gold is where you find it."

**QUESNEL RIVER ACTIVITY**

Signs of considerable activity on the Quesnel River from near Quesnel to thirty miles up stream are appearing. Tenders were closed on Monday for the erection of six buildings for the Cariboo Syndicate of New York, who are commencing to test the ground with a view of installing a large dredging operation. The buildings will be located on French Flats, about twenty-three miles from Quesnel. There were five bidders for the construction of these buildings, G. E. Baynes H. Joyce, H. M. Mutch, K. M. Skene and O. Sonneseth. The tenders are being forwarded by air mail from Vancouver to New York. Work is expected in a short time as to which has been successful.

The buildings to be erected consist of: combined house and office 20 x 34; one dwelling house 20 x 34; cook house and dining room, bathroom and showers 34 x 38; two bunk houses 20 x 24.

**TO LEAVE BY PLANE FOR THE TASEKO COUNTRY**

As soon as the weather permits Donald D. Fraser will leave either Quesnel or Williams Lake for the Donnelly Group of claims at Taseko Lake. Interesting developments are expected. Mr. Donnelly got word by radiogram from Taylor-Windfall, via Shalath.

H. DeWitt Smith, chief consulting engineer of the Newmont Company, returned to Vancouver Tuesday after spending four days at the Company's operations at Island Mountain.

**Cariboo Cameron**

In the "Victoria Weekly Colonist" of issue Friday November 9th, 1888, we find the following article referring to the passing of this well known miner of the early days of the Cariboo Gold Rush, which we feel confident will be of great interest to our readers. The entire tribute to him from The Colonist is as follows:

The death of John A. Cameron at Barkerville, Cariboo, on Wednesday, is announced. No history of the "days of old, the days of gold" will be complete if the name and exploits of the deceased are omitted from its pages. Mr. Cameron was born at Lancaster, Canada, of Scotch parentage about 60 years ago. Early in the fifties he mined in California, and subsequently in Australia, with indifferent success. In 1861 he came to Victoria with his first wife, who, in the spring of 1862, accompanied him to Cariboo, then a newly discovered gold field. In the summer of the same year the company of which Mr. Cameron was the leading spirit took up claims on Humbug (now Williams) Creek. Mrs. Cameron enfeebled by the toil and privation of the trip and the hardships incidental to life in the new mining camp, died about that time. She was the first white woman buried at Cariboo and the population for many miles around flocked to the little village of Barkerville to attend the funeral of the heroic woman who had lost her life in the discharge of her wifely duties. When dying Mrs. Cameron exacted from her husband a pledge that, should he be successful in his mining ventures he would convey her body to the town of Cornwall and there bury it by the side of her father. In the fall of 1862 the Cameron claims proved to be very rich, and Mr. Cameron, assisted by Robert Stevenson, now of Chilliwack, built a sled on which they placed the body of the dead woman and dragged it over snow and ice, 400 miles, to the town of Yale. There they shipped it by canoe to New Westminster and thence by steamer it reached Victoria. Here the body was again interred. Mr. Cameron returned to Cariboo, where in an incredibly short time he amassed a large fortune from the product of his claims, and was regarded as the richest man in British Columbia. In 1865 he returned to his native place on the St. Lawrence with his wealth and the body of his deceased partner. Her dying request was complied with, the remains being interred in the family lot. This act of devotion on the part of Mr. Cameron was widely commented on in the press and some envious spirits started a scandalous story that the body he brought home was not that of his wife, but that of a squaw. The grave and coffin were opened. The body being in a perfect state of preservation was easily recognized by her friends. Mr. Cameron bought the farm on which he was born and which had passed into strange hands, and erected thereon a beautiful mansion. He married an estimable lady and surrounded himself with the comforts and even the luxuries of life. He dispensed his favors with a lavish hand. He sought out needy relatives and either bought them farms or set them up in business. Possessing a restless, speculative nature, Mr. Cameron engaged in many enterprises, all of which proved failures. When the bulk of his money had disappeared he endeavoured to repair his fortunes by investing in Nova Scotian gold mines. That venture completed his ruin and he returned to this province some two and a half years ago, broken in health and pocket, but with the fire of his enterprising spirit unquenched. A year and a half ago he opened a claim at Big Bend, but being attacked with hemorrhage of the lungs he was compelled to abandon the work and return to Victoria. A couple of months ago Mr. and Mrs. Cameron went to Cariboo. The poor fellow was but the wreck of his former self. Those of his old friends who were there to welcome him—alas! they were very few—saw plainly that death had set its seal upon him. He left there a quarter of a century before in the full flush of manhood, and rich beyond his most rose-colored anticipations. He came back to them an emaciated old man; poor in this world's goods, but rich indeed in the loving ministrations of a devoted help-meet. He had returned to die amid the scenes of his former successes, and near the very spot where he was once the peer of the proudest and

richest in the province. The remains will be interred at Barkerville and it is thought that Mrs. Cameron will return to her friends in the East.

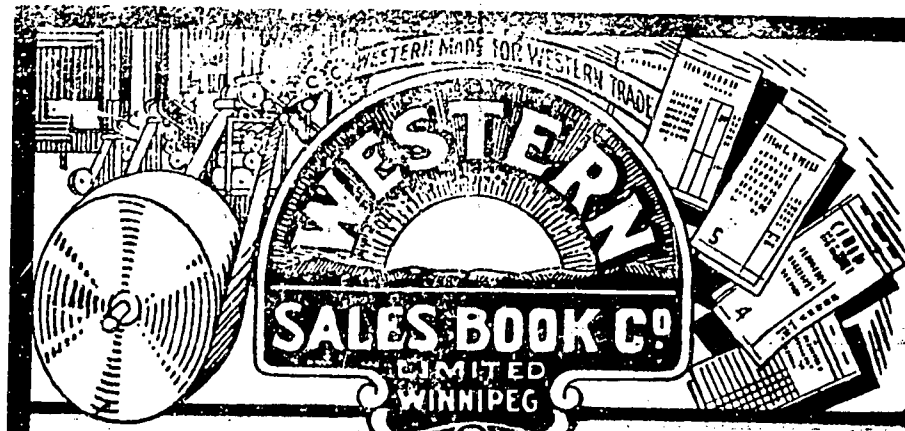

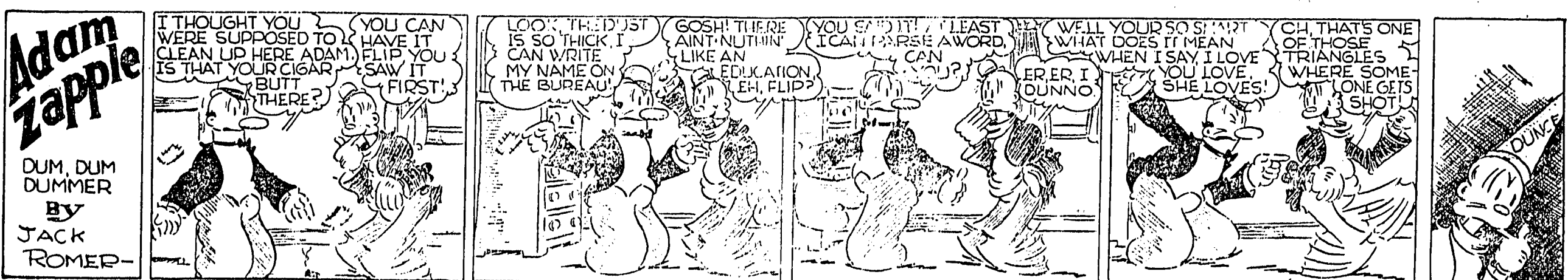
