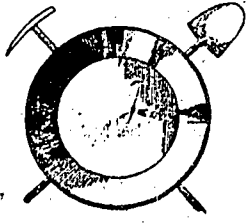
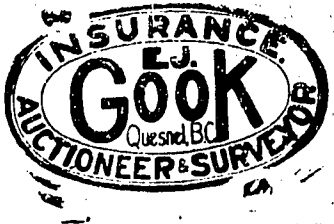

**3 BOYS MAKE WINTER'S STAKE
AT COTTONWOOD MOUTH**

Charles (Chuck) Haddon and
Desmond Watt were in town Tues-
day buying supplies to carry them
on till freeze-up, at their bar claim
at the mouth of the Cottonwood
River. The last heard from Chuck
was when he came down from Waver-
ley to find a piece of ground of
his own, so in partnership with
George Allen he staked claims on
the Fraser next to Jim McHardie's
Tertiary.

The ground averages from \$1.00
to \$3.00 a yard, and the boys claim
that if their little "one-lunger"
engine wouldn't go on the hummer
so often, they would be making
real good pay; as it is they're not
kicking, and for next year plan to
install much better equipment.

They have taken out as high as
\$10 a shift and from now on intend
to give their ground a thorough
testing.

GOLD OUTPUT UP 1.2 PCT.

Ottawa—Gold produced in July
amounted to 245,516 ounces, an in-
crease of 1.2 per cent over the
June output of 242,713 ounces, but
a decrease of 4.3 per cent from the
July 1933 total of 256,663 ounces,
says the Dominion Bureau of Stat-
istics.

During the seven months ending
July 1, 1,697,326 ounces of gold were
produced as against 1,720,397 ounces
in the corresponding months of last
year.

Ontario led the provinces in pro-
duction in July with 171,654 ounces.
Quebec was next with 31,007
British Columbia was third with
25,578 ounces.

Manitoba and Saskatchewan pro-
duced 11,124 ounces.

The Yukon 6727 ounces of alluvial
gold.

Nova Scotia and Alberta produced
426 ounces.

Quotations for gold during July
averaged \$34.59 per ounce.

her stated that he wrestled with
Jeffrey, took the axe away from him
and then heard him shout "I'll get
you yet, damn you." After saying
this, Jeffrey ran to the barn and as
he knew that this was where the
accused kept his rifle, he and his
family ran to the farm of a neigh-
bor, Pomeroy, for protection. Pome-
roy at once rode into Fort St.
John and returned with Constable
Smith. In cross-examination Gaut-
tier denied that he had bitten Jeffrey
during the fight or that he had
himself picked up an axe on the
night in question. He agreed that
he had not seen the accused with a
rifle that night.

Mrs. Gautier gave evidence which
seemed to be the same as that of
her husband, but she spoke very
inaudibly and was hard to under-
stand.

Constable P. B. Smith of Fort St.
John said that on the night of May
20th, 1934 he was summoned to the
home of Pomeroy and there found
the three injured members of the
Gautier family, whom he at once
took to hospital. He returned and
searched for the prisoner but in the
meantime the buildings had been
set on fire. In the barn of Tom
Davis, another neighbor he found a
packsack belonging to the accused
containing a 30-30 rifle and a .22
trappers gun, both fully loaded.

The next day at 4 p.m. he met the
accused on the main Fort St. John
highway and placed him under ar-
rest. At 8 p.m. that evening Jeffrey
made a voluntary statement to the
effect that fearing the, in consequ-
ence of what he had done and the
injuries his mother had probably
sustained he would be sent to gaol.
He was determined that his step-
father should not benefit from his
labour and therefore he had fired
his homestead.

Dr. H. A. W. Brown gave evidence
to treating three members of the
Gautier family for injuries in the
early morning of May 21st. Levi
Gautier was suffering from a dis-
located shoulder, and two fractured
ribs. Mrs. Gautier had cuts on the
right hand and the son had a cut
on the upper lip.

In the witness stand Jeffrey re-
lated his version of the events of
the evening and in the main they
agreed with that of Levi Gautier.
However he maintained that Levi
had bitten him on the finger and

that he had also taken up an axe.
It was in consequence of this that
he himself had seized an axe and
in the heat of the moment struck
members of his family.

For the defence Mr. Woodburn
said that the whole matter could be
summed up in the words, "Too
much family." From looking at
those members of the family in
court it was easy to see that they
were all subnormal and such a fam-
ily, living in a small cabin year in,
year out, were bound to be living
on the edge of a volcano. Appar-
ently it exploded on the night of
May 20th and this fight took place.
In his opinion it was one of those
cases which should never have been
brought to court, and he therefore
asked the jury for an acquittal.

For the Crown, Mr. Avison point-
ed out that although the accused
was subject to sympathy and al-
though there might have been great
provocation, Jeffrey had undoubt-
edly committed a crime. He had
been deeply touched by the words
of the confession in which Jeffrey
appeared very sorry for any possible
injury he may have inflicted upon
his mother. Nevertheless a crime
had been committed and it was his
duty to put the facts as fully as
possible before the jury in order
that steps might be taken to pre-
vent such things occurring again.

Mr. Avison pointed out that the
circumstances, revealed one of the
most terrible stories of social and
living conditions which could be
placed before any Court; conditions
so bad as to make for the insanity
of all the persons suffering from
them.

Summing up, his Lordship point-
ed out to the jury that in every
crime it was necessary to prove that
there had been a criminal intent
behind the committing of that
crime. If the jury were satisfied
that there had been no criminal in-
tent to commit murder, then they
were justified in bringing a verdict
of Not Guilty. Furthermore, if they
were satisfied that there was suf-
ficient provocation, or that the
blows had been struck in self-def-
ence then again they were justifi-
ed in bringing in a verdict for ac-
quittal. As the accused was charged
with attempted murder, they need
not worry about any other crime to
which they might reduce the
charge, and the judge specially in-
structed the jury that having re-
gard to the conditions disclosed he
would have no objection to a ver-
dict finding the prisoner "Not Guil-
ty" of attempted murder and ig-
noring all lesser matters.

After an absence of three-quar-
ters of an hour the jury returned a
verdict of Not Guilty and recom-
mended that Jeffrey be mentally ex-
amined.

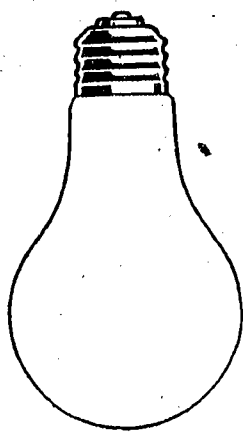

THE BISHOP AND THE CATERPILLAR

Some amusing correspondence has lately been going on The London Times arising out of the misadventures of a rare caterpillar, sent by post to the Bishop of St. Edmundsbury, a noted entomologist, which arrived in the form of a dark stain on the inside of a crushed cardboard box. A stern letter from the postal authorities accompanied the packet, and reminded the eminent ecclesiastic that only bees and leeches had the freedom of His Majesty's Mails. A further letter amplifying this statement took a more liberal view, an even suggested that if a man liked to post himself and took care to affix to his person the correct number of stamps the Postmaster-General was ready to deliver him. This pronouncement has drawn forth the following letter:—
