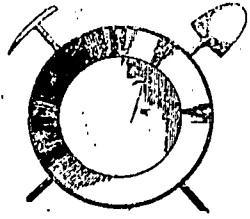

A Human Bloodhound

In the last issue of the "Observer" reference was made to the attack on Inspector Vance, the able criminologist of the Vancouver Police Force, by a gangster or an associate in a ring of criminals. Last month the Editor of the "Merritt Herald" while visiting Vancouver happened to spend a couple of hours with Inspector Vance, and in his paper publishes the following details of a clever and useful invention for detection of crime. It is interesting to note that both Scotland Yard and the New York criminal investigation department are watching with interest this "Robot Nose". We publish the article referred to which describes the invention of Inspector Vance.

"In tracing criminals by scent a special solution of chemicals is sprayed over the spot where a suspect stood which is examined by means of a spectroscope and a special light ray. The volatile chemicals make it possible to put the scent of a human body in physical form. The fact that the chemicals are so volatile made the examination an operation which could be performed only by an expert.

Now, however, according to an announcement by Chief John Cameron and Inspector J.F.C.B. Vance, head of the science bureau, this difficulty has been overcome by the invention of the robot nose.

The new instrument may be known as the "Vancamroscope," a combination of the names of the Sponsor, Chief Cameron and the inventor, Inspector Vance.

While only an expert could understand and describe the structure of the instrument, it is so simple in its operation that any person could use it in following the trail of a suspect.

The machine is in the form of an elongated shadow box with a glass cover and two handles at the upper end. The lower end is open. Chemicals are sprayed on the spot where the suspect stood and the open end of the box is held over the spot. As the chemicals vaporize they rise into the box.

At the upper end they pass thru a light ray and strike a spectrum band. The manner in which they break the spectrum band allows for the classification of the scent. Above the band are numbers of small pointers and at each point where the band is broken one of these pointers is moved down. When all breakages are marked by pointers they are locked in position.

The operator then takes the machine and looking down through the glass cover places the mouth of the machine over spots where he thinks the suspect may have stood or walked. At each point where he finds the spectrum band broken at the points of the indicators he has "picked up the scent."

This is only a layman's description of the method of operation and is but a rough idea of the operation. Angles of the spectrum band can also be marked by the pointers. Possibilities of the machine as a means of recording identification of criminals and the keeping of criminal records are being explored.

It is claimed that thousands of combinations for filing purposes may be obtained by means of the indices or pointers of the machine.

Records of suspects could be quickly and easily obtained, it is declared. Persons would be recorded without their knowledge. A man might touch a doorknob while being interviewed by police who are unable to force him to be finger-printed. After his departure chemicals could be sprayed on the knob and his spectra record obtained at once by placing the machine over the knob. The place where he stood

would also afford the same source of record.

Research already carried out has shown that no two persons have the same spectra record. Further research for the purpose of perfecting the robot nose is being carried out.

Inspector Vance has just returned from a short visit to California where he was a welcome guest at universities and science bureaus of police departments. University faculties in the South requested full data on his recent discoveries in the matter of tracing criminals by scent so that they might work along the same lines, but the inspector, while giving them an outline of what has been accomplished, declared that the research will be concluded here as the honor of the discovery belongs to the City of Vancouver and science bureau to which he owes allegiance.

Incidentally the last assault on Inspector Vance was the fifth attempt on his life.

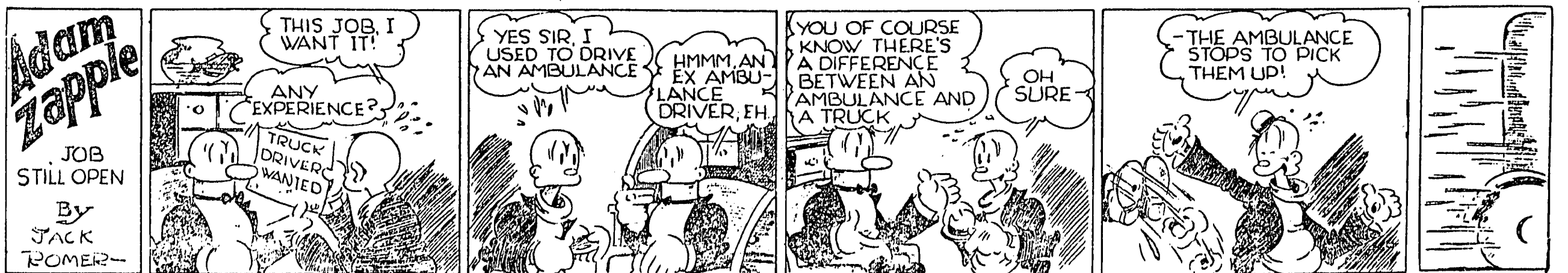

SEED PRODUCTION MAKES VERY GOOD SHOWING

Of interest to farmers, the following is from the "Prince George Citizen", which shows that the northern interior of the province can produce seeds second to none.

Harry Bowman, agricultural and colonization representative for the C.N.R., has returned from a visit to that section between Burns Lake and Smithers, and reports the people in that area are much more interested in the production of certified seed than in mineral development, as promising more certain returns. He says it nearly twelve years since the first interest was taken in the production of certified timothy seed, but it has been growing steadily since the suitability of the area for the production of certified seed had been demonstrated. Mr. Bowman says there will be approximately 500,000 pounds of seed for sale this year, and that it will doubtless be marketed for something in excess of \$70,000. The heaviest producer in the district is Charles Barrett, who was the first to engage in its production.

The growers this year have had one offer of 18 cents per pound for a limited quantity of No. 1 grade seed and an offer of 16.25 for the entire crop, but have decided to invite tenders before entering into any sale agreements.

Mr. Bowman says there is a great opportunity for the farmers in the production of timothy seed on suitable lands as in the Bulkley Valley from 200 to 490 pounds of seed has been produced to the acre. As to the market there is no uncertainty. In the past Canada has been importing timothy seed to the extent of ten million pounds annually. The greater part of the seed has been secured from the United States, but as there will be an acute shortage there this year there should be a marked advance in timothy seed prices in Canada.

Radio Hints

YOUR AERIAL

This part of the province is not the best district for radio reception. This means that you must do everything possible to give your radio a chance to deliver the best that is in it.

A good set, properly installed, fitted with an aerial to suit the radio for the time of the year, gives the best possible entertainment that money can buy.

The results received through several tests prove that it is necessary to use two separate aerials for the receptions all the year round. The best results in the summer were received off a 200 ft. straight wire about 40 ft above the ground. In winter or late fall, when reception is much stronger, an aerial about 75 ft. long was most satisfactory.

I shall try in these short talks each week to help you to understand your radio better, so that you may get the best and most economical service from it. My thought of the aerial as a starter was to enable you to erect the best for the time of the year now. It is not very pleasant trying to install it when the snow is on the ground. Do it now in order that you will have good entertainment all winter. Don't think that a piece of wire thrown round a room is good enough; give your set a chance; it is well worth it.

THIS WILDCAT MAY PROVE TO BE NATIONAL BENEFACITOR

HON. H. H. STEVENS may have grabbed a wildcat's tail when he started his crusade against unfair business tactics in Canada but, wittingly or unwittingly, he has made a useful, if startling, contribution to the welfare of the general public. The mass buying committee has been resolved into a commission and the hearings, that are to be held, should inform Canadians intimately regarding business practices which affect them adversely and in which they themselves unconsciously have had a part.

Naturally, the minister of trade and commerce had to give reasons for his action in getting the probe under way and these reasons are commended to the public's attention.

Hon. Mr. Stevens says:—"It became abundantly clear to me that a great section of the people of Canada was laboring under unusual handicaps. There was acute suffering. I refer to the farming community. It is true that generally citizens have suffered also, but I think there is no class of people that has had to endure such a broad levelling down. Approximately fifty per cent of the people of Canada are agricultural, directly or indirectly associated with that industry."

"I think I am justified in saying that the broad basis on which our national and economic life rests is agriculture."

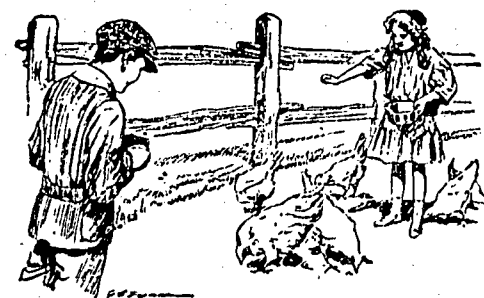
Mrs. Joyce of Wingdam was in town for a couple of days this week.
