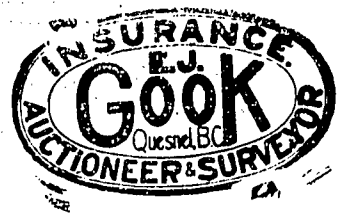

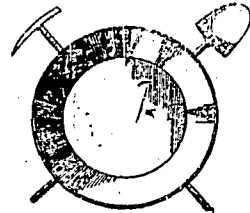

MINING NOTES

CLEAN-UP AT DRAGON CREEK

Messrs. Len Ford and Russell McDougall cleaned up at the placer operation at Dragon Creek last week. It consisted of 143 ounces. This is very encouraging indeed after some years of hard work, and the property looks promising in no small degree.

ASSESSMENT WORK ON KITCH GROUP

Assessment work has been completed for the year on the Kitch Group of mineral claims on Slough Creek, near Devil's Canyon. This work uncovered two veins over a distance of about 150 feet, and was under the supervision of Mr. D. D. Fraser. The property is held by the Cariboo-Bridge River Gold Properties, Limited.

WINGDAM

The last unit of the Crossley 250 H.P. Diesel for the Wingdam Mine passed through Quesnel on Tuesday night. When the installation is completed this will give 525 effective horse-power. We understand that drilling has commenced to secure cross-sections for the bed-rock contour a short distance upstream on Lightning Creek.

AT NEWMONT

The Newmont Mining Company, at Island Mountain, are already installing the Dorr filter, and work being carried on at this property is making excellent progress.

BULLION MINE

It is understood that a very satisfactory shipment has been made from this placer operation, but at the time of going to press no details could be obtained.

PLACER MINERS CONTINUE

In spite of a few light snowfalls we have not heard of any placer operations closing down. It is possible that with a spell of warmer weather more hydraulic mining will be carried on. From reports received the production will be greater than for many years.

ESTIMATED B. C. WILL PRODUCE \$12,000,000 WORTH OF GOLD THIS YEAR

B. C. gold fields produced approximately 200,000 ounces in eight months this year, with a minimum value in Canadian funds of \$6,800,000 at \$34 per ounce. This compared with \$6,955,716 as the total value in twelve months last year.

August added 27,108 ounces to the previous total, with an average value of \$34.19 per ounce. For the first half year the average return was at the rate of \$34.67 per ounce, according to the provincial figures available.

Total production for the full year is expected to reach \$12,000,000 in Canadian funds.

Wider Distribution of Certified Seed

One of the improvements most to be desired in Canadian agriculture is a reduction in the number of varieties in use of cereals and other farm crops, and the more careful selection and better cleaning and grading of the seed of the best varieties.

A small percentage of farmers who make use of the best varieties make use also of the best seed cleaning methods, with the result that the seed which they sow is in all particulars superior to the seed used by their neighbours, and it is scripturally and actually true that as they sow, so they reap. Their crops are likewise superior.

On the other hand it is true that many are unable to state the variety of the wheat, oats or other important crop they are growing. This is equivalent to saying that they do not know whether it is good, poor or indifferent seed in quality. Other farmers, again, are familiar enough with the variety names of their crops but have been misled on the subject of the merit of any particular variety, and may be prizing highly one which is not the best adapted to their particular locality or which perhaps is on inferior quality wherever grown. Failure to compare carefully the merits of the different varieties and to choose the variety in each crop which under the prevailing local conditions combines both high yield and good quality is a misfortune, first from the standpoint of returns to the individual grower, secondly from that of the nation's total production.

Unfortunately, too, are the results from using seed which is not pure as to kind and variety. There are many instances where one kind of grain has been so contaminated with another, or one variety has been so mixed with one, or more other varieties of the same kind, that the resulting crop has been unsuitable for seed and has suffered serious deterioration in market value. Differences in varieties as to time of ripening, colour, size and shape of kernel, and in milling and feeding quality, emphasize the desirability of keeping each variety as pure as possible.

Fortunately there are today in every province of Canada individual growers and societies of farmers who are specializing in the production of Registered, Certified or improved No. 1 seed of the common agricultural crops. Their efforts in improved seed production, and in the distribution of their product among other growers are being encouraged by both the federal and provincial Departments of Agriculture.

OFFER BRED SOWS AT COST

At this time of the year with the swine breeding season approaching when sows must be bred for spring and early summer litters, a farmer should consider breeding only sows of bacon type. Those farmers who have not sows of desirable type and who are not located in districts where such stock can be readily obtained may profitably make use of the services of the Brood Sow Policy administered by the Live Stock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Under this policy farmers may secure bred sows of suitable type at cost.

Any farmer who may be interested can get full information by applying to the Dominion Live Stock Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, or to the representative of the Department at his nearest stockyard.

FAMOUS BANKER PASSES

The death of Mr. Laurence Currie a managing partner in Messrs. Glyn Mills & Company, the famous old private banking house, marks the passing of a good friend of the Province and an exceptionally fine type of Englishman. Mr. Currie was one of the Trustees of the Sinking Fund of the British Columbia Government Inscribed Stock, and rendered great and valued service to the Province. We understand that the Minister of Finance cabled to Mrs. Currie and members of their family a message of sympathy and expression of appreciation of his work.

MINISTER OF FINANCE CRITICIZES GARDINER

A despatch from Ottawa states that Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of finance, has silenced the criticism of Premier Gardiner of Saskatchewan, in which he charged the federal government with being neglectful of the necessities of his province. The minister of finance declares Saskatchewan has received the lion's share of relief distributions by the federal government in that over a four year period Saskatchewan received 25% of the whole amount. Mr. Rhodes said further that the federal government had offered to take over the very difficult job of administering the affairs of the province of Saskatchewan but that the offer had been rejected.

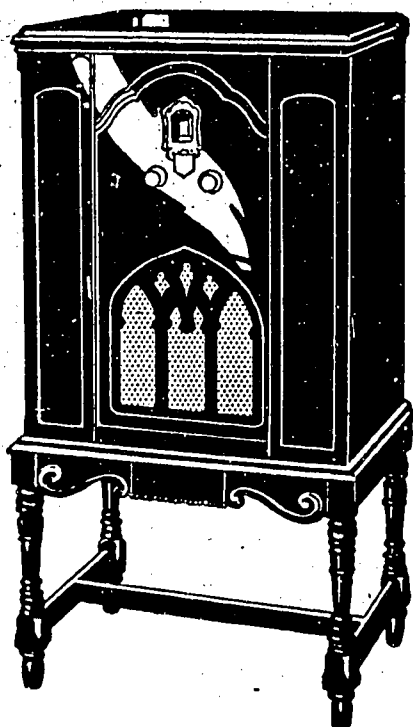

Radio Hints

Supplied by Holgate Radio and Electric

NOISE IN RADIOS

There are possibly thousands of causes for noise in a radio. I will try to outline a few, very common to the average set.

Your aerial is a good place to begin, as this is where your program enters your radio. When installing a new aerial, on checking over an old one, make sure that all connections in the wire are clean and tight. Soldering all joints is the surest way to insure a perfect connection. Insulate all bare wires that touch any part of a building or pole.

When installing a ground wire on a water pipe, pick a spot as close as possible to where the pipe enters the ground. Scrape the pipe good and clean, and put on a good clean ground clamp. It is impossible to properly solder a wire to a water pipe with an ordinary soldering iron. Where a water system is not handy, drive a piece of pipe or iron rod into the ground as far as you can. About six to eight feet will give the best results. All connections for this should also be clean and secure.

A good lightning arrester is a sure way of protection for your radio and home in case of an electrical storm. Full directions for installing are usually given when purchasing same.

Weak batteries are a common source of noise in a battery set. When testing your battery it should be done with the radio turned on. This will give you the voltage the radio is actually receiving.

Next week I will explain in detail how to eliminate noise from dirty tube prongs.
