MILK DESSERTS

Why do so many mothers delight in preparing enticing milk puddings for their family? The reason is obvious as such desserts, wholesome and readily digested, are ideal for both children and adults, and should be included regularly in the daily meals. Then, too, every thrifty homemaker takes into consideration the high food value of a milk pudding in relation to its low cost and appreciates the fact that most desserts of this type may be easily and quickly prepared from materials available at all seasons of the year.

Milk puddings will find continued favor if varied by using different flavorings, by adding a little coloring or by covering the pudding with a meringue, keeping in mind that foods should always be attractively served.

Maple Rice Pudding

1/4 cup rice
2 cups milk
1/2 tablespoon cornstarch
1/2 cup maple syrup
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites
1/4 cup maple syrup
Boil the rice in salted water until tender. Scald milk in double boiler. Stir cornstarch smoothly in 1/2 cup maple syrup and add gradually to hot milk. Stir until mixture thickens, and cook 15 minutes. Add rice and well beaten egg yolks. Place in buttered baking dish. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually add the 1/4 cup maple syrup, and spread over pudding. Bake in moderate oven until delicately browned (about 15 minutes).

Spanish Cream

1 tablespoon granulated gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
3 egg yolks
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 egg whites
One-third cup sugar.
Soak gelatine in cold water. Make a custard of egg yolks, salt and milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture coats the spoon. Dissolve gelatine in hot mixture. Cool and add flavoring. When mixture begins to thicken fold in meringue made by adding the sugar to the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into moulds and chill.

Lemon Fluff

3 tablespoons cornstarch
1 tablespoon flour
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cold milk
1 1/2 cups warm milk
2 lemons, grated, rind and juice
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites
Mix cornstarch, flour, sugar and salt with cold milk. Add to hot milk in top of double boiler and cook about 20 minutes, stirring constantly until mixture is thick. Add some of hot mixture to beaten egg yolks combined with lemon rind. Stir into pudding and cook about three minutes. Remove from heat. Add lemon juice and fold in beaten egg whites.

Chocolate Spanish Cream

Follow recipe for Spanish Cream. Melt 1 1/2 ounces unsweetened chocolate in milk when making custard mixture. Beat with rotary egg beater. Then add egg yolks and salt.

Coffee Spanish Cream

Follow the recipe for Spanish Cream, using 1 1/2 cups coffee and 1 1/2 cups milk as liquid.

FARM JOTTINGS

THE MODERN FARMER

There is no question that the farmer's occupation is a skilled one. Many city dwellers have little idea of the amount of skill and detailed knowledge necessary for success in farming. This skill must take several forms. There is the manual dexterity and mechanical sense needed for operating both ordinary and modern farm machinery, and the knowledge required in dealing with horses and stock. And above all others is the judgment which decides the right moment to carry out this or that operation on any particular area of soil, and the managerial capacity to arrange operations and materials efficiently. The degree of forethought and skill demanded is much higher than is expected of the ordinary recipient of the basic wage for unskilled labour.

"There is a good case for suggesting that every farmer and his family are entitled to a short holiday each year. In evidence given recently before the Royal Commission on Wheat Farming in Australia many farmers spoke of the courageous support which had been afforded to them in their fight with adversity by their wives and daughters, and the Commission feels that special reference should be made to the part which women are playing in maintaining the industry during the time of depression. On the average their work is harder than that of their city sisters, and the activities of various organizations in the different states of the Commonwealth should have wider support in order that the home life of the wheat farmer can be improved." The above extract from the report of the Royal Commission in Australia applies with equal force to the women on Canadian farms.

GOLD PRODUCTION OF B.C. MINES FOR FEBRUARY

The figures are now to hand showing the gold production in February of the leading mines in B.C. It will be seen that with an output of \$61,000, the Cariboo Gold Quartz made a good showing. This represents 1,629 ounces, as compared with 1,425 ounces in January. In addition to the above, clean-up of the ball mill in February yielded a further 472 ounces, but this should be credited over two or three months.

Production for 1934 was 13,918 ounces, or \$573,212 with gold at \$34. The monthly average was \$47,767. The average for the first two months of 1935 is about \$50,000.

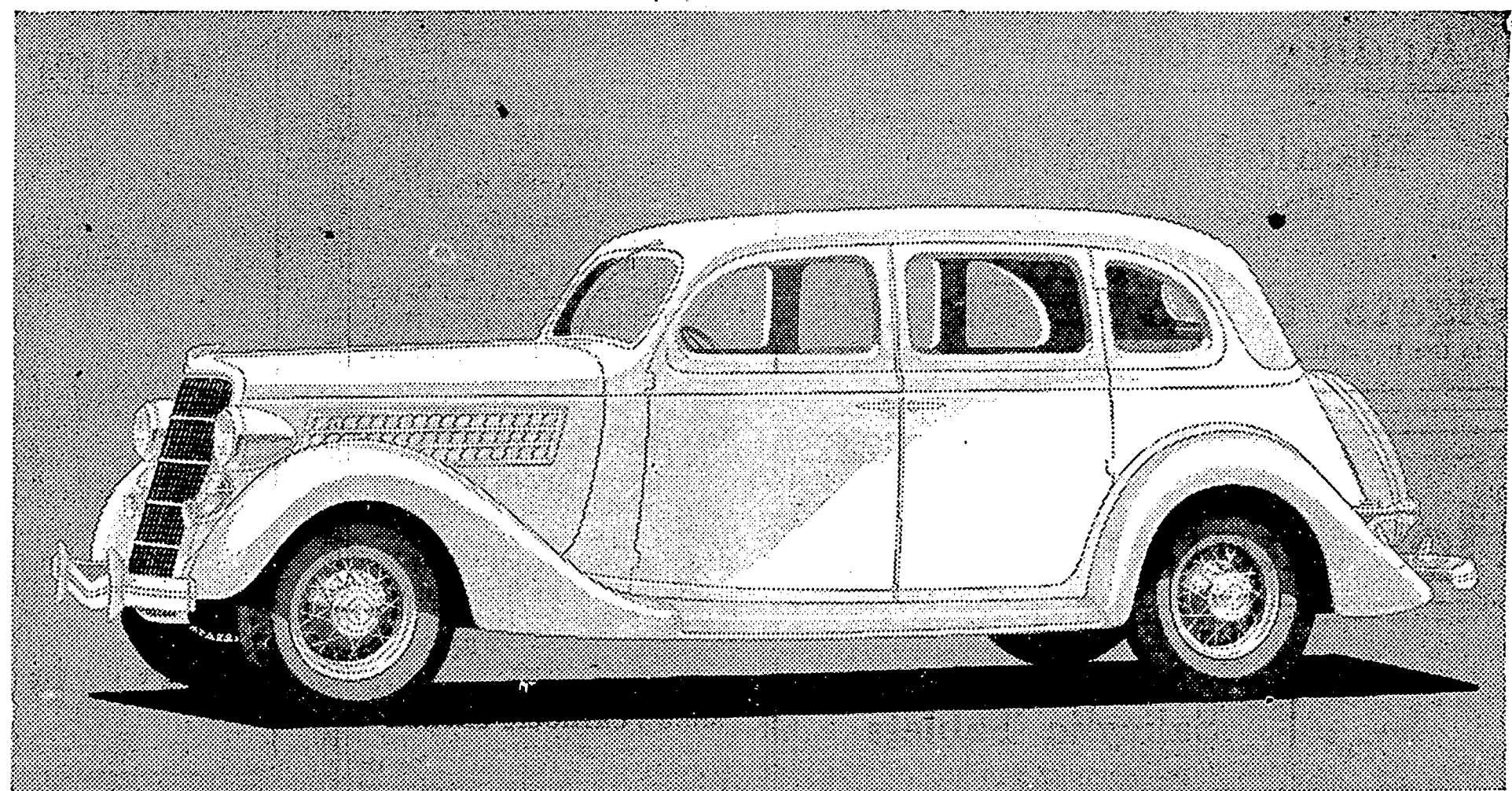
