**The Week's Work in
Canada's Parliament**

OTTAWA—Liberals on a holiday of professional pin-pricking this week in the House were severely shocked by their one-time heavy-weight, former Minister of Agriculture W. R. Motherwell.

The excuse for the speechmaking was a vote for the Marketing Act. Liberal front and back benches were enjoying themselves thoroughly, picking what seemed to be huge holes in the Conservative government's measure enabling farmers to legally band themselves together in co-operative marketing schemes if they wished. They beamed as they shouted across the floor of the House the Government's bill was compulsory, knowing full well Canadians abhor anything smacking of compulsion.

Then, cap on as usual, up popped veteran Motherwell, gently told his Liberal friends in politically diplomatic language they didn't know what they were talking about. The Marketing Act was NOT compulsory, all nonsense to claim that because a minority of 10 per cent of a group of growers or producers must bow to the wishes of 90 per cent of the group, it is compulsory," he declared.

He might have said that the measure does not compel growers to take advantage of it at all unless they want to, in fact they cannot take advantage of its provisions unless they agreed by vote to market their products collectively. Any marketing scheme must be passed by a two-thirds vote of the producers before it can become operative under the Act.

Galleries were crowded in the House Tuesday afternoon, the people expecting to see another display of fireworks between Secretary of State C. H. Cahan and ex-Minister of Trade and Commerce H. H. "Harry" Stevens. But they were disappointed. Mr. Stevens withdrew his amendment to the Patent Act amendment, accepted Mr. Cahan's and Premier Bennett's explanation that the amendment covered the point Mr. Stevens previously had insisted was not taken care of.

Three commissioners, one appointed by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, one by the Canadian Legion and Army and Navy Veterans' Association, and one by the Government, should be appointed to devise ways and means of assisting returned men now facing economic difficulties throughout the land. This is the chief recommendation of Mr. Justice Hyndman's commission tabled in the House by Minister of Pensions and National Health D. M. Sutherland this week.

Minister of Railways Dr. R. J. Manion did not like one point made in the report of Mr. Justice Hyndman, told the House so. The report had said that there should be more returned men employed on the canal staffs. Mr. Manion's answer was that 65 per cent of the Welland canal staff were returned men; 42 per cent of the Lachine canal staff were the same.

Chief of Staff General McNaughton, of the National Defence Department, had a bit of cheerful news this week. He announced that 25,000 men had left unemployment relief camps under his department since they had been established, telling the camp officers that they had promises of a living wage employment.

General McNaughton figured in the news from another angle this week. Former University of Alberta President Dr. H. M. Tory retired as president of the National Research Council. General McNaughton succeeded him. Successor to General McNaughton who was born 48 years ago at Moosomin, Sask., of a Maritime family—will probably be M.D. No. 11's O. C. Major-General Ashton, C.B., now stationed at Victoria, B.C.

The Senate this week amended the eight-hour day bill insofar as it concerns railwaymen. The House of Commons had exempted this class of employee for a period of one year, but the Senate cut the exemption period to six months, passed the measure through second reading in the upper chamber.

Over \$16,000,000 was spent on Old Age Pensions last year, of which the Dominion's share was \$12,313,000, or 75 per cent.

ONLY ONE "ATATURK" ALLOWED

There can only be one "Ataturk" in Turkey, and that is the Ghazi Mustapha Kemal. Thus reads the law which has just been passed by the Turkish Parliament at Angora. All other persons are forbidden to use the name for it means "Father of the Turks" or "The Greater Turk."

A slight increase in wheat acreages for 1935 in Europe is reported and excessive winter damage has been confined to relatively small areas, principally through drought in Spain and Italy. From North Africa a substantial reduction in production is anticipated.

FARM JOTTINGS

WAX PLUCKING OF POULTRY

Both the material and the method for the wax plucking of poultry have now reached the stage of commercial application, and demonstrations will continue to be given at strategic points throughout the Dominion as arranged. This development is the successful result of the research work carried out during the past winter by the National Research Council of Canada in conjunction with the Live Stock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Their allied efforts to evolve a suitable wax and an efficient method of plucking have proved so satisfactory in actual practice that considerable possibilities both for commercial plants and on the farm have been made available. The system, in brief, consists in immersing the bird in liquid wax, after the rough feathers have been removed. The coating is allowed to harden and when removed takes with it residual and pin feathers, hairs and scales, leaving a bird with a clean and attractive finish. For the time being the wax will be prepared in limited quantities by the National Research Council at Ottawa. Particulars concerning the procuring of the wax may be obtained from the Council, or from the Live Stock Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

"CANADIAN GROWN" MEANS SOMETHING

Recently several certificates of origin covering shipments of Canadian poultry to Great Britain have been forwarded in an incomplete state, owing mostly to exporters neglecting to pay attention to the column headed "Name of Grower or Producer" in some cases the column has been left blank, and in other cases the word "producer" has been crossed out and "supplier" inserted.

These methods are unacceptable to the British custom authorities. A Canadian "supplier" might be able to supply poultry grown in Timbuctoo. Canadian birds are wanted, not "Canadian supplied." In the absence of any specific name of a Canadian "supplier" might be able of the words "various Canadian farmers" would be acceptable. It makes all the difference that they are Canadian according to the British authorities.

THE HOUSEWIFE

Soft Custard

3/4 cup evaporated milk
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup granulated sugar
2 egg yolks
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon flavoring
Blend evaporated milk and water in double boiler. Set over hot water and bring to scalding point. (Do not boil). Add sugar to slightly beaten egg yolks and your hot milk gradually over egg mixture. Blend thoroughly. Return to double boiler and cook slowly, keeping water well below boiling point (200 deg. F.) and custard at 130 deg. F. Stir constantly until mixture coats spoon and has thickness of cream. Remove from heat at once. Cool and add salt and flavoring. Chill. Serve over dry sponge cake or fruit. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Modern Steamed Pudding

1 cup mixed fruits
Lady Fingers
1 cup sweetened condensed milk
1 cup hot water
2 eggs
2 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Butter mold or top of boiler. Place layer of finely cut fruit in bottom cover with layer of lady fingers. Repeat until fruit is all used and mold three fourths full. Sprinkle nutmeg or cinnamon between layers if desired. Blend together sweetened condensed milk, water, beaten eggs, melted butter, salt and vanilla. Pour over fruit and lady fingers in mold. Let stand one hour or longer. Steam over hot water 1 1/2 hours. If double boiler is used keep bottom part three-fourths full of boiling water. Serve hot with sauce or whipped cream. Serves eight.

Malted Milk Brazer

Mix to a paste two heaping teaspoons Borden's Malted Milk with a little hot milk. Add two tablespoons orange syrup, beaten egg and fill cup with hot milk. Mix well and top with whipped cream.

Ginger Malted Milk

Mix two heaping teaspoons Borden's Malted Milk to a paste with two tablespoons cream (or milk). Add two tablespoons ginger syrup. Fill cup with hot water. Beat with an egg beater until frothy. One-half teaspoon Jamaica ginger may be substituted for the ginger syrup.

Malted Egg Nog

Mix two heaping teaspoons Borden's Malted Milk to a smooth paste with a little hot water. Stir in a beaten egg and add hot water or milk. Add one-half teaspoon vanilla and shake or beat until frothy.
