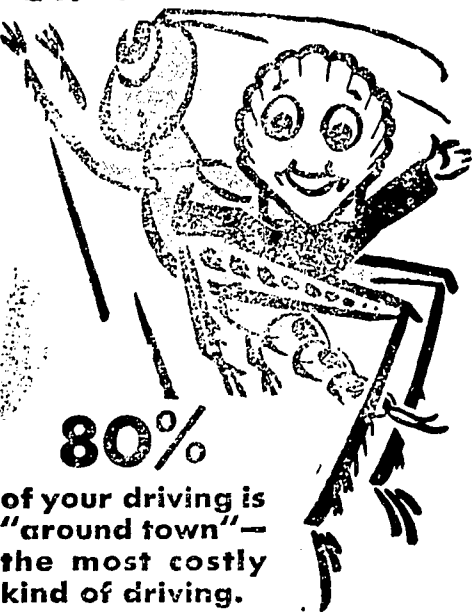

**FARM JOTTINGS**

**MARKETING RESEARCH**

Many farmers who formerly were interested primarily in production are beginning to realize that the demand for the product which they have to sell is as important in determining the price as the supply of the product. One of the chief objects of agricultural marketing research, as carried out by the Economics Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, is to obtain facts concerning the demand which will lead to increased returns to producers of agricultural commodities. A comprehensive study of the marketing of any particular commodity involves the gathering of information of the whole process of distribution of that product from the producer to the consumer. Such a study includes investigation with respect to the methods and practices of those engaged in marketing, the costs of preparation and transportation, the facilities for handling at the farm, at the country point and at the terminal, auction or public market, wholesaling and retailing costs and the many aspects of the demand or preference of the ultimate consumer. Such a comprehensive investigation might also include a study of the relations of quality or grade to the price obtained by the producer, the country buyer, the wholesaler and the retailer. In the nature of definite marketing research, very little study, according to the "Economic Analyst," has been devoted to the obtaining of facts on consumer preferences and competition with other commodities in overseas markets with a view to expanding the sale of Canadian export products in countries which now use but small quantities of these commodities.

**COUCH GRASS ERADICATION**

Couch grass is probably the most prevalent and most pernicious weed in Eastern Canada. It is a perennial, propagated to some extent by seed but more especially by underground root stalks, and is consequently extremely difficult to eradicate. Few people realize the enormous quantity of couch grass root stalks which may be found in the soil. According to investigations conducted at the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, the weight of roots has ranged from 1,531 pounds to 6,997 pounds per acre. This weight is equal to that of a very heavy crop of hay and helps to explain why it is so difficult to remove or kill all the roots. A booklet on the subject has been prepared by Dr. E. S. Hopkins, Dominion Field Husbandman and is issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, to those who desire it. In it the eradication of couch grass is thoroughly dealt with, the principles underlying the methods of attack and the methods of eradication themselves being explained in detail, as for example (1) removing the roots from the soil by cultivation and drawing off the field, (2) Starving the plant by removing of top growth, (3) Smothering the growth of the weed by a smother crop, (4) Drying the roots on the surface of the soil, and (5) Using chemicals to kill the plant. Ineffective methods are also described.

**THE VEGETABLE GARDEN**

The value of vegetables in reducing the food costs in the farm home is not fully realized, and because of his there are comparatively few good vegetable gardens around the average farm home. A crop value of \$30 for one-quarter of an acre of and in different vegetables is certainly not excessive, and taking for example one province alone, namely Nova Scotia, where there are 50,000 farm and garden holdings capable of producing crops worth this amount for household use only, the total amount would be equivalent to \$1,500,000. There are, of course, many essential details to which close attention must be given if success in vegetable growing is to be achieved but the management of these details is not beyond anyone who can form reasonable judgments in his undertakings. Further, in the questions as to the size of garden, location, preparatory tillage, maintenance tillage, commercial fertilizer, cool and warm-season vegetables, good seed, plan of garden, plan of plant-objects important items, full information is given in the publication "The Vegetable Garden" by W. S. Blair, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Kentville, issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

The stock yards at Williams Lake lie in the centre of a miniature empire, with the Cariboo country to the East and the Chilcotin country to the west. An idea of the size of this territory may be gauged from the fact that it takes three weeks to drive cattle from the stock yards from the more remote ranches, while the bulk of the cattle, which comes from the West of the Chilcotin River, takes ten days to make the trip.

**The Week's Work in Canada's Parliament**

The capital is still waiting for what it has been waiting for since the House prorogued — appointments.

Dame Rumour says they've all been picked by the Cabinet, Senators and all. But she'd only let out two names. Former Premier of Nova Scotia Gordon Harrington is likely to be the chairman of the new Unemployment Insurance Commission, president of Canadian Trades and Labour Congress Tom Moore the representative of employees.

Said to be settled, or nearly so, too was the names of those who will be named to the Wheat Board, but no names were forthcoming. John I. McFarland is likely to be the chairman, that is if his health recovers sufficiently.

Ottawa was happy this week. The Government announced the salary cuts ranging from \$60 to \$240 per year would be restored retroactive to April 1st, 1935, immediately. A special cheque for the months April, May, and June will be issued shortly to civil servants.

Prime Minister Bennett announced one of the main planks in the Conservative Party's platform. The full text of his statement issued to the press follows:

"Recent events and declarations by Provincial Ministers indicate that our Constitution must be reformed and amended if we are to be in a position to adequately deal with many problems that have arisen during the past few years. We have come to realize that social and economic problems have steadily become more and more matters of national concern. Because Canada accepted the obligations contained in treaties and conventions to which we subscribed, we were enabled, in the field of social security, to take more forward action at the last session of Parliament than was taken by all previous Parliaments since Confederation. A careful analysis, however the Privy Council decisions by competent authorities warrants the unmistakable conclusion that, in the field not covered by treaties and conventions, no substantial advance can be made without reforming and amending the Constitution.

"This task cannot long be deferred and is one which I propose to undertake without delay, after consultation with the Provinces, if I continue to be responsible for the conduct of Government in this country. Obviously, so far as we can at present ascertain, the provinces are all agreed that the Constitution must be amended. The only question is as to how far there should be a redistribution of powers between Provincial Legislatures and the Federal Parliament."

### HEALTH FROM THE GARDEN

The average garden supplies vegetables in abundance, perfectly fresh through the summer months, and also many which are easily stored either canned or raw for winter use.

A comparatively few persons eat sufficient vegetables. Minerals iodine, sulphur which neutralize the such as iron, calcium, phosphorus, acid condition of the blood, are found in proper combination as nature provides them in vegetables. Spinach, chard, lettuce, celery, tomatoes, carrots, cabbage, string beans, beets, parsnips, potatoes, radishes, onions, cucumbers, asparagus tips, turnips, peas and cauliflower all have varying amounts of available mineral matter. Leaf and stem vegetables are richer in calcium. Green vegetables are best sources of iron.

Vitamins, essential to health, are necessary for growth and protection from disease. Different vitamins are found in various foods. Vegetables usually served raw such as lettuce, cabbage and tomatoes are valuable sources while smaller amounts are present in all others.

Starch and sugar are found in potatoes, parsnips, beets, carrots, corn, peas and beans, and supply fuel and body heat and energy. Legumes (ripe peas, beans and lentils contain nitrogen and are used for tissue building. Another important function of vegetables is to supply fibrous material which is not digested, thus forming bulk or roughage and aiding elimination.

Points to be considered in cooking vegetables are preservation of color, flavor and nutrients. Most vegetables are best cooked in the smallest amount of water which can be used without burning the vegetables or they may be steamed. Have the water boiling when vegetable is put in the pot. Keep it boiling, not simmering, and keep closely covered. Salt added during the cooking preserves color. Baking without the addition of water is a good method in some cases but is not practical for many vegetables. To prevent strong flavors as in those of the cabbage family or onions, use a large amount of water in an uncovered vessel and boil for the shortest possible time for tenderness. Variety in the serving of vegetables from day to day aids in appealing to the appetite.
