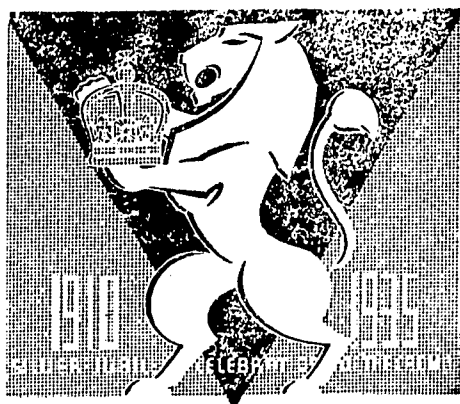

FARM JOTTINGS

COMBATING HOUSEHOLD PESTS

Since the opening of spring the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has been receiving from all parts of the Dominion the usual heavy mail containing inquiries regarding the common species of household insects, such as cockroaches, ants, silverfish, clothes moths, carpet beetles, fleas and other pests which have no wings but get there all the same. Ants have been plaguing householders in different provinces and overrunning gardens in Saskatchewan, where also specimens of the golden spider beetle were captured inspecting drug stores before any damage had been done. Silverfish have played havoc with the wallpaper around Hamilton, Ont., and chicken mites have invaded a

home in New Brunswick. In the same province carpet beetles made a great outward show recently by indulging in serried flights, but real damage as yet in the homes has been slight. Saw-toothed grain beetles, evidently possessed of an academic urge, made a massed attack on oats stores at Kemptville Agricultural School, Ont. From several districts in the various provinces come reports of invasions of homes by cockroaches from municipal dumps. Although the illustrated publication on household insects has been out of print for some time, full information can be obtained from the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, on how to combat those household pests, separate mimeographed instructions having been prepared on cockroaches, lice, clothes moths, bedbugs, fleas and other insects.

Imports of Canadian wheat to Italy are restricted, not only by the relatively high customs duties—over six dollars per 100 kilos—but also by the application of the wheat-mixing law. The latter is at present effective, and compels Italian millers to grind 99 per cent of both hard and soft Italian wheat, thus leaving only one per cent foreign wheat in the finished product. In spite of these difficulties Canada exported 24,512 metric tons of hard and 18,523 metric tons of soft wheat, and 15,594 quintals (220 pounds per quintal) of wheat flour to Italy in 1934.

Cherries picked at Fort Erie, Ont., were recently delivered in Winnipeg by airplane, the distance 1,185 miles being made in nine hours and 40 minutes.

For the 27 weeks ended July 4th, 1935, the number of hogs graded in Canada was 1,595,292, of which 537,749 were graded alive at stockyards; 1,020,019 alive at packing plants, and 37,524 by carcass.

The total number of pedigree certificates registered by the Canadian National Livestock Records, approved by the Dominion Minister of Agriculture, for the month of June, 1935, was 4,504, including 309 horses, 2,879 cattle, 244 sheep, 366 swine, 94 foxes, 590 dogs, one poultry and 21 goats.

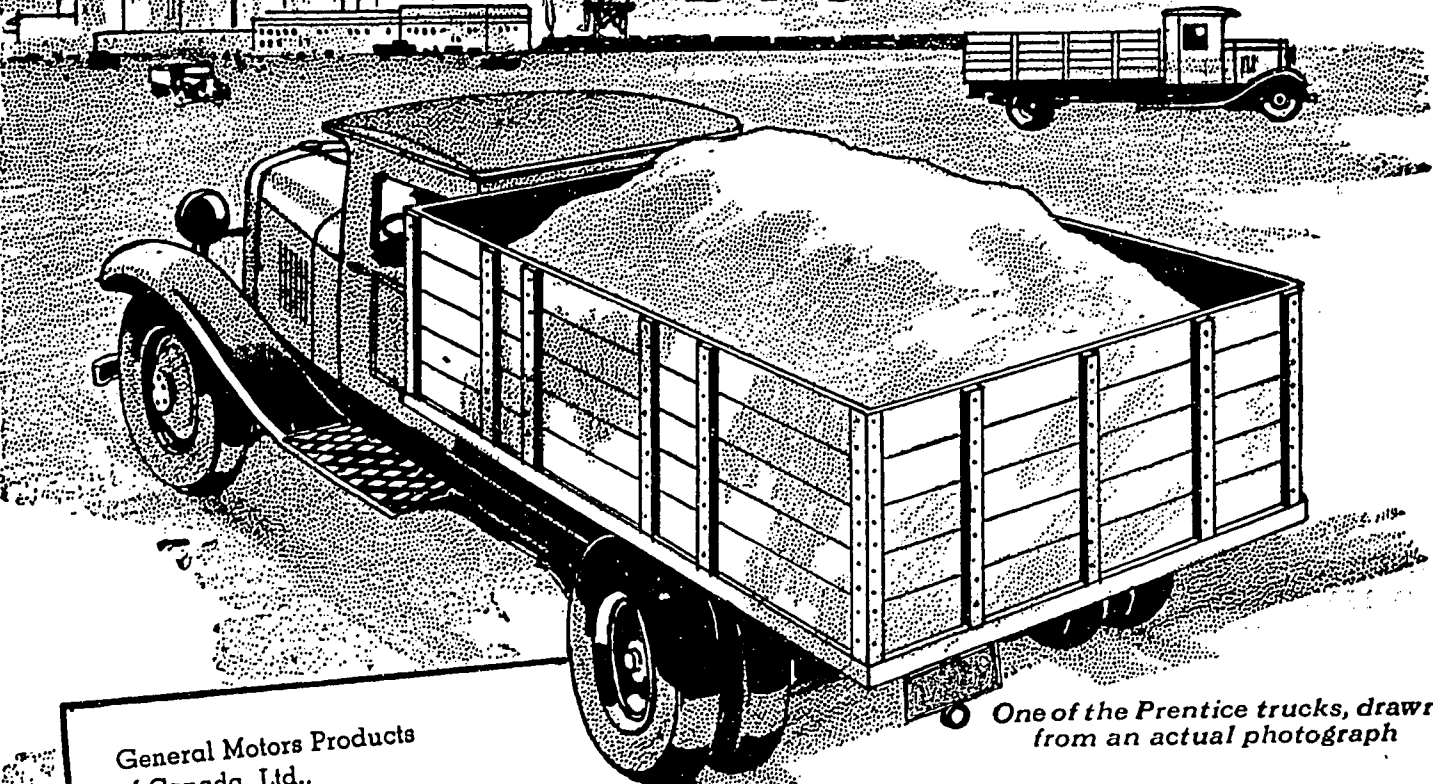

The Week's Work in Canada's Parliament

OTTAWA—Eight column streamer page one news throughout the Prairie Provinces, and maybe throughout all Canada, will be the announcement expected soon of a minimum price to be set by the Wheat Board for the new wheat crop.

The Prime Minister is holidaying on the Atlantic Coast. But he is expected back in the capital's sweltering heat soon, is expected to announce the personnel of the new Wheat Board, to call a meeting of its three members, with them set the figure every wheat grower is waiting to hear. What the minimum price for wheat under the new marketing set up will be, no one has ventured to guess. It will probably be 70 cents or over, Fort William.

Second big news the Prime Minister is expected to create is the announcement of a revised young men's cabinet, after dissolution of the 17th Parliament.

Mr. Bennett settled a few rumours before he left for his doctor's-order brief holiday in New Brunswick. He appointed ten new Senators, the three members of the Unemployment Insurance Commission and four judgeships.

Seven vacancies still remain in the Red Chamber, two in New Brunswick, three in Quebec and two in Manitoba.

Present Interior Minister T. G. Murphy has been slated for one of the vacancies in Manitoba.

Of more practical interest to the nation, however, was the naming of a strong trio to administer Canada's new Unemployment Insurance Act. Ex-Premier of Nova Scotia, Gordon, S. Harrington, Canadian Trades and Labour Congress' Tom Moore, and Montreal Insurance Man N. R. Baudet not only have the task of setting up and putting in motion the machinery for this Act in connection with the insurance scheme, but are charged with the duty of surveying the present unemployment scene and suggesting ways and means of improving that picture. Wide powers are given them for the latter task, making their responsibility even heavier.

Not officially announced but understood to be as good as settled is the trio to set up the Canada Wheat Board marketing machine. John R. McFarland, Manitoba Pool head Paul Bredt, and Vancouver exporter Robert McKee are expected to be announced shortly for this task.

Japanese-Canadian relations are in the melting pot. Prime Minister Bennett's answer to Tokyo's 50 per cent surtax on Canadian imports was a 33 1-3 per cent ad valorem surtax on Japanese imports entering Canada. Expert opinion is that Japan will back down on her bluff of this heavy impost, because she knows Canada knows she needs Canadian fish and lumber worse than Canada needs her toys and other manufactured goods.

BE CAREFUL WITH STAKING

Points important to the locators of mineral properties are summed up in a letter to the government agents sent out by F. C. Creach, surveyor-general of the Province. Calling attention to matters effecting the surveying of mineral claims he says:

"In the last two years about thirty field books have been received showing surveys of mineral claims where the records of the claims differ widely from the inscriptions on the locat.on posts. For example, the posts sometimes read 1500 feet to the right of the location line whereas the claim was recorded as 1500 feet to the left of the location line.

It is the belief of the survey branch after a full discussion that locations such as the above are invalid and that the acceptance of surveys of such claims may endanger the interests of innocent parties. In recognition of the fact that a few such surveys have been accepted in years past, thereby establishing a precedent for the surveyors, it has been decided to accept the field notes of surveys already made where they are otherwise satisfactory.

Field notes of future surveys of mineral claims where the notices originally written on the location posts differ materially from the record will not be accepted unless some aggrieved owner or surveyor applies for and gets an order from the court directing the surveyor-general to reverse his decision.

Locators so careless about their recording affidavits and purchasers who do not check location posts must bear the consequences of their own negligence and find their own solution.—Western Canada Mining News.

THE HIGH PRICE OF MOTORING

Twenty-two years ago British Columbia collected \$98,530 from registration fees on motor vehicles. Last year, the amount had increased to \$2,013,847, but the peak of collections was reached in 1929, when \$2,239,418 was collected from this source alone.

In addition to registration fees, gasoline taxation came into effect in 1923, in which year, with a tax of three cents per gallon, \$51,461 was collected. This tax was raised to five cents per gallon in 1930 when collections swelled to \$1,753,285. A further increase occurred in 1932 and the Province obtained seven cents per gallon.

Last year, with a tax of seven cents per gallon \$2,323,322 was shovelled into the Provincial treasury by motorists on their purchases of gasoline and, in the space of twelve years \$14,485,087 has been collected from the gasoline tax. Aggregate collections for registration fees (\$24,787,764) and gas tax (\$14,485,087) have amounted to \$39,272,851 since 1913 and 1923 respectively.
