### FARM JOTTINGS

#### EXPORT OF CATTLE TO CHINA

In view of the growing export trade of live Canadian cattle to China, the attention of Canadian breeders and exporters of dairy cattle and other live animals to China is drawn to the fact that new regulations similar to those imposed by the Shanghai Municipal Council regarding the entry of dairy cattle to that port, have been passed by the Chinese Government to apply to the whole of China for all classes and kinds of live animals from chickens to camels.

All importers to China of chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys and other domesticated animals, together with wild animals with close blood relationship to domesticated birds and animals, must submit, twenty-four hours before the animals enter port, an official application for inspection to the local Government Testing Bureau. The animals must also be accompanied by a certificate of inspection issued by the proper Government veterinarian of the country of origin.

These certificates of inspection must state (a) the name of the port of shipment from the country of origin, or district of origin; (b) that no infectious diseases (24 diseases are specifically mentioned in the Order) existed within a period of 60 days prior to shipment, and (c) the kind of animal, its conformation, marks, age, sex, the dates and results of the different tests before shipment for each head of the imported animals.

Should no such certificate accompany the animals, the latter will be quarantined, and, if found suffering from disease, destroyed.

#### CROPS AND SEED IN 1935

Crops this year have every indication of being of unusual growth in practically all parts of Canada. Much of the former drought areas of the Prairie Provinces is now reported as looking like a garden, and in only a few areas in any part of the country has there been insufficient rainfall.

A large crop of hay is now being harvested. Unfortunately in some districts quantity is being had at the expense of quality, for the heavy rainfall which has induced heavier than average growth, has made for poor haying weather which will inevitably result in damage to and partial loss of crop. Fields of cereals everywhere promise to be large but will probably be affected to

more than the usual degree by rust and smut. It is expected that in most provinces increased acreages will be inspected as seed crops with a resulting increased production of seed of the higher grades.

Seed crops of clovers and grasses, with certain exceptions, likewise promise favorable yields. A notable exception is alfalfa, an important seed crop in Ontario in former years but which, owing to drought for the past two years, is now greatly reduced in acreage, and only a small seed crop will be harvested as was the case last year. Alfalfa growth has been too rapid to promise much seed from the first crop, most of which has already been cut for hay, and the hope of a reasonable seed crop will be in the next cutting. The red clover acreage is below normal, but from present indications a fair seed harvest might be expected from the second cutting. Timothy is also promising and numerous inquiries are being made as to the prospective timothy seed market at the end of the year. The acreage of this crop to be cut for seed is said to be noticeably increased, particularly in the Province of Quebec.

#### VARIETY IN FEEDING STUFFS

Canadian live stock and poultry feeders have a wide range of commercial mixed feeds from which to select their requirements. For the year ended September 30th, 1934, there were 1,301 brands of mixed feed registered under the Feeding Stuffs Act.

Poultry feeds are much more numerous than feeds for other classes of stock and account for 935 brands or nearly 72 per cent of the total. Dairy feeds follow with 129 brands, calf meals with 64 and hog feeds with 43.

The increased production of high protein or protein and mineral mixtures to supplement and balance rather than to replace farm grown feeds has been a notable development in recent years. A few years ago such preparations were rare, while in the year under review they amounted to 108 brands. This trend is in keeping with the teachings of agricultural leaders and recognizes the farmers' need to balance rations with the minimum outlay for purchased foods.

In addition to these mixed feeds there were also registered some 278 brands of single feed materials such as tankage, meat scrap, fish meal, powdered milk and buttermilk, gluten feed, hominy feed, brewers' and distillers' dried grains, etc.

### The Week's Work in Canada's Parliament

OTTAWA—The Prime Minister is back. Ten days have been enough to give Mr. Bennett the needed extra energy to light into the campaign fast approaching. "Holidays" on Parliament Hill are over too. Right on top on the Prime Minister's memo pad are the preliminaries to the launching of the Dominion election campaign proper. There are some cabinet vacancies to be filled, the Wheat Board trio to be appointed and called to Ottawa for a first meeting and instructions, and then—dissolution of the present Parliament.

Number one loan under 1935 Bill No. 112 to assist in construction of new houses and slum clearing will likely be made this week. Requests for loans under the new Bennett measure have moved steadily into the Dominion Finance Minister's office since the Bill was given Royal assent last June. Accompanying them have been offers of co-operation from loan companies. First action to be taken to get the Bennett Housing machine moving will be the approval of the list of loan companies to work with the Government on the scheme.

Grinding tooth of the Bill is a fund of \$10,000,000 provided by the Government to assist builders of private dwellings or apartment houses.

The plan written into the legal phraseology of the Bill is briefly: the \$10,000,000 fund provides the first 20 per cent of the total cost of the structures contemplated, the loan company or municipality guaranteeing to advance sixty per cent on such terms and such ratio of interest as may be first approved by the Government. Obviously the remaining 20 per cent is to be put up by the builder.

The loan company or municipality advancing the 60 per cent, and the Government advancing the 20 per cent will take a joint first mortgage in the property as security for their money.

In addition to serving in a financial way, the scheme provides that an Economic Council, shall when required by the Governor-in-Council study, probe and report on (1) Housing conditions and the adequacy of existing housing accommodation, and the need for slum clearance, in any specific section of the Dominion; (2) any proposal submitted for a housing scheme from any urban or rural authority; (3) plans adopted outside Canada to improve housing conditions, and results; (4) factors interfering into house construction cost and efficiency.

While only amounting to \$10,000,000 in fact, the Bill was designed to start a building programme to the tune of \$50,000,000 across Canada. Reasons for such activity are obviously to help people living in slum quarters and to give needed living wage employment to those needing it.

### Canada Leads In Exports to Britain

Canada led the way over other countries during the first six months of this year in exports of many of her products to the United Kingdom, further indication that trade conditions are continually getting better. The commodities with which Canada topped the list were wheat, oats, flour, lobsters, copper ore and rods, crude zinc, non-ferrous metals.

Figures from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show that, holding first place in sales of wheat to the United Kingdom, Canada sent over 16,214,262 hundredweight in the first six months of 1935; Argentina was second, Australia third, and Romania fourth. The Dominion was first in wheat flour with 1,946,346 hundredweight, Australia second, France third and Italy was fourth.

The Dominion was not far behind other countries in some of her other principal commodities. We were second in cattle, bacon, hams, wood and timber.

In another phase of Canadian business—bank loans—early summer business activity was reflected in an increase in volume of loans for the month of June. The monthly statement of chartered banks issued by the Department of Finance showed call loans up \$3,500,000 compared with the month of May, current loans up \$7,000,000, current loans outside Canada up \$8,600,000. Note circulation was up \$7,000,000.

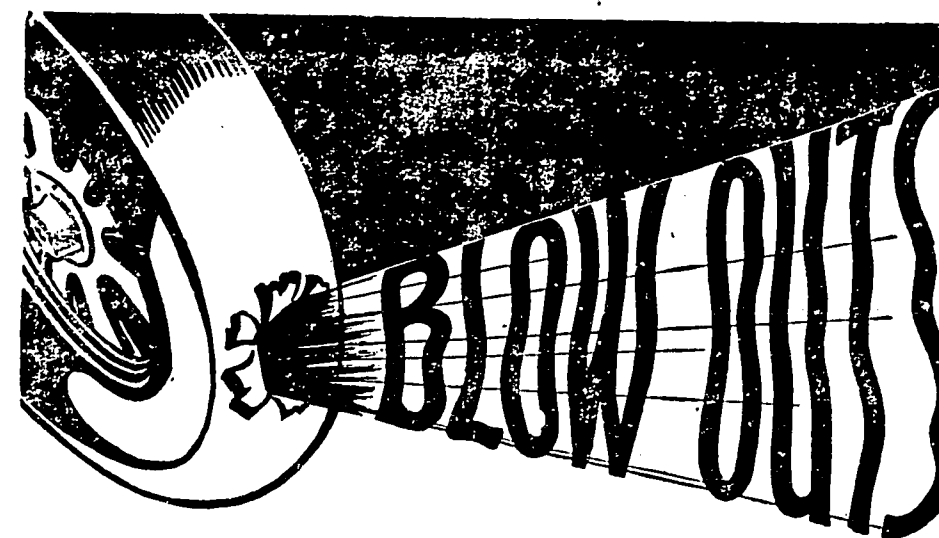

### REX VERSUS RAINO

In a case arising from a charge laid by the Village Commissioners, J. Raino was charged with operating a barber shop in the Village between July 15th and August 5th without being in possession of a licence, as required by the by-laws. He appeared before Magistrate Holt on Thursday.

The accused pleaded guilty. Constable Bradley, who prosecuted the case, pointed out that every merchant and business man in Quesnel had paid the licence in to the village clerk, or to him personally when he called upon them to do so. The only exception was accused. He had asked time to pay and had made no attempt to do so, so the Commissioners had instructed the clerk to lay a charge.

The Magistrate ordered the accused to pay the costs of the court and the amount of the licence, a total sum of \$8.75, with the alternative of a jail sentence of one month hard labour. Raino asked for leniency on the grounds that business was bad, but the court ordered the immediate payment of the money or the serving of the jail sentence. The maximum penalties for this offence are very severe, and it was felt in some quarters that the court had been very lenient.
