FARM JOTTINGS

PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR HOG MARKET

Prospects for the continued high prices for bacon hogs never looked brighter than at present. Quotations mounted to \$12 per hundred pounds at Chicago recently, the highest price since 1929.

This was brought about by a shortage of supply, being about 50 per cent of normal. U. S. Department of Agriculture statistics indicate that the hog marketing during the past six months has been the smallest, when compared with corresponding time of any year since 1910. There is a reduction of hogs slaughtered in Canada in 1935, under 1934, but not so marked as in the United States.

The export of Canadian bacon is up this year as compared with 1934. Improvements in quality of the export product is responsible for the increased demand for the Canadian product.

The Dominion Government, thru the Brood Sow Policy, is endeavoring to assist farmers throughout Canada in improving the quality of the swine produced, and increase the output of Canadian bacon. At present prices, or even lower returns, it would appear as though hog raising on a limited scale could be conducted profitably on many farms in Central British Columbia.

VALUE OF FARM EGGS

The value of farm eggs in Canada in 1934 was the highest recorded since 1931, and more eggs were laid than in 1933. This is all the more remarkable since there were approximately a quarter of a million less hens on the farms than in former years. Prices advanced in all the provinces and all provinces contributed to the increased valuations, although, so far as increased production was concerned, only Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia were responsible. The value of eggs in 1934 is placed at \$33,206,000, an average price of 15 cents a dozen, in comparison with \$27,577,000, or 12 cents a dozen in 1933. Thus the increase between 1933 and 1934 is \$5,629,000.

The Week's Work in Canada's Parliament

OTTAWA—On Wednesday Prime Minister Bennett called off a list of appointments as long as an arm. The most interesting of all was the naming of the Wheat Board.

John I. McFarland remains Canada's No. 1 wheat man. He is the chairman of the new Board set up by Mr. Bennett this session. With him will be D. L. Smith, of the Central Selling Agency, Winnipeg, vice chairman, and H. C. Grant, professor of economics, University of Manitoba. When they get their heads together and start doing things, wheat marketing history in Canada will start. What growers are waiting to hear is the minimum price they will name with the approval of the Government, for the 1935-36 wheat crop.

Another big "take" of news dished out by the Prime Minister was the appointment of our new Cabinet Ministers: J. Earl Lawson, K.C., Toronto, replaces Hon. R. C. Matthews as Minister of National Revenue; Col. G. R. Geary, K.C., Toronto, replaces veteran Hon. Hugh Guthrie as Minister of Justice, Mr. Guthrie having been named chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners a few days ago. Thirty-seven-year-old William Gordon Ernst, K.C., member for Queens-Lunenburg, N.S., Rhodes Scholar and athlete becomes Minister of Fisheries, and the youngest Cabinet Minister ever to be named in the history of the Dominion. The fourth Cabinet appointment goes to Samuel Gobeil, member for Compton, Quebec, and named Minister without portfolio.

MAJOR KING SPEAKS ON SCHOOL MATTERS

tions which Major King has placed before us.

It must not be felt that Major King is endeavoring to impose his scheme upon the community against its wish or better judgment, but rather to assist that judgment and to avail us of the advantages of his expert knowledge of the education of the young.

It is his opinion that character training forms an essential part of modern schooling. He has proved the truth of this in his work at the Kitsilano High School, an institution of 2,400 pupils and 80 teachers, which is the envy of many an older city than Vancouver. To provide for this attention must be given to physical training, in as many departments as possible, to the development of manual arts, such as metal work, woodwork and the like, to a practical study of domestic science, hygiene and home economics, to the encouragement of interest in hobbies as well as developments of such important features as music, literary interests and other fine arts. It is not to be expected that the new scheme, when incorporated, would make immediate provision for the development of all these branches of school work, but there are many it could include from its inception. Physical training for instance could be greatly advanced by a greater use of the local sports field and the Legion Hall, which facilities, Major King was assured, would be ready available. A small general shop is practically essential for furthering the development of manual arts. As the years pass more of the obvious advantages of character training will be able to be provided for.

The speaker pointed out that it would be obvious to all that the success of the scheme would depend, to a very great extent, on the selection of a first-class staff, a staff comprising teachers able to develop the plan to its fullest extent. He pointed the folly of the present Provincial plan of local trustees, and the almost insurmountable difficulties with which they were confronted in the selection of teachers. If Major King's recommendations are accepted in their entirety by the Government, and he is more than optimistic regarding the attitude of Victoria, the responsibility will no longer rest with local committees to select teachers, but will be the duty of a central committee of qualified educationists. That teachers of the requisite attainments, personality and character are available, few are better able to judge than Major King himself, and he is confident in this regard. The inability of the district to afford the payment of high salaries should not, in Major King's opinion, present an insurmountable problem, for he is confident, that at the outset, the development of the local school into a modern institution of high character will in itself constitute a challenge to exactly the type of teachers required; and success in an adventure of this kind, the development of a modern education centre at Quesnel, will be tantamount to a valuable promotion in the teaching profession. In closing, Major King commended his remarks to the citizens of Quesnel and urged upon them the importance of a most careful consideration of his recommendations in the light of the future requirements of the community.

A vote of thanks was accorded the speaker, and the appreciation of the audience was unanimously acclaimed. Mr. Vaughan added a word of sincere gratitude on behalf of the community and the school trustees.

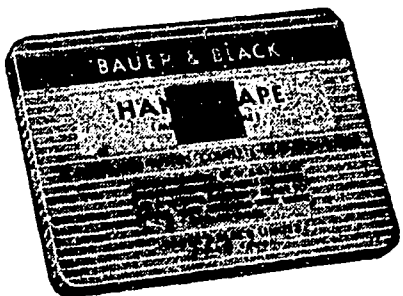

"Oinkless" Farms Profitable In U.S.

FIGS, HOGS, PORK, SWINE—

The farmers of Canada are rejoicing at the continued rising price of hogs. Elsewhere in this issue we publish an article on this subject, giving further details of the good news.

In the United States of America the farmers are also rejoicing about the state of the hog market, but for a different reason. In the good old U.S.A. it would seem that the payoff comes not from the hogs taken to market, but from those not shipped. Perhaps the following advertisement from a Joplin, Mo., paper will explain things better.

"Dandy way to make money: buy this 13 acres for hog raising. Sign up with the Government not to raise hogs. It will pay you \$1,000 not to raise, say, 500 hogs. That will pay for the acres and have some left."

This idea should immediately be extended to Canada. Take as an instance the case of a farmer in Cariboo. He has a pasture and enough feed for raising a certain number of hogs. He then writes to the Government stating that he will positively not do any such thing. He further states that he has had experience of not raising hogs in every province in the Dominion including Yukon, North West Territory and the Barren Lands, but unfortunately, before he saw the Light he raised a few hogs in B.C. He hopes this will not count against him and promises not to err again. A good and grateful Government then at once mail him a substantial cheque and commend him as a shining example to his fellow men. By the next year he will have cleared more land and grown more feed and will be in a better position than ever for not raising hogs.

And thus after a life of hard work and diligently not raising hogs, he will retire to a life of ease and plenty.
