Water Notice
Use and Storage

TAKE NOTICE that I. I. Felker, whose address is Barkerville, B.C., will apply for a licence to take and use 30 cubic feet per second, and to store about 80 acre feet of water out of Lightning Creek, which flows westerly and drains into the Cottonwood River, about four (4) miles above Cottonwood House.

The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about 1,500 feet above Milk Ranch Pass, and will be used for mining purposes upon the Placer Leases described as Nos. 2304, 2710, 2711, 2912, 2913 and 3034.

The storage-dam will be located at Milk Ranch Pass. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 80 acre feet, and it will flood about ten (10) acres of land. This notice was posted on the ground on the 17th day of August, 1935.

A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto and to the "Water Act" will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Barkerville, B.C.

Objections to the application may be filed with the said Water Recorder or with the Comptroller of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C., within thirty days after the first appearance of this notice in a local newspaper.

**Engineer From Rocky Mountains
Becomes Deputy Minister of Interior**



Keen outdoor man, enthusiastic member, and a past president of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies, and a leading stalwart in the ranks of the Trail Hikers, J. M. Wardle, chief engineer, National Parks of Canada, has won well deserved promotion to the post of deputy minister of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa.

Although only in his "forties", Mr. Wardle has been rated as one of the most efficient officers

of the Department of the Interior for many years. He was born in Chilliwack, British Columbia, on June 26th, 1888, receiving his education at New Westminster, B.C., and Queen's University, Kingston, where he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science. Mr. Wardle joined the Department of the Interior in 1913, and was appointed Superintendent of Banff National Park in 1918, continuing in that office until 1920, when he was transferred to Ottawa as an engineer in charge of National Parks construction. He was given the post of chief engineer in 1923.

An expert on mountain highway construction, Mr. Wardle has supervised the building of practically all main highways in the National Parks of Canada. Under his direction the Banff-Windermere highway, the first motor road across the Central Rockies, was completed in 1923.

and in 1927 the road known as the Kicking Horse Trail, from Lake Louise, Alberta, to Golden, British Columbia, was also completed. He has supervised the building of the "east leg" of the Big Bend highway along the Columbia River from Donald, B.C., to Boat Encampment, and recently was placed in charge of the construction of the "west leg" from Revelstoke, B.C., north to Boat Encampment. This highway when completed will form the final link in the western section of the trans-Canada highway.

The latest highway project to come under Mr. Wardle's supervision was the road now under construction from Lake Louise to Jasper, Alberta. Mr. Wardle has also had charge of all other construction work in the National Parks. He takes over his new duties with the best wishes of his many friends in the Rockies, and, indeed, throughout Canada.

FARM JOTTINGS

VALUE OF CREAM DESSERTS

Cream desserts, whether whipped, moulded, or frozen, are the most popular of all items on the menu, and the cost of making them, particularly when one knows how, is comparatively small in relation to the nourishment they supply. No matter what the other ingredients may be, cream makes the dessert a dish of high food value. Although cream varies in composition according to its percentage of fat, all cream, like other fats, furnishes heat and energy to the best food sources of vitamins A and D. Vitamin A is essential for the promotion of growth in the young, and the total absence of this vitamin in food causes cessation of growth, wasting, and lowered resistance to infectious diseases. Vitamin A also aids in the assimilation of essential minerals in foods. Vitamin D prevents rickets, cures skeletal diseases, hastens the healing of fractures, promotes normal teeth development and prevents dental decay. Insufficiency of vitamin D in a mother's diet injuriously affects the future structure of the permanent teeth of the offspring. In the booklet on Cream Desserts, just issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, will be found much valuable

information and many recipes for making desserts, any of which will add materially to the value and enjoyment of meals.

DANGERS OF FUMIGATION

While it is admitted that fumigation by hydrocyanic gas is a very effective method of dealing with objectionable household insects, the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has issued a warning in the booklet on how to combat household pests. Hydrocyanic acid gas is one of the most effective fumigants known, says the booklet, and may be employed without fear of injury to furniture, fabrics, and other household goods and equipment, but the gas is extremely poisonous to animals and human beings. It should be used only by intelligent and careful persons fully aware of its dangerous properties, and preferably equipped with gas masks. As a matter of fact in Ontario, the fumigation of dwellings may be undertaken only by licensed operators in possession of a permit issued by the Provincial Department of Health. Similar restrictions are now in force in Montreal, and other municipalities are following suit. Owing to the exceedingly dangerous character of this gas, only buildings which have been completely vacated, should be fumigated. It would be highly dangerous to fumigate partially occupied semi-detached houses or single rooms or

apartments in occupied buildings. Full directions are given in booklet, but the other and less cumbersome methods of destroying the household pests which are explained in the booklet will be of more practical interest to most occupiers of homes.

BROWN HEART IN TURNIPS

The nature, cause and prevention of brown heart in turnips has been under investigation by the Dominion Department of Agriculture since 1928 when this disorder was found to be responsible for losses amounting to \$50,000 in Prince Edward Island alone. Its destructiveness in 1934 showed an increase over previous years. Typical symptoms may be found in turnips ranging in size from seedlings to large roots. Brown heart is detected only by cutting into the turnip and it is recognized as a well-defined brownish and mottled central area, frequently characterized by concentric rings. The condition of the disorder varies with the intensity of the attack. Freshly cut affected turnips are water soaked in appearance. It has been demonstrated experimentally and otherwise, says the 1931-2-3-4 report of the Division of Botany, Central Experimental Farm, that the presence of lime in the soil favors brown heart. Increases in brown heart in turnips varied in direct proportion to the amount of lime in use. The disorder is retarded appreciably by applications of manure to turnip land, although it has not been demonstrated that manure alone will accomplish much towards solving the problem where land is abundantly of the brown heart type. Borax proved highly beneficial, used at the rate of one pound per acre and increasingly so up to 15 pounds per acre. On a commercial basis, control was less positive when the borax was mixed with the fertilizer and applied by means of a machine seeder.

**DE WOLF HOPPER, NOTED ACTOR
DIES AT KANSAS CITY**

Word was received from Kansas City that De Wolf Hopper, noted actor, had died in that city at the age of 77. The veteran actor was taken ill after a radio broadcast in which he was taking part, and was removed to St. Luke's Hospital where he died at 6 a.m.

Although intended for law by his parents, and after spending six months in a law office, he decided to make the stage his career. He played in London and starred in most of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas, and from 1921 to 1925 headed a company which revived these famous plays. One of his most famous roles was the recitation of "Casey at the Bat." He once recited this thrilling epic and so great was its success that 13,000 times thereafter he related the mock tragedy of how there was gloom in Mudville after the mighty Casey struck out.

Mr. Hopper had been married six times and had figured in five divorces.

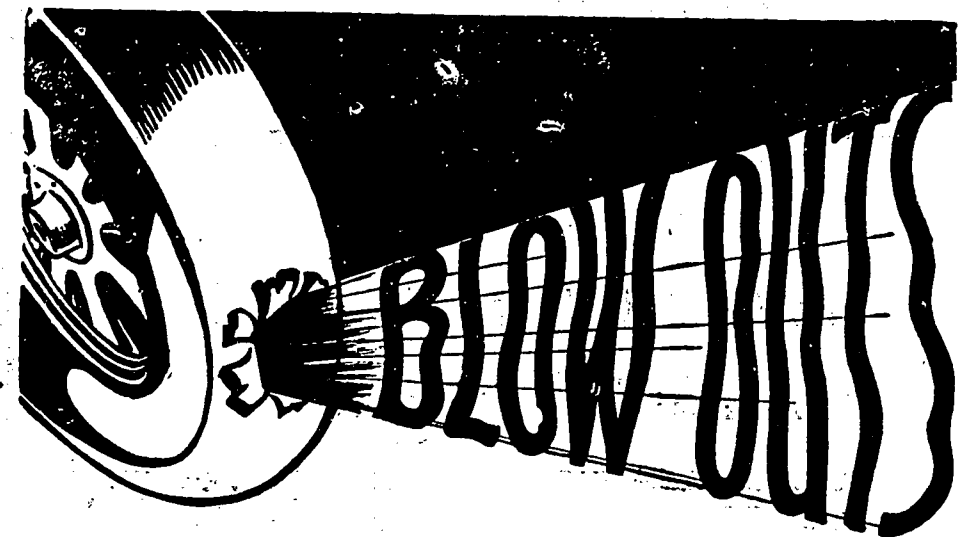

RECONSTRUCTION CANDIDATE SPEAKS TO LOCAL AUDIENCE

Mr. Fred Clarke, Stevens Reconstruction candidate for the Cariboo Federal Riding, addressed a meeting in the Rex Theatre last Tuesday evening. Mr. Blair occupied the chair.

Mr. Clarke began his remarks by reviewing the parties taking part in the election, and all came in for a good deal of criticism. In the past Mr. Clarke stated the country had been governed by capitalists and controlled by financiers. The Liberal Party had years of misconduct behind it and the policy held out to the electors today was no better. The Bennett administration, according to Mr. Clarke, had left behind it a record of incompetency and disregard for the masses; while the C.C.F., he claimed were unstable and could not function. "The only hope," said the speaker, "is the Reconstruction Party with Mr. Stevens at the head."

Mr. Stevens had refused to be muzzled by Mr. Bennett at the time of the Price Spreads probe, and now, at the request of thousands of Canadians, he was heading the Reconstruction Party, which, Mr. Clarke felt certain, had the Divine Hand guiding it. The Party was not composed of politicians but of men who have stepped out of civil life, and Mr Stevens, their head, was a crusader who had no selfish desires to satisfy.

The aim of the Reconstruction Party was the subjugation of capital to the needs of the people. They would abolish waste and dishonesty in Government. Would encourage prospectors by enlarging the biological department but not by subsidy. They would implement the establishment of a Central Bank. The Dominion Government would collect all taxes, thus avoiding waste. All chain stores would be taxed separately, and so prevent evasion of taxes. Tariffs would be so arranged as to protect the worker and trade agreements with other countries would be reciprocal.

Mr. Clarke stated that the railways systems of Canada were "an example of duplication and waste" with "high salaried officials wasting the people's money."

The British North America Act was referred to by the speaker and he said, "Mr. Stevens and I have no fault to find with it—minor changes are needed, that is all."

Mr. Clarke touched on such vital questions as the exploitation of women and children, war veterans, the small salaried office worker, economy, the wheat export, etc.

In conclusion Mr. Clarke told his hearers that Mr. Stevens would die fighting for the people of Canada and it was up to them to fight for the man who was fighting for them.
