CANADA'S MARCH FORWARD

The statistical bureau of the League of Nations has just issued an analysis of world trade figures. This is what it shows:

1. That during the past four years Canada's record in maintaining her foreign commerce has been surpassed by only one of the great world trading nations, namely, Japan.
2. That while world exports during the past four years have declined 57.1 per cent, on a gold dollar basis, Canada's exports on the same basis declined but 49.9 per cent.
3. That whereas Canada's exports, on the gold dollar basis, have shrunk by 49.9 per cent, those of the United States have diminished by 66.9 per cent, of the United Kingdom by 57.2 per cent, of Germany by 65.8 per cent, of France by 58.4 per cent, of Italy by 58.1 per cent.
4. That in volume of goods Canada contributed 3.71 per cent of the total world exports in 1929 and 3.09 per cent of the total world exports in 1934.
5. Figures such as these cannot

be dismissed. What they show, and incontrovertibly, that in the manner of trade, which is the foundation of employment, Canada in these years has been doing better than any other nation in the world, with one exception, Japan, where low wages create especially favorable opportunities for exports, has surprised us, though only slightly. What they show also is that in volume of sales, in the quantity of goods moving, decline in our trade is much less than assumed. In that respect, comparatively speaking, is even better than when tested by values. By things we could not control.

THE HOUSEWIFE

Cheese Tea Biscuits

Mix and sift 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt and 4 teaspoons baking powder. Work in 2 tablespoons butter and 1/4 pound grated Canadian cheese. Add about 2-3 cup milk, enough to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board, roll about 1/2 inch thick and cut in very small rounds. (Place 3 of them together to form "clover leaf" biscuits, if desired.) Bake in a hot oven 12 to 15 minutes.

Potatoes Suzette

Wash 6 medium-sized potatoes carefully. Bake in a hot oven. Remove the top of each potato. Scoop out the inside, taking care not to break the shell. Press the potato through potato ricer, add 1/2 cup hot milk or thin cream, 2 tablespoons melted butter (melt the butter over hot-water so that it will not brown at all) and salt and pepper to taste. Beat until very light. Press lightly into shell almost to the top, break an egg into each potato, dust with paprika and sprinkle with bread crumbs that have been mixed with grated cheese and bake in a moderate oven just long enough to brown the crumbs. (For 6 potatoes use about 6 or 8 tablespoons fine buttered bread crumbs and 1 tablespoon grated cheese).

Petticoat Tails

From an old Scotch lady comes this delicious recipe for shortbread. Cream 1 pound butter and gradually add 3/4 cup powdered sugar and beat until smooth. Rub in 4 cups pastry flour and 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg until perfectly blended. Line shallow baking pans with waxed paper and pack the mixture about 1/2 inch deep into the pans. Bake in a moderate oven until delicately browned. Just before it is done, work into wedges with a fork. Serve with hot coffee or tea. Another recipe is as follows: Beat 1/2 pound butter until creamy. Beat in 1/4 pound fine sugar and blend well. Then work in 1 pound sifted pastry flour and work until smooth. Shape on a brea dboard into two round balls. Press into circle or roll about 8 inches in diameter and about 1/2 inch thick. Cut out a small round from the centre. Pinch the edges with fingers or press with fork. Place on buttered baking pan and bake in a hot oven about 5 minutes. Reduce heat and finish baking in a moderate oven. (If desired, just before baking, sprinkle the top with caraway dainties or decorate with angelica and candied cherries).

Crullers

Cream 1/4 cup butter and add 1 cup sifted sugar gradually. Add 2 well beaten eggs. Mix and sift 1 cup flour with 3/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg and a few grains salt. Add alternately with 1 cup milk to the first mixture. Add additional sifted flour to make a dough that can be handled. Turn out on lightly floured board, roll about 1/2 inch thick and cut into strips. Twist and fry in hot deep fat. Drain on unglazed paper and when cold put in a paper bag with a little powdered sugar and shake well.

Oyster Omelet

Chop 12 fine oysters. Melt 2 tablespoons butter, add 1/2 tablespoon flour and blend well. Add a few grains pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 cup thin cream and stir constantly until creamy and smooth. Add 6 well beaten eggs and the chopped oysters. Cook as plain omelet.

Lemon Cup Cakes

Cream 1/2 cup butter and add 1 cup sugar gradually. Beat in 4 eggs, one at a time. Add the juice of 1/2 lemon and a little grated lemon rind. Add 1 1/4 cups flour sifted with 1/4 teaspoon and 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon soda. Turn into buttered and floured muffin pans and bake in a moderate oven about 25 minutes. When cold cover with plain or lemon icing.

Prise Layer Cake

Make a thick sponge cake or gold cake according to the recipe. When cold, cut in 5 layers. Put together with chocolate cream filling and cover with quick chocolate frosting.

Lord Baltimore Cake

Cream 1/2 cup butter and add 1 cup sifted sugar gradually. Beat until creamy and smooth. Add 8 well beaten egg yolks and the grated zest of 1 orange and beat until creamy. Mix and sift 1 3/4 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder and a few grains salt. Add alternately with 1/2 cup milk to the first mixture. Bake in 3 buttered and floured layer cake pans in a moderate oven.

Filling and Icing for Lord Baltimore Cake

Mix 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 egg whites, 5 tablespoons light corn syrup in top of double boiler. Mix well and place over rapidly boiling water. Beat vigorously for 5 minutes with a rotary beater. Remove from heat and continue beating until stiff enough to spread. Add 1/2 cup fine macaroon crumbs, 1 cup nut meats, 1-3 cup chopped candied cherries and 1-3 teaspoon vanilla and about 4 drops of orange extract.

Broiled Tomatoes

Select 6 or 8 firm round tomatoes and cut into slices about 3/4 inch thick. Sprinkle with salt and paprika, place in a greased broiler and broil over moderate fire until tender. Carefully turn one time during cooking. Add melted butter to taste and serve immediately.

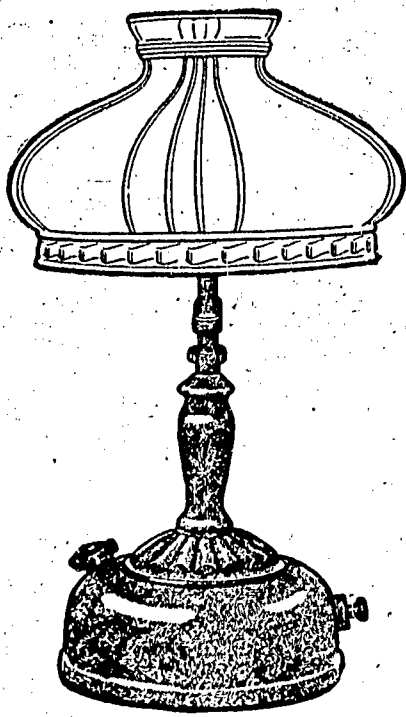

**LOCAL SCHOOL PROBLEMS
AIRED AT BOARD OF TRADE**

(Continued from page 1)

only for present needs, but also for circumstances which may, or may not, arise in the next ten years; for all are agreed that a new building is the first essential in effecting a solution of the present problem. The total cost of a new school cannot as yet be correctly estimated as the type of building most to be desired has not been determined, and the government has not been able, so far, to supply us with plans for buildings to accommodate the recommendations of Major H. B. King. These recommendations appeared in detail in The Observer for August 24th, 1935. But since it is possible that the ambitions of Dr. Weir and Major King may yet be realized, Quesnel must bear in mind these plans in any scheme of reconstruction, and a fair estimate of the cost of buildings which would incorporate the King plan would be about \$25,000.00. Considered in all its aspects, the plan, taken as a whole, would be greatly beneficial to the Village of Quesnel and the surrounding districts, and so the figure stated is not an over-estimate of the amount to be raised for school re-building. Towards this sum a grant of \$5,000.00 is guaranteed by the Provincial Government; further, we have a promise that the Minister of Education will do all in his power to obtain for us a further grant not exceeding 13-3 per cent of the total cost, making at the most a possible grant of \$8,000.00. There is in a local reserve an amount not exceeding \$2,500.00, so that the most conservative estimate of the balance to be raised is \$14,500.00. It is a large sum, and can only be raised by means of a loan, or the floating of a ten or twelve year bond issue, with a guarantee by the Provincial Government. But any plan of reconstruction, no matter how modest, will double the mil. rate at the very least. Ambitious as we may be for further increase in tax-paying population, the estimate can only be based upon the present number of ratepayers, and the existing amount of assessable property. In other words, the problem is for the present residents of Quesnel to tackle, having in mind only the most conservative aspect of future growth, but not losing sight of the possibility of increased school population.

It will be more than encouraging if we can look forward to the inclusion of West Quesnel School in the Quesnel School District, and the proposed school conditions will do much to make this possible. It is a problem then for our neighbors of the West Side also. They must help to solve it. A fifth teacher at the Quesnel Superior School, necessitating an extra room, cannot be obtained for less than \$1,200.00. This cannot be taken out of the existing reserve; it must be voted by the tax-payers. There, then, is the problem which is facing the people of Greater Quesnel. How is it to be solved? It can only be solved by the united, and disinterested efforts of every member of the community. Write to your paper; attend the Extraordinary Meeting on October 12th; assist your Board of Trade, and in all things be loyal to the School Trustees elected to serve you.
