### FARM JOTTINGS

#### CANADIAN FERTILIZER SUITED TO ALL CONDITIONS

Interesting information for farmers is contained in the Chemicals and Allied Products report relating to the fertilizer trade in Canada from July 1, 1933, to June 30, 1934. The report on the fertilizer trade of Canada is compiled annually by the Mining, Metallurgical and Chemical Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the Fertilizer Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, in order to assist manufacturers and importers, and incidentally the farmers who buy this product in gauging the market for future requirements. It is encouraging, states the report, to note the marked improvement in the fertilizer trade in Canada during the period under review, when compared with the preceding twelve months. Production of fertilizers in 1934 totalled 344,953 short tons, of which 119,795 tons, or 34.7 per cent, were mixed fertilizers, the total tonnage produced being 29.5 per cent higher than in 1933. The three principal materials sulphate of ammonia, and ammonium phosphate, showing greatly increased production. Tankage, bone meal, dried blood, and fish meal were also made in larger quantities. Among the mixed fertilizers, the one having the largest sale contained

two per cent nitrogen, 12 per cent phosphoric acid, and six per cent potash. This mixture was sold in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec only, Ontario taking the much larger proportion. A 4-8-10 mixture represented more than half the total sales in Prince Edward Is and. The favored mixtures in Nova Scotia were: 4-8-4, 4-8-7, 2-10-4, 5-10-5, and 9-5-7. Of the total New Brunswick sales, 34 per cent were on a 4-8-13 basis, and considerable quantities of the mixtures 4-6-10, 5-8-12, and 5-9-8 were also sold. Sales in Quebec and Ontario consisted of many different mixtures, depending upon the requirements of the crops and soils. A marked preference was shown in British Columbia for a 3-10-8 mixture, a grade not sold in any other province, except for one ton recorded as being sold in the Prairie provinces.

#### DUTY FREE CHEESE NEEDS CERTIFICATE OF ORIGIN

According to the Canada-United Kingdom Trade Agreement, 1932, it is necessary for exports of Canadian cheese to be accompanied by the United Kingdom Certificate of Origin form 120 (sale), in order to enter duty free as compared with a rate of 15 per cent ad valorem leviable on non-Empire cheese. This form, writes the chief Canadian Trade Commissioner in Great Britain, is designed to be completed by the manufacturer of the cheese. In the case of shipments made up of parcels of cheese collected from a number of manufacturers, and where it is impracticable to obtain certificates from each manufacturer, the British customs for some time past have been accepting certificate 120 (sale) when signed by Canadian Government dairy produce graders, provided the grader is in possession of the facts relating to the manufacture of the cheese and is in a position to give the required certificate.

Licences may be procured from Post Offices in cities and larger towns, Departmental Radio Inspectors, Radio Dealers, and others authorized to issue licences on behalf of the Department, or from Radio Branch, Department of Marine, Ottawa, Ont.

estimated at 13,354,300 bushels compared with the low yield of 5,423,000 bushels in 1934. Similarly the 1935 flax seed production is estimated at 1,636,100 bushels compared with the 1934 production of 910,400 bushels.

A 23 per cent increase in the production of hay and clover in 1935 for the whole of Canada is estimated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The combined yield of these crops was 13,788,000 tons compared with 11,174,000 tons in 1934. Most of the increase is accounted for by good harvests in Ontario and the Prairie provinces.

Although Scotland's population is only one-eighth of that of England, the consumption of Canadian flour in Scotland is actually greater than that of England. On the other hand the imports of Canadian wheat into Scotland are about one-fifth of those of England.

According to the regulations of the Fruit, Vegetables and Honey Act of Canada, the grades of potatoes intended for sale in Manitoba and Western Canada are No. 1, Canada No. 2, Canada No. 3 and Canada Fancy. These grades for Ontario and Eastern Canada are E. Canada No. 1, E. Canada Large, E. Canada Fancy, E. Canada No. 2 and E. Canada No. 1 Small. The last grade is for shipment out of Canada only.

About 90 per cent of Canadian wheat is contained in the Scottish-milled flour used by the bakers of Aberdeen, Scotland.

The quality of the 1935 Canadian western wool clip is reported as being particularly good and consignments for shipment to Great Britain via the Panama canal are slightly larger than a year ago.

The amount of creamery butter produced in Canada during the first nine months of 1935 was 194,704,168 pounds, compared with 191,356,694 pounds in the corresponding period of 1934. This represents an increase of 1.7 per cent for the period.

The 1935 production of oats is estimated at 449,297,000 bushels—a 40 per cent increase over the 1934 harvest of 321,120,000 bushels. The 1935 barley crop is also estimated much larger than that of 1934, namely 94,550,000 bushels compared with 63,742,000 bushels in 1934—an increase of 48 per cent.

### Ottawa Week

The elections are not quite over. Mr. Taschereau, premier of Quebec was expected to bring on his elections immediately after the federal contests. But he has decided to wait a little while yet. The provincial record of that province is one of unwavering devotion to the Liberal Party. They came into office there in 1897. Several premiers have come and gone, but the government has been controlled by the Grigs.

Canada's diplomatic offices have not developed what are known as "career" men. Hon. Philippe Roy in Paris and Sir Herbert Marler in Tokio seem to be permanent fixtures, otherwise the external jobs seem to change with the governments. Lord Strathcona was an exception. Mr. Vincent Massey has long been earmarked for the job in Trafalgar Square.

The sanctions affair naturally demands a lot of caution. Canada is a member of the League of Nations and the League has unanimously decided to boycott the aggressor. But the sanctions are only economic and not military. The Canadian cabinet will not take any drastic steps without consulting the parliament—if not the people.

Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce and chairman of the wheat committee, contradicted rumours that the government intended to sell the wheat now held by the Winnipeg wheat board at sacrifice prices. "Under the law the committee has complete control over the selling policy of the grain, but we will not do anything drastic," he said. The denial is believed to have been prompted by a representative from Winnipeg to the committee, who stated that the uncertainty of the situation was having a depressing effect on the market.

#### Getting Even

A farmer on holiday in the city was charged two shillings for a shave and haircut. Stroking his chin in reflection, he remarked to the barber on the horde of flies covering the ceiling and walls.

### Cariboo's Grand Old Woman 84 Years Old

At Cottonwood House on the Barkerville road, famous stopping place since the early gold rush days, there was a celebration Sunday of the eighty-fourth birthday of Mrs. Janet Boyd, Cariboo's grand old woman, who reached Coldspring House, four miles above the present stopping place, as a bride in 1868. This celebration is the sixty-seventh that has taken place at the two houses. Always there has been a birthday cake but not always have there been sufficient candles for it. Last year the cake was only partially decorated, due to a shortage of birthday candles in Quesnel. This year, however, the seven dozen were on hand in time.

Mrs. Boyd is enjoying splendid health, feeling better, in fact, during the past few months than for a year or two previously. She raised ten children at Cottonwood House and Coldspring, forty miles from the nearest doctor or hospital. Three sons served in the Great War, two paying the supreme sacrifice. Her husband died twenty-six years ago. Surrounded by members of her family, including one daughter, four sons, a daughter-in-law and grandchildren, Mrs. Boyd, who in her long residence in Cariboo has been hostess to many notable men and women on their way to and from the rich diggings to the east, is happy and contented.

Another person whose birthday is being celebrated at Cottonwood is W. C. Slade, who has reached his seventy-sixth anniversary, on the same day. A close friend of the Boyd family since he came to Cariboo eighteen years ago, Mr. Slade is an old-timer in the mining fields of this continent. He staked and recorded the first claim on the beach at Nome. He is interested in the Slade Cariboo Gold Placers and other holdings on Lightning and its tributaries in the vicinity of Cottonwood House. — Vancouver Province.

#### FIFTY-TWO NATIONS APPLY SANCTIONS AGAINST ITALY

As from Monday, Nov. 18, Italy becomes an outlaw nation. 52 members of the League of Nations combined to boycott the country, only four nations refusing to join. These were Turkey, Albania, Austria and Paraguay, all of them unimportant economically. All goods have been held up from delivery to Italian ports and frontiers closed to Italian produce. In addition all loans to Italy, to Italian corporations, public bodies, and private individuals have been stopped. It now remains to be seen how long this country can hold out alone against the world in the face of this vast opposition.

#### Here and There

Fine percheron stallions, smartly groomed cavalry chargers of the mounted police, racing and pacing horses and mounts trained in jumping and for the hunting field mingle at the village of Montebello, P.Q., on the north shore of the Ottawa, for the annual Esiglorry Club Horse Show this summer during August 16-18, Thursday to Sunday. A musical ride will be put on by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The event is under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor-General and Canadian and American society folks are expected in large numbers.

Enjoying a short stay at the Beaufort Hotel on his way to taking up his post in London, His Excellency T. Matsudaira, Japanese Ambassador to Great Britain, stated to an interviewer, "I prefer just to enjoy myself and to forget for a few hours that there are more arduous duties than the contemplation of this lovely place."

Addressing a gathering of the Rotary Club of Victoria at the Empress Hotel, recently, Premier Joseph A. Lross, of Australia, pointed to the British Empire as a great force for peace and urged Canada to cultivate a more favorable trade with his own country. Last year, he said, Australia bought from Canada \$14,000,000 worth of goods, while Canada bought from Australia only \$4,000,000 worth.

The Algonquin Hotel, St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, New Brunswick, opened for the summer season at the end of June, and is now the centre of much holiday activity. Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Beasbrough were among the guests and the famous Ritz's Cove bathing beach is again as in former years very popular with the children and the younger set.

With the increasing popularity of vacation trips on the Great Lakes, the Canadian Pacific has expanded its Great Lakes steamship service to include calls at Port Arthur on westbound voyages as well as eastbound. These ships have been outfitted with deck sports, including quoits, shuffleboard and deck golf. Dancing and music bring pleasure to the evening hours. The schedule makes it possible to take an enjoyable week's trip going either way with overnight stops at both ends, Port McNicoll and Port William.

The Maritimes are again this year attracting a large number of tourists from Canada and the United States. Across the Bay of Fundy there is a very pleasant steamer trip from Saint John to Digby where the Pines Hotel is located and from Boston to Yarmouth with its well known Lakeside Inn, there are regular sailings. Also the Cornwallis Inn at Kentville is a first-class centre for trips to the famous Evangeline Country around Grand Pre.

August is the peak month at the Beaufort Hotel when between August 26-31 golf amateurs of the world will compete in the historic Prince of Wales Trophy and the Willingdon Cup.
