### REFUSED POST OFFICE

The Armstrong Advertiser announces that once again Armstrong and Kelowna share a like fate in having their representations for a post office put aside by Ottawa. Two petitions were sent from Armstrong, the Advertiser explains, one by the Board of Trade a year ago and one only recently, as well as numerous letters from the City Council and various other bodies. Although a personal representative was sent from Kelowna to press the matter at Ottawa, no action was taken to provide that city with a post office either.—(P.N.S.)

### PLEBISCITE ON SUNDAY GAMES

The prolonged controversy between ardent fans and dissenters for Sunday baseball at Riverside Park will be definitely settled by plebiscite on June 2nd. As Sunday ball games constitute the schedule of the Inter-or Baseball League, the Kamloops team have deterred as far to participate in the league, which commenced this week, because of a lack of adequate playing facilities for the visiting teams, the city by-laws prohibiting Sunday games in Riverside Park.—(P.N.S.)
