THE HOUSEWIFE

RED RASPBERRY JELLY

4 cups (2 lbs.) juice
7½ cups (3¼ lbs.) sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin
To prepare juice, crush thoroughly or grind about 3 quarts of fully ripe berries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to boil over hottest fire and at once add the bottled pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard half minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin at once. Makes about 11 glasses of six fluid ounces.

DRIED BEEF RAREBIT

6 shredded wheat biscuits
¼ pound dried beef
3 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon minced onion
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups canned tomato juice
1 cup grated Canadian cheese
3 eggs, well beaten
Salt

Cut up the dried beef, pour boiling water over it and then drain. Melt the butter in top of double boiler over direct heat. Add the onion and cook until tender. Then add the dried beef and cook 5 minutes. Next add the flour, stir well, add the tomato juice, and cook over hot water until smooth and thickened. Add the cheese and stir until melted. Add the eggs, stir well and cook two minutes. Add salt if necessary. Serve immediately on split shredded wheat biscuits, two halves to each person, which have been heated in a moderate oven for ten minutes. Serves six.

BAKED SPARERIBS WITH APPLES

Wipe fresh spareribs carefully with a cloth which has been wrung out of hot water. Arrange the meat in a dripping pan and place in a hot oven which should have temperature lowered gradually. Baste with dripping occasionally. When the meat is well browned place apples, which have been cored, in the pan with the meat. Fill the cavity of each apple with brown sugar and let bake until soft. In serving, arrange the apples in border around the spareribs.

SALMON AND CAPER SAUCE

2 slices salmon
¼ pound butter
½ teaspoon chopped parsley
1 shallot
Salt, pepper and nutmeg
Lay salmon in baking dish, place pieces of butter over it and add the other ingredients rubbing a little of the seasoning into the fish, baste. When done remove from fire and drain. Lay in dish and pour caper sauce over it.

BAKELESS PUDDING

One and one-third cups sweetened condensed milk
Juice 1 lemon
¼ cups graham cracker crumbs
2 eggs
Blend together sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice and well beaten egg. Stir until thick. Add graham cracker crumbs. Place in sherbet glasses. May be garnished with whipped cream and nut meats. Serves six.

FREE FERRY SERVICE SOUGHT

PENTICTON—The Okanagan Valley Boards of Trade are proposing that petitions be circulated throughout the entire valley to substantiate their demands upon the Government for free and continuous ferry service from Kelowna to Westbank the Penticton Herald reports.

The executive members of the various boards are preparing a brief to be presented to the government asking for free ferry service from six o'clock in the morning until midnight. After the hour moderate rates would go into effect.

In connection with improved facilities for travelers at the Canada border at Osoyoos the combined boards are asking that the customs officials be more courteous and that the office remain open longer throughout the summer months.

U. B. C. M. CONVENTION

VERNON—The Union of British Columbia Municipalities has selected Vernon as the scene of the annual convention to be held from September 20th to 24th inclusive, states The Vernon News after an interview with Mayor E. W. Prowse of that city. Some members of the convention preferred to have the convention transferred to Victoria to coincide with the Fall Session of the Legislature, but it was deemed advisable to have the executive of the Union wait upon the Government with measures and resolutions passed by the convention.

FAIR PLANNED FOR 1939

VANCOUVER—At a joint meeting representatives of the city council, the Vancouver Exhibition Association and the Golden Jubilee Committee machinery was set in motion for the holding in Vancouver in 1939 of a giant exhibition and manufacturers show that will bring exhibitors from all parts of the British Empire. It is anticipated that such a display would advertise the potentialities of Vancouver and British Columbia to the world.

CHILDREN OF THREE DEANS GRADUATED AT SAME TIME

VANCOUVER—A rare feat has been achieved at the University of British Columbia when three children of three faculty deans have been graduated by the same university at the same time, and from their respective father's departments.

A. degree; Margaret Buchanan, daughter of Dean Daniel Buchanan of the faculty of arts and science was graduated from her father's faculty; and Paul Clement, son of Dean F. M. Clement was awarded his bachelor of the science of agriculture.
