The mining industry of British Columbia is waiting with what little patience it has left for a similar statement of policy from Premier Pattullo, or his minister of mines, Hon. George S. Pearson. Shall we wait in vain?—The Western Canada Mining News.

CARIBOO SYNDICATE AWARDS CONTRACT FOR MORE TUNNEL
Contract for an additional 150 feet of tunnelling has been let by Cariboo Gold Syndicate, according to an announcement by syndicate managers.
The work will be carried out by C. Hanson, Olaf Mathison and Chas. Rouleau. About 100 feet of tunnel was completed last year and the total length of the adit is estimated at 1,092 feet.

This property is located on Van Winkle Mountain, about six miles from Stanley. A number of both A and B veins are exposed, with encouraging assays reported. The property is considered to hold great promise as it is located near the heart of the mountain from which the Last Chance and Van Winkle Creeks are thought to have derived their placer gold.
All men engaged by Cariboo Gold Syndicate have been local residents and the money expended has been considerable help to the Stanley area. A number of Quesnel men are quite heavily interested in the venture.

CARS DRIVING STRAIGHT HAVE MOST ACCIDENTS
According to the July issue of the Public Works Department bulletin issued at Victoria, the useless waste of life and property resulting from car accidents on roads has brought intensive study on the methods to improve highway transportation during recent years.
From an analysis of 3,000 accidents during the year 1934 it was shown that in 27 per cent of the cases the driver did not have the right of way: "Reckless driving," "wrong side of the road," "driving off roadway" and "falling to signal" follow with 11 to 7 per cent. Cars standing in roadway or car following too closely accounts for 18 per cent.
Cars going straight were involved in 69 per cent of all accidents; Weather is described as "clear" at the time of 63 per cent of accidents; "raining" during 21 per cent and "Cloudy and foggy" in 13 per cent.

FARM JOTTINGS
FOUR FACTORS DECIDE EGG QUALITY
In view of the fact that Canadians may claim the distinction of eating more eggs per capita than the people of any other country, the Poultry Services, Dominion Department of Agriculture, entitled "The Grading of Eggs According to the Canadian Standards" will probably be in popular demand. Canada is the only country in the world which has a system of egg grading controlled and supervised by the Government from producer to consumer. It is also interesting to point out that Canada was the first country to institute grading according to government standards. Grading was introduced in 1918 for eggs to be exported, and in 1923 the system was made applicable to domestic consumption.
"There are four factors which must be taken into consideration in determining the grade of an egg," states the pamphlet which is now available on application to the Poultry and Extension Branch Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. "These are interior quality, size, cleanliness and soundness of shell." The pamphlet proceeds to give in a brief and interesting way information as to how these factors are determined. It is a pamphlet that, not only those engaged in the business of handling eggs commercially will find invaluable, but householders also, for no article of food is more universally used and is more nutritious. An egg has 97 per cent of its edible portion digestible, and contains vitamins A, B, C, and D, and G, and several mineral elements including sulphur, phosphorus, iron, calcium and magnesium.

GRAIN SCREENINGS IN CANADA
Grain growers of Western Canada follow the practice of shipping most of the weed seeds and other foreign material harvested with the grain to terminal elevators. This foreign material, in addition to weed seeds, includes broken and shrunken grain, dirt, dust and chaff. As cleaned from the grain, these screenings contain a proportion of mustards and other unpalatable and

injurious weed seeds and a proportion of waste matter. They are accordingly separated and graded to provide several classes of feed material, and to prevent the distribution in Canada of material which is both unsafe to feed and dangerous from the standpoint of weed distribution.
Grain screenings shipped from Fort Willam—Port Arthur, Interior and Pacific coast terminal elevators during the crop year ending July 31st, 1935, totalled 149,560 tons of which 98,933 tons were billed for export. During the eight months ending March 31, 1936, 94,762 tons were shipped with 53,848 tons billed for export. Additional screenings were cleaned from grain at the farms, country elevators and mills, but no complete figures of quantities from these sources are available.
The type of screenings most popular with Canadian feeders is composed principally of broken and shrunken wheat and wild buckwheat and is known as No. 1 Feed Screenings. Screenings composed principally of wild oats have never attained great popularity in Canada nor is there much demand for any type of screenings from which they have not been largely removed.

Canadian agriculture and agricultural products form one of the outstanding features of the Canadian Government exhibition at the Great Lakes Exposition at Cleveland, Ohio. The Canadian section occupies a prominent position adjoining the grand staircase in the main building, having a fifty-foot frontage in the "Aisle of Flags." The exposition continues for 40 days, from June 27th to October 4th.

A Ministerial Order by the Dominion Deputy Minister of Agriculture states that the issuing of permits for the importation into Canada of cattle, sheep, goats, other ruminants, and swine from the British Isles will now be considered. This order removes the necessity for the detention of these animals in English, Scottish, or Irish quarantine stations prior to embarkation in importation into Canada were occasioned some time ago by an outbreak in Great Britain of foot and mouth disease which was promptly dealt with. Sixty days now have elapsed since the removal of the ban in Britain.

It is a native of the prairies and is found in hills and along streams from the Pembina mountains in Manitoba to the Bow river in the Rocky Mountains. In the Manitoba hills the tree grows to a height of 18 feet. It is generally armed with thorns.

15 PER CENT WHEAT CROP IS U. S. PREDICTION

The ravaging 1936 drought cut the nation's spring wheat crop to 126,314,000 bushels by July 1, the government crop estimate showed today. Damage during the past 10 days has been incalculable.

The 1935 spring crop was 159,241,000 bushels, a light year and the average production for spring wheat from 1928 to 1932 was 241,312,000. Spring wheat is the crop believed damaged most by the drought and President Roosevelt said estimates furnished him three days ago indicated not more than 15 per cent of the crop could be harvested. This indicates to some extent the damage that has been suffered since July 1, the last day that the current crop report includes.
