PINEAPPLE GRIDDLE CAKES
3 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
3 eggs
1 cup undiluted evaporated milk
1 cup pineapple juice
2 tablespoons melted shortening
Sift dry ingredients together. Beat eggs slightly with milk. Stir liquid into dry mixture, adding the pineapple juice last. Add melted shortening and drop at once by spoonfuls on a hot griddle. For thin cakes add more pineapple juice. Yields about 30 cakes.

MAGIC LEMON CREAM SAUCE
2-3 cup sweetened condensed milk
¼ cup lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Blend thoroughly sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice and grated lemon rind. Stir until mixture thickens. Makes about 1 cup.
Note: May be thinned with water to any desired consistency.

FISH STEW (FLORIDA STYLE)
Mix 1 quart fresh or canned tomatoes, 1 tablespoon salt, a few grains pepper and a few grains sugar and simmer with ½ tablespoon mixed spices for about ½ hour. Strain and add 2 tablespoons finely chopped pimientos or sweet red peppers. In a deep frying pan cook 1-3 cup salad oil with 2 crushed cloves of garlic and 2 minced onions. Do not allow the onion and garlic to brown. When they are soft add them to the tomato mixture. Sprinkle 3 pounds cleaned and boned fish with a little salt and cook on both sides in 1-3 cup salad oil or lard until delicately browned. Place the fish in the tomato mixture and add 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice. Simmer gently until ready to serve.

CORN CHOWDER
(North Carolina)
Boil 4 cups diced potatoes in 2 cups boiling water for 10 minutes. Cook 3 tablespoons minced onion with 2 tablespoons salt pork until well browned. Add with one No. 2 can corn to the potatoes and water. Simmer until potatoes are soft. Add 1 pint scalded rich milk, 1 tablespoon salt, a few grains pepper and, if desired, a little minced parsley.

STATE FAIR FRANKFURTERS
(Ohio)
Steam frankfurters. Drain, slit each one lengthwise, forming a pocket, and fill the pocket with well drained sauerkraut. Wrap a thin piece of bacon around each frankfurter. Secure in place with toothpicks. Place in wire broiler and hold over coals until bacon is crisp.

BROILED SARDINES WITH NOODLES
Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Season with cream or cream sauce, salt and grated American or Parmesan cheese. Serve with sardines that have been heated in a frying pan.

SAVORY BEEF BALLS
Have beef passed through meat-chopper three times. Form into small flat cakes. Roll in flour, season with a little salt and pepper and cook in saucepan with a little fat and 1 minced onion until lightly browned. Add 1 can condensed vegetable soup. Simmer gently until tender.

DEVILED CRABS
Melt 2 tablespoons butter, add 2 tablespoons flour and blend well. Then add 2 cups rich milk and stir constantly until smooth and creamy. Add the sifted yolks of 4 hard boiled eggs and season to taste with salt, paprika, 2 teaspoons lemon juice and, if desired, a suggestion of cayenne, mustard or tabasco sauce. Add 2 cups crab flakes and ½ cup sliced canned mushrooms. Reheat and serve immediately.

HORATIO WEBB HAS RUN HIS LAST FURROW
With the death of Horatio Webb, one of the best known men in provincial agricultural circles, Saturday, July 4th, on his farm at Sardis, British Columbia lost a respected pioneer of the Fraser River valley. A resident of the Chilliwack valley since April, 1870, Mr. Webb would often reminisce and tell of being employed first as a farm hand by Jonathan Reece, the only white farmer at that time. His recollections of the first revolving hay rake used in the valley proved most interesting. Mr. Webb will always be remembered as the promoter of the first plowing match held in 1873 and substantiating his practical ability, won first prize. His interest in every phase of community life and everything pertaining to agriculture extended far beyond his immediate residence and perhaps no man is so widely and favorably known in agricultural circles.—P.N.S.

TO PROLONG LIFE OF CUT FLOWERS
In keeping the home beautiful, no information is more appreciated than authoritative advice on how to keep cut flowers fresh. With this end in view, the Lethbridge Experimental Station of the Dominion

Department of Agriculture has assembled the essential facts of the art, both from their own horticulturists and from other authorities. Most flowers must be cut either early in the morning when the dew is still on them, or in the cool of the evening. Roses, peonies, dahlias and gladioli respond best when cut in the evening but it is to be remembered that dahlias must be cut in full bloom; iris, poppies and pinks in half bloom, and peonies when they show a good color. The "tip" about the bloom makes all the difference.

The method of cutting is also important. Slanting cuts with a sharp knife are the best. Shears crush or bruise the stem and thus the free rise of water through the stalks to the leaves and blossoms is impeded. One great advantage of slanting cut is that the stems are prevented from resting flat on the bottom of the vase and thereby checking the upward flow of water.

After the flowers have been cut, the next thing to do is to immediately soak them for several hours in deep, cool water. Their prolongation of life is helped by quick action the moment they are gathered. Thick-leaved flowers, such as stocks, snapdragons, zinnias, and petunias need at least 10 to 12 hours soaking before they are arranged in the vase. In the case of lilies, spirea, honeysuckle and other floral decorations of the woody sort, saturation by splitting, or pounding and scraping the stems before soaking. However, with reference to dipping stem in boiling water before being soaked in cold, there is still some doubt, although on occasions such flowers as poppies, hollyhock, mignonette and dahlias have benefited by this method.

Nearly everyone knows that cutting the stems of arranged flowers once a day helps to prolong their freshness, but in this regard one common mistake is made: the cutting must be done under water. This prevents air bubbles from forming in the stems and preventing the free flow of water. Adding one-quarter to one-half teaspoon of charcoal or permanganate of potash, obtainable from any drugstore, prevents the growth of bacteria on the cut end, and the use of one or two drops of creolin or similar disinfectant tends to prolong the life of the flower, but aspirin has not proved effective.

Pansies in particular find it difficult to draw water through their stems, so these flowers, and also nasturtiums are benefited by being plunged up to their blossoms in cool water for half an hour at eight-hour intervals. Warm and hot draughts cause immediate wilting in cut flowers, dahlias in particular being quickly affected. With regard to containers, one floriculturist has advised that cut flowers last longer in copper vessels than in any other type of vase.
