well with 3 well beaten eggs. add 2-3 cup orange juice alternately with 2 cups flour sifted with 2 table-spoons baking powder and ¼ tea-spoon salt. Turn into buttered muffin pans and bake in a moderate oven. Cool. Remove tops, scoop out centres and fill each with 1 teaspoon lemon filling. Replace top and cover with orange icing. For the lemon filling: Mix ¼ cup butter, ½ cup sugar, ¼ cup lemon juice, 1 tea-spoon grated lemon rind, and two well beaten eggs. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. To make orange icing: Cream 3 table-spoons butter. Add two cups sifted powdered sugar gradually, adding as needed 2 table-spoons lemon juice and 1 teaspoon grated orange rind.

POTATO SALAD
Have ready 3 cups cold boiled potatoes, mixed with one tablespoon onion juice and 1 finely chopped pimiento. To 1 cup sour cream add ½ tablespoon salt, a few grains of pepper, ¼ cup lemon juice and 1 slightly beaten egg. Cook over hot boiling water, stirring constantly until smooth and creamy. Chill. Mix lightly with the potato mixture, the cheddared whites and sifted yolks of 3 hard cooked eggs.

LEMON TAPIOCA
Cook ¾ cup quick tapioca, ½ teaspoon salt, 1½ cups sugar and 3 cups boiling water in a double boiler until clear, stirring frequently. Just before removing from heat add the juice of 3 lemons. Cool slightly and fold in 5 stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into sherbet and chill. Serve with or without whipped cream.

BOILED BEEF BALLS
Pass meat through meat chopper three times. Form into small, flat cakes, sprinkle with salt and pepper and broil without fat until done as desired. Serve in hot hamburger rolls with or without a thick slice of tomato in each roll.

FRUIT SALAD
Slice or dice ripe eating apples. To about 1 quart of the apples add 1 sliced orange, 1 sliced banana, ½ cup diced pineapple and a few raisins. Mix with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing. Chill. Pack in a vacuum container to keep cold.

CREAMY CHOCOLATE FILLING
3 squares unsweetened chocolate
2 cups milk
¾ cup sugar
4 table-spoons cake flour
½ teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
Add chocolate to milk and heat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine sugar, flour, and salt; add gradually to chocolate mixture and cook until thickened, stirring constantly; then continue cooking 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour small amount of mixture over egg yolks, stirring vigorously; return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water; add butter and vanilla, and cool. Makes 2½ cups filling.

CHOCOLATE ECLAIRS
1 cup sifted cake flour
1-3 cup butter or other shortening
1 cup boiling water
3 eggs, unbeaten
Sift flour once; measure. Melt shortening in water. Cook and stir constantly until mixture leaves sides of pan in smooth, compact mass. Remove at once from fire. Add eggs, one at a time, beat in only until smooth after each. Shape on un-greased baking sheet, using pastry bag or two tea-spoons to make strips 5x1 inches. Bake in hot oven 20 minutes; then reduce heat to moderate and bake 25 minutes longer. With sharp knife make slit in one side; insert Creamy Chocolate Filling. Cover eclairs, if desired, with your favorite chocolate frosting. Makes 12.

PINEAPPLE PUNCH
2 cups pineapple juice
½ cup grapefruit juice
1 cup ginger ale
¼ cup raspberry syrup
(If fresh raspberry juice is used, add 3 table-spoons sugar)
Mix the ingredients well, put into ice box. When serving, add some thinly sliced orange and maraschino cherries and crushed ice. For 50 servings, multiply recipe by 8.

DEVILED STEAK
1 flank steak (about 2 lbs.)
2 table-spoons flour
2 table-spoons butter
1 large onion
1 teaspoon mixed dry herbs
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1-8 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1½ table-spoons cider vinegar
2 cups pineapple juice
Cut the steak in pieces 2. by 3 inches and roll in flour. Melt the butter in oven and brown the sliced onion and powdered herbs, remove onion and brown the steak. Add remaining flour and dry seasonings, brown slightly. Pour hot vinegar and pineapple juice over steak, cover closely and simmer for several hours, or until steak is tender. Serves six.

FARM JOTTINGS

PRINTERS' INK AID THE FARM

Canada is the chief producer of carbon black in the British Empire and most of the carbon mentioned in statistics as originating in Empire countries is in fact from Canada. The carbon is used for many purposes but principally in the printers' ink trade and the rubber industry. Printers' ink of other days, in common with many other important articles of commerce, was originally an agricultural product. The inks of the very early ages were prepared from charcoal or foot mixed with gum, glue, or varnish, much after the style of the ordinary black printing ink of today, the principal constituents of which are lampblack and thick linseed oil. The Chinese ascribe the invention of ink to Tien Echeu who lived between 2697 B.C. and 2597 B.C. and it is known that the ancient Egyptians prepared and used inks at a very early date. An Egyptian document—a papyrus—with written characters of the date 2500 B.C. is still in existence. Two Thousand years later the emperors of Greece, and of Rome were wont to sign their decrees with a flourish in purple ink. Since these days the numbers and kinds of ink have been many, and today some of the finest inks in the world are manufactured in Canada.

The season's first carload of British Columbia asparagus for Great Britain was shipped from Montreal on June 18 in fine condition.

The increasing popularity of artificial silk, of which Canada is an important manufacturer, is given as one of the chief causes for the world decline in the demand for mohair fabrics, made principally from the long silky hair of Angora goats. The leading mohair producing countries are the United States, the Union of South Africa, Turkey, and Basutoland.

The production of creamery butter in Canada for the first six months of 1936 amounted to 105,483,488 pounds, an increase of 8.1 per cent above the output for the January to June period of 1935.

Exports of Canadian cattle to the British market and to the United States from January 1, to July 9, 1936, were: to Great Britain, 17,603 head, compared with 4817 for the corresponding period of 1935; to the United States, 159,006 head, including 33,076 calves, in comparison with 84,388 head, including 2107 calves, for the corresponding period of 1935. The United States cattle market felt the effect of the drought through the receipt of large numbers of cattle from the stricken farms forced into the market.

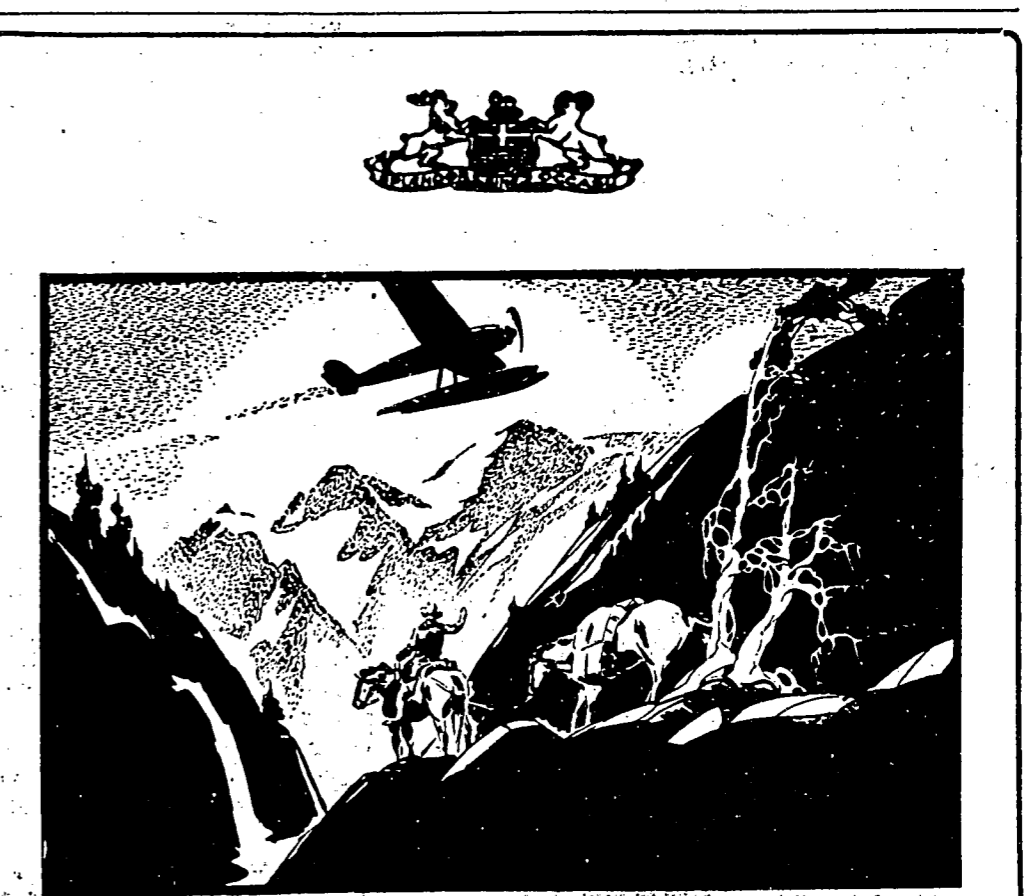

The latest indication that feeding "Fido" has become a big industry and that this is a dog's world after all is noted in the release of statistics showing the volume of sales of canned dog food. Eastern manufacturers and packers participating in this field claim that it's a question of whether dog food or canned milk ranks first as the biggest seller in the canned food industry. NOBODY OWNS THE SKY, COURT RULING

An aeroplane soaring quite low over an individual's property cannot be regarded as a trespasser a United States Circuit Court of Appeals decided recently. The ruling was brought about when owners of a field lying adjacent to an airport brought suit of damages against two transport companies in an attempt to seek an injunction to prevent the planes from its further use. The property owners based their claim on as owning 150 feet of air space above their lot and declaring it had a monthly rental value of \$1500. The Court ruled that the sky had no definite location and like the sea is incapable of private ownership. The owner of land owns as much of the air above him as he uses, but only so long as he uses it. All that lies beyond belongs to the world.—PNS.

TRANS-CANADIAN FLIGHTS

Negotiations between the British and Canadian Governments have been entered into with the commercial aviation companies toward the ultimate objective aimed to provide aerial communication between London, England, and Vancouver, B.C., by the summer of 1938. It is anticipated that forty hours would be the maximum flying time between London and Vancouver and twenty hours from coast to coast across Canada. Imperial Airways of England are scheduled to make experimental flights across the Atlantic early in 1937 and the summer of next year will see test flights across Canada over the new government built air ports linking Halifax with Vancouver. The Canadian Government intends to allow only Canadian companies to compete for the contracts and only Canadian pilots and personnel will be employed.—PNS.
