THE HOUSEWIFE

COOKED OAT OR WHOLE WHEAT CHOWDER

2 cups diced carrots
1 pint boiling water
½ cup diced salt pork
¼ tablespoons chopped onion
1 pint milk
2 cups cooked whole wheat or wheat cereal
Pepper
1 tablespoon salt
Cook the carrots in the boiling water until tender. Fry the salt pork until crisp, remove from the fat and cook onions in the fat. Stir in the flour and cook a few minutes longer. Mix all ingredients in the upper part of a double boiler, stir until well blended and cook about ten minutes. Serve over crisp toast.

FISH CAKES WITH CABBAGE SALAD

Mix two cups of flaked, cooked fish with one cup of mashed potatoes and one-half a teaspoon of salt. Shape into small, flat cakes, roll in flour and fry to a golden brown in hot, salt pork fat. Serve with cabbage salad.
If desired a dash of lemon juice, few grains of pepper, a little onion juice and a teaspoonful or so of parsley may be added to the potato and fish mixture for additional flavor. Also, the mixture may be bound together with an egg which has been slightly beaten.

LUNCHEON CHOWDER

1 cup finely sliced onions
A bruised clove of garlic
¼ pound bacon or salt pork, diced
4 cups water
5 cups diced raw potatoes
2 cups tomato juice
Salt to taste
1 teaspoon chili powder
¼ teaspoon celery salt
1 cup top milk or light cream
Fry the onions or garlic with bacon or salt pork until tender but not browned. Remove and discard the garlic. Add water and potatoes and cook until tender. Add tomato juice and seasonings and cook a few minutes longer. Heat milk and stir into chowder just before serving. Will serve six.

CELERY FRITTERS

1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
1 egg, well beaten
¾ cup milk
1 tablespoon melted shortening
1 cup cooked diced celery or finely chopped raw celery hearts
Sift together dry ingredients. Combine egg, milk and shortening and add to first mixture. Stir in celery. Drop by spoonfuls in deep hot fat and fry to a golden brown. Grated raw carrots, cooked carrots, peas or other vegetables may be used in these fritters.

CHICKEN CORNMEAL CROQUETTES

2 cups thick cornmeal mush, salted
2 cups cooked chicken chopped
1 tablespoon melted butter
¾ teaspoon salt
Dash cayenne
1 teaspoon scraped onion
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 egg, diluted with 1 tablespoon water or milk
1 cup fine corn flake crumbs
Combine all ingredients except the diluted egg mixture and corn flake crumbs. Shape into croquettes, dipping the hands into cold water to prevent sticking. Dip croquettes in egg mixture, then in corn flake crumbs. Allow to stand about half an hour. Fry in deep hot fat until golden brown. Serve with chicken cream gravy or white sauce.

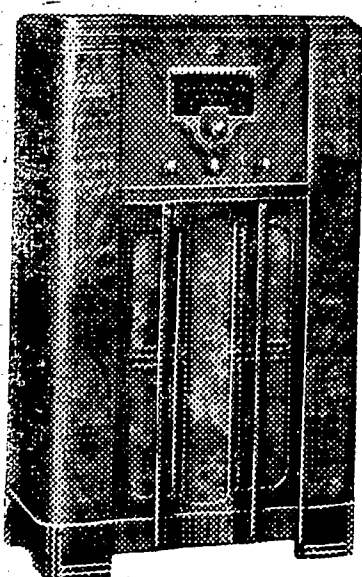

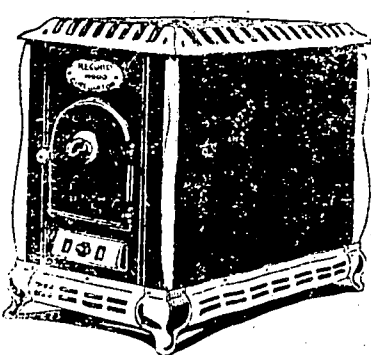

CARIBOO GOLD QUARTZ INSTALLS CRUSHING PLANT

In a statement to the shareholders of the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mining Company, R. R. Rose, managing director, stated that in the last three months outstanding developments had been made on the 1,600 and 1,700 foot levels on the Rainbow fault zone (No. 2 shaft). High grade ore had been encountered at these levels, averaging 0.6 oz. to the ton. He hoped to have definite figures ready by the end of the company's fiscal year on January 31st.

Ore reserves are being gradually increased despite the twelve weeks' shut down caused by the fire, and the increased tonnage now being milled. On November 30 it was estimated that there were about 175,000 tons, averaging in value 0.4 oz. per ton.
 In the 10 months ending Nov. 30, gold recovered totalled 14,558 ozs. from 40,544 tons milled, at an average of 0.36 per ton.
 A new coarse-ore bin and crushing plant is now under construction, and by the use of these it is hoped to still further reduce the cost of production. As far as could be judged at present this would be the last extraordinary expenditure for some time to come.

"GINGER" BUYS NEW PLANE

"Ginger" Coote left recently for Toronto to take delivery of a new De Havilland Moth cabin plane. He was accompanied by Earl Brett of Chilliwack. "Ginger" will test the new trans-Canada air route on his return flight to B.C.
