THE HOUSEWIFE

POT ROASTING BEEF

Put the meat, shoulder, chuck or rump in a covered iron kettle or a frying pan with the fat side down. When it is well crisped turn and brown on the other sides thoroughly. Season with salt, pepper and a little onion (or garlic, if preferred). An onion with two or three cloves stuck in it may be browned lightly with the meat. The meat should then be cooked in the same utensil, tightly covered or in the kettle from a fireless cooker. Let the meat simmer until quite tender, turning it once during the cooking. No water is needed, although some cooks prefer a little water. The tight cover will keep in all the moisture. Allow about an hour to the pound for the cooking. Make a gravy of the brown fat, using an equal amount of flour and water.

POT ROAST WITH VEGETABLES

Wipe with a damp cloth a three or four pound roast from the rump or chuck. Skewer or tie into shape and roll in flour. Sear meat on all sides in a little fat, and place in heavy kettle or braising pan. Pour over meat one cup each sliced carrots, onions, turnips and diced celery, which have been boiled in salted water until soft and rubbed through a coarse strainer or colander, and three tablespoons of dripping or bacon fat. Season to taste, cover tightly and cook in a slow oven, or simmer, for about four hours. If the liquid in which the vegetables are boiled is not sufficient, water may be added as required. Slightly thicken gravy and serve with meat.

ROAST LEG OF LAMB

Select a leg of lamb weighing from five to six pounds. Wipe the meat with a damp cloth, rub the surface with $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper and two tablespoons flour. Strips of bacon may be laid across the top of the roast if the meat is quite lean. Lay the meat (skin side down) on a rack in an open roasting pan without water. Place the pan in a hot oven and sear the meat for 30 minutes at this temperature until tender. Allow 20 to 25 min. a pound. When the meat is done remove it from the pan. Also remove all the fat except two tablespoonsful. Brown two tablespoons flour in the two tablespoons of fat, add one and a half cups boiling water, and stir constantly until the mixture thickens. Cook 2 minutes. Season with salt, finely-cut mint leaves, and a little lemon juice.

MUTTON BROTH

- 3 pounds mutton, from neck or shank
- quarts cold water
- tablespoon salt
- tablespoons barley
- tablespoons rice.

Pepper
Remove skin and fat and cut meat in small pieces. Put into kettle and cover with cold water. Heat gradually to boiling point, add salt and pepper and simmer until meat is tender. Strain and remove fat. Reheat to boiling point, add rice or barley and cook until tender.

MUTTON OR LAMB STEW

Cut meat into two-inch squares. Roll in seasoned flour and brown in hot frying pan or kettle. Add boiling water to cover and simmer until partly cooked. Add turnips, carrots, potatoes and onions sliced, peas and beans. Simmer until vegetables are tender.

CASSEROLE LAMB

Any part of lamb or mutton may be prepared in this way. Sear meat in a hot pan. Place in covered pan or casserole, add a small amount of boiling water, cover tightly and cook slowly in oven. When partly cooked, season, add sliced onions and potatoes sliced or cubed. Add enough water to prevent burning and cook until meat and vegetables are tender. Serve from casserole dish.

price was the same for all sizes, although the price for eggs in most of the stores in Quesnel was uniform, there were one or two which tried undercutting. It would be better only to sell to those merchants paying a fair price. Farmers should take great pains to be certain that all eggs brought into Quesnel should be absolutely fresh, as several complaints had been received on this score in the past. As far as the price was concerned, this district was very fortunate. Summer prices averaged 20c to 25c, with a yearly average of 33c to the producer. The average price in Alberta had been 16c and for the past three years the Fraser Valley prices averaged 13c, 14c and 15c.
Before the meeting proceeded to the election of directors hearty votes of thanks were given to the president, retiring directors, manager and staff, and also to A. S. Vaughan for his services during the past year. The following were elected to the Board of Directors for the ensuing year:
