THE HOUSEWIFE

DRIED LIMA AND HAMBURG CASSEROLE

2 cups dried lima beans
1 pound chopped chuck or round steak
3 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon dry or prepared mustard
1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 2 1/2 cups
2 teaspoons granulated sugar
1 cup sliced, peeled onions
1 bay leaf

Cover lima beans with cold water and soak overnight. Then drain. Combine the chopped meat, 1/4 teaspoon salt, the pepper and mustard. Mix together the tomatoes, 2 1/4 teaspoons salt, sugar, onions and bay leaf. Arrange the beans, meat and tomatoes in alternate layers in a 2-part covered casserole or Dutch oven. Bake, covered, in a moderate oven for three hours. Serves six to eight.

VEAL AND SAUSAGE ROLLS

2 pounds veal steak, 1/4 in. thick
1/2 pound sausage meat
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1 peeled clove garlic, minced
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon fat

Cut steak into slices 4 inches long and 1 1/2 inches wide. Mix sausage, parsley, garlic, salt and pepper, and spread thinly on the veal slices. Roll up each slice like a jelly roll and tie with string. Melt the fat in a covered skillet, add the veal rolls and brown on all sides. Add enough boiling water to half cover the meat. Cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours, replenishing with boiling water as needed. When done remove string from meat and arrange meat on hot

platter. Prepare gravy from the drippings in pan. Pour over the meat. Serves six. To serve three, make half this recipe.

POTATO AND CHEESE PUFF

4 cups leftover seasoned mashed potatoes
2 beaten eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 speck of pepper
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 1/2 cups grated cheese
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
2 teaspoons melted butter

To the mashed potatoes add the eggs, salt, pepper, paprika and grated cheese. Mix well, then add the milk and turn into 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Combine the crumbs and melted butter and sprinkle on top of the potatoes. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes or until thoroughly heated and golden brown. Serves six. To serve two or three make half this recipe.

CRANBERRY CHIFFON PIE

3 cups cranberries
1 cup hot water
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin
2 tablespoons icing sugar

Cooked pastry shell
Boil the cranberries in the hot water until they are soft. Press through a sieve and add the sugar and salt. Then add well-beaten egg yolks and cook in top of a double boiler until it thickens. Soak gelatin in the 1/4 cup cold water and then dissolve in hot mixture. Chill thoroughly and when it begins to congeal, fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites to which sugar has been added. Place mixture in cooked pie shell and garnish with whipped cream.

CULINARY WISDOM

Soda added to vegetables when cooking heightens the colour but destroys valuable vitamins.

Vitamins B, C and E are water soluble and therefore the water in which vegetables are cooked should never be thrown away.

If old carrots are soaked in cold water for an hour they may be scraped instead of peeled and more food value is thus retained.

Parsnips are better if peeled after cooking.

Salt added to colored vegetables when partially cooked prevents loss of colour.

If onions are peeled under water they do not cause tears.

Dried beans, peas and lentils should be soaked in soft water.

Indian Department at Ottawa? Through the efforts of Maj. D. M. MacKay, a grant of \$5,000 has been secured from the Provincial Government.

In November last a letter was received from the Women's Hospital Auxiliary asking for representation on the Hospital Board. This was approved and an amendment to the by-laws to allow this would come before the meeting. To complete the circle it is suggested that the new chairman of the Hospital Board be asked to attend the meetings of the W.H.A.

The question of a new sterilizer has been frequently discussed without a decision being made, and the matter has again been left over for the new Board. Additional equipment for the X-ray department is also urgently needed.

There being no further matters of general business the meeting proceeded with the election of six directors for the ensuing year. There were eight nominations to fill the six vacancies, and as the first ballot resulted in a tie for the final place, a second vote was taken. The final ballot resulted as follows, with the figures in brackets indicating the first poll:

Louis LeBourdais then proposed a vote of thanks to the W.H.A. for their excellent work during the year. This body not only attended to the hospital furnishings but also raised much needed money. This resolution was seconded by E. C. Lunn, but before it could be passed John A. Fraser asked that a detailed report of the activities of the W.H.A. might be read in order that the good work done might be known.

A vote of thanks to the medical and nursing staff for the hard work they have undergone during the past year was moved and seconded by C. H. Allison and S. E. Higgs respectively.

J. M. Yorston was nominated by the Kersley Farmers' Institute to represent that portion of the district on the Hospital Board.

Wingdam To Be Represented
It was suggested by G. E. Malcolm that owing to the growth of the Wingdam mining camp during the past year, that a representative from the camp be invited to join the Board. C. H. Allison then pointed out that during the past year Wingdam had showed an increasing interest in the Quesnel General Hospital, and had, in fact, formed a W.H.A. besides sending several contributions to the funds.

When it was pointed out that there were no members of the Hospital Society in Wingdam, it was moved that the secretary be instructed to write the Wingdam W.H.A. inviting them to appoint a representative to serve on the Board, and at the same time pointing out the qualifications necessary.
