

THE HOUSEWIFE

BREAKFAST MUFFINS
 2 cups sifted flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 tablespoons sugar
 2 tablespoons sour milk or buttermilk
 1 egg, well beaten
 4 tablespoons shortening
 Sift flour once, measure, add the baking soda, salt and sugar and sift again. Combine milk, egg and shortening. Add the flour to mixture, stirring only enough to blend. Turn into greased muffin tins. Bake in hot oven 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

PINEAPPLE PIE
 Filling for baked shell: Bring to a boil 1 cup crushed pineapple, 1 cup of juice (if not enough, add water to make full cup), 1 cup sugar. Add 1 teaspoon cornstarch mixed to paste with cold water. Cook until thick. Cool and cover with meringue or cream.

ORANGE CHARLOTTE
 1/2 ounce gelatine
 1/2 cup boiling water
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 2 egg whites
 1/4 cup cold water
 1 cup sugar
 1 cup orange juice and pulp
 1 cup whipped cream
 Soften gelatine in cold water. Dissolve sugar in boiling water. Boil a minute. Add gelatine and dissolve but do not let boil. Remove from fire and add fruit juices. When partly set beat and add beaten eggs. Serve with whipped cream or custard.

SURPRISE PUDDING
 1 cup suet
 3/4 cup sweet milk
 1 tablespoon sugar
 1 teaspoon soda
 Pinch salt
 1/2 cup black currant preserve (or any other fruit desired)
 1-3 cups sugar
 Steam 3 1/2 hours.

DATE PUDDING
 2 cups flour
 4 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 3/4 cup milk
 3/4 cup sliced dates
 2 tablespoons butter, melted
 1 teaspoon orange extract
 Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together. Add dates and milk enough to make a stiff batter. Add melted butter and, lastly, the orange extract. Bake in a moderate oven until golden brown and serve warm with the following sauce:

1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1 tablespoon flour
 Pinch of salt
 1 cup boiling water
 1 tablespoon butter
 1 teaspoon orange extract
 Mix sugar, flour and salt. Add boiling water gradually, and boil gently for ten minutes until there is no taste of raw starch. Remove from fire and add butter and flavoring.

QUICK WHITE ICING
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg white
 3 tablespoons water
 Vanilla
 Put sugar, water and unbeaten egg white in double boiler and cook over hot water. Beat constantly during cooking. When thick enough to spread, remove and beat until cool. Add flavoring.

"No," answered the little boy. "You look at it."

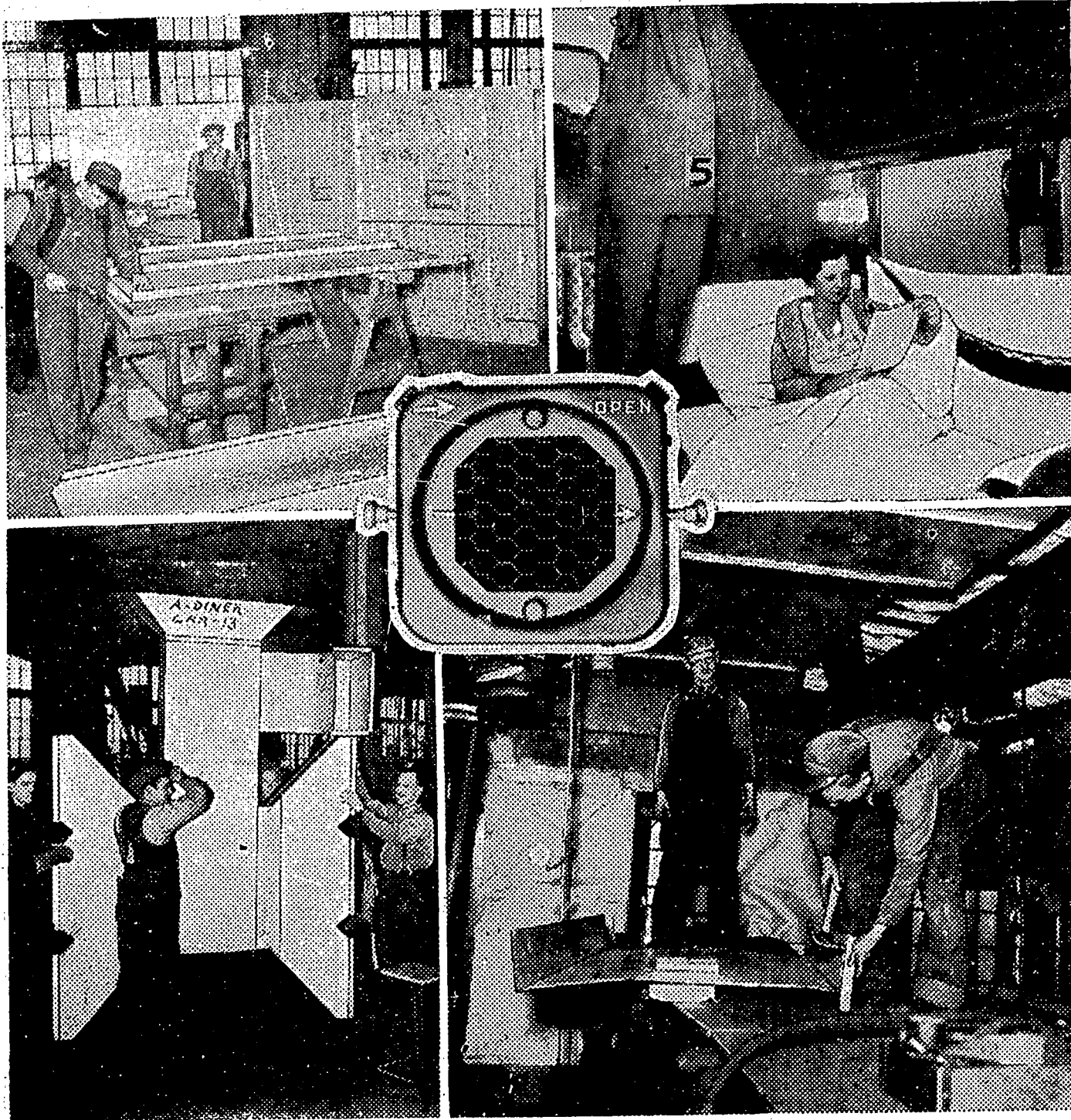

Canadian Pacific Extends Air-Conditioned Service



The Canadian Pacific Railway Angus Shops at Montreal are humming with activity these days as the Company continues its comprehensive programme of air-conditioning. In the current year, air-conditioning equipment will be added to 136 cars, including standard sleepers, dining cars, tourist sleepers, parlor cars, and day coaches, and these, in addition to the 130 cars air-conditioned in 1936, will permit a very considerable extension of air-conditioned services throughout the Dominion.

Provision is made by the 1937 programme to provide air-conditioned dining cars on all trains carrying air-conditioned sleepers or parlor cars, besides additional sleeping and parlor cars for use on trains between Montreal and Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa, Toronto and Ottawa, and trains 39 and 40 between Montreal and Saint John, N.B. Air-conditioning of tourist cars for use on the transcontinental trains between Vancouver and Montreal and Toronto is a new and interesting feature of the 1937 programme. This will supplement last year's services which allowed air-conditioned standard sleepers, compartment-lounge, bedroom and parlor cars to be used on transcontinental trains between Montreal, Toronto, and Vancouver; the Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, Chicago services; and the night trains between Montreal and Boston.
