## THE HOUSEWIFE

The forty days of Lent are more of a boon than many housewives believe. Unable to serve routine meat dinners, the ruler of the kitchen must experiment with other main course tasties... and in so doing, she adds scores of excellent recipes to her year round file. Here are a few suggestions for Lent—and later on.

- CREAM OF SPAGHETTI SOUP**  
Macaroni, spaghetti or egg noodles—foods with a high proportion of carbohydrates—are particularly adaptable to the changing spring weather.
- 1/4 lb spaghetti
  - 1 medium carrot, sliced thin
  - 3 tablespoons butter
  - 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
  - 1/4 cup strained tomatoes
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 small onion, minced
  - 1 tablespoon flour
  - 1 1/2 cups top milk
  - 1 tablespoon parsley, minced
  - Pepper
- Cook spaghetti and carrot in 2 quarts boiling salted water until tender. Crush to pulp with masher. Melt butter in a sauce pan, add onion, and saute for 5 minutes. Add flour and stir until smooth. Add salt, pepper, celery salt, tomatoes, milk and parsley. Pour sauce into pot containing cooked spaghetti—carrot pulp and bring to boiling point. Serve piping hot with whipped cream. Serves 4.
- FILET OF FISH, WAIKIKI**  
(With Pineapple Sauce)
- 2 tablespoons butter
  - 4 finely chopped shallots
  - 6 filets of sole (or other white fish)
  - 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley
  - Salt and pepper
  - 1 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice
  - 1 cup of stock
  - 1/2 teaspoon mixed herbs
- Sauce**
- 4 tablespoons butter
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 egg yolk
  - Broth from fish
- Butter a baking pan or dish, place the shallots in it and the filets of fish on top of the shallots, sprinkle with parsley, salt and pepper, and add the pineapple juice and stock. Place the mixed herbs (tied in a piece of cheesecloth) in the liquid, cover with a buttered paper, and put on top of stove. Bring to boiling point, then place in moderate oven and let simmer until cooked. Remove fish to warm platter.
- To prepare sauce: Melt butter, add flour and stir well until cooked, add the broth from the fish (adding enough extra broth or water to make 2 cups) and let cook at least five minutes. Then add the slightly beaten egg yolk and cook 1 more minute. Pour sauce over filets, sprinkle with parsley, and garnish with triangles of hot pineapple and slices of lemon. Serves 6.
- NUT DRESSING**
- 2-3 cup sweetened condensed milk
  - 1/4 cup vinegar or lemon juice
  - 1/4 cup salad oil or melted butter
  - 1 egg yolk
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - Few grains cayenne
  - 1 teaspoon dry mustard
  - 1/4 cup salted nut meats, finely chopped
- Place all ingredients except nut meats in mixing bowl. Beat with rotary egg beater until mixture thickens. If thicker consistency is desired, place in refrigerator to chill before serving. Just before serving, blend in nut meats. Makes 1 1/2 cups.
- SHREDDED DELIGHT**
- 1 quart milk
  - 1 egg
  - 1 tablespoon corn starch
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 2 shredded wheat biscuits
  - Pinch salt
- Warm milk in double boiler. Beat egg, add corn starch, sugar and salt. Pour into warm milk and stir until thick. When cool, add vanilla and pour into dish containing two crumbled shredded wheat biscuits. Whipped cream may be used as a topping.

## New Breed of Sheep for Canadian Farmers



Shown above on their arrival in Canada in the Canadian Pacific Steamships freighter Beaverbrae are several sheep that will mean a great deal to Canadian farmers in the future. They are a gift to the Province of Ontario from the Kerry Hill Flock Book Society in North Wales and are an outstanding breed of general utility sheep, which, due to their adaptability to any environment, are expected to gain rapid favor in this country.

The gift of the pen of ten ewes and one ram was arranged through the good offices of W. Rupert Davies, president and editor of the Kingston, Ont., High-Standard. These prize winners, products of generations of breeding with the most careful methods of selection being exercised, are destined for the Ontario Agricultural Society at Guelph, from where the strain is expected to spread to other parts of the country.

An idea of the economic and eugenic value of the gift pen may be derived from the fact that the eleven animals took first prize at the annual Kerry Hill Sheep Fair where some 10,000 to 15,000 sheep were shown. Besides being able to withstand bleak weather, these sheep are handsome and symmetrical, and will, it is felt, prove of great value to Canadian farmers.

### KIMBERLEY DYNAMITERS SUPREME PUCK CHASERS

After winning the Alan Cup last year, the Kimberly Dynamiters amateur hockey was predicted to go far. After defeating the Swiss team in the final of the world championships on the Wembley rink in England recently they have been acclaimed champions of the world. The British team, defenders, still retain their title of European champions. With the exception of the United States all the hockey playing nations of the world were represented in the tournament. The British team, composed largely of players who had learned their hockey in Canada, were defeated only once in the tournament (by the Canadians 3-0) but this reverse cost them the championship.

The mild weather of the past few days has put a stop to all skating and curling in the district, but just before the thaw the various teams managed to play the Waller and Elsey cup finals.

In the former Prince George was the winner, ending the two-game series with a better goal record than their opponents, Island Mtn. Miners. In the first game, played at Wells, the home side managed to win a close, hard-fought game by a 4-3 score. In the return game at Prince George, the northerners had a 4-2 edge on their rivals, and the cup went to the north for the first time.

A team composed of Island Mtn. and Gold Quartz players challenged Prince George for the Elsey cup, and after a hard and somewhat rough game took the trophy back to Wells after winning the battle 3-2. The play was a good deal slower than usual in this game, the players often over-skating the puck due to soft ice.

Curlers were unable to finish the cup competition due to soft ice.

Road conditions throughout the district have been getting steadily worse during the week, and it is expected that certain portions of them will be closed shortly to heavy loads and vehicles.

It would seem that sleighing is nearly over for the year. The roads are almost bare and the two bridges leading into Quesnel have been without snow for some time. Travel on the Barkerville road is reported to be very heavy and truckers are finding the trip a tough one.

### MONTHLY MEETING OF PARENT-TEACHER ASS'N

The last meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association was well attended if one bears in mind that a number still had the flu, and a fair amount of business was handled. Mrs. Freeman was in the chair and many matters of importance were discussed. A fair amount of correspondence relating to the cost of several different types of film projectors for future use in the school, and by the Association, was read by the secretary. An interesting discussion followed, and although time did not seem ripe for the purchase, the project did not appear to be beyond the scope of the Association. The matter of film rental was also dealt with.

Mr. Tom Somerton then reported on matters relative to literature which he had in his possession, and which he was able to offer for circulation. This reading matter is all very well selected to meet the requirements of a town such as Quesnel who are interested in matters of child welfare. It is understood that Rev. W. E. Fullerton has undertaken to prepare a summary of three or four of the more important of these papers and to read his précis at the March meeting. A report on University Extension, not very encouraging, was given by Mr. Higgs, and a more happy note was struck

when the same member made a report on the progress made in preparation of the new school plans.

A high light of the evening was provided by the presence of two visitors from the West Side. The Women's Council of West Quesnel had recently invited the president of the Quesnel Parent-Teacher Association to one of their meetings, and in return had accepted an invitation to send a delegation to the Association's meeting at the school. One of the two attending was Mrs. I. M. Abbott, who obliged the meeting with an excellent account of the work of the Women's Council of West Quesnel. In the interests of their school this organization had been successful in raising some \$175,

and with this they have been able to found a \$40 library, to supply the school with a drinking fountain, a utility much needed in the local school, to put on a much enjoyed Christmas party, a summer picnic and to purchase a large supply of cups and saucers for social activities in support of the school. A resolution was adopted inviting the Women's Council to consider membership in the Parent-Teacher Association, and a policy of co-operation was encouraged. Mrs. C. Steen is president of the Council and Mrs. A. Montgomery secretary-treasurer. The evening was brought to a close with the reading by the secretary of a very excellent speech

which had been delivered last summer by Dr. H. B. King to the Women's Institute of Vancouver, and over radio station CRCV. The talk dealt with the vastly interesting topic of British Columbia's revised programme of education. The programme for the March meeting is already taking shape and will consist chiefly of a Parliamentary debate, and the subject will be "Resolved that the home exerts a greater influence than the school in the development of a child's character." But of this more at a later date. The March meeting will be held on TUESDAY, MARCH 16. Keep the date open. 8 p.m. at the school.
