

THE HOUSEWIFE

There is a potent magic in words—and words like "Hawaii" and "pineapple" have the gift of conjuring delightful thoughts to even the most unimaginative mind. Thoughts of blue surf pounding on white sands . . . soft singing voices 'neath velvet skies . . . and tangy, golden fruits growing amid a riotous profusion of tropical verdure. Science and romance are not always companions . . . yet the scientific mind approves the pineapple. Your doctor will tell you that the Hawaiian pineapple is a valuable part of both your diet and that of your children. The canned, unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice that has established itself as one of our favorite breakfast beverages is not only a good source of vitamins A, B, and C, but its fruit sugar content is a fine source of energy. The same may be said of the canned pineapple itself in its many available forms—sliced, diced, spears, and crushed.

Here are two recipes, one for the use of pineapple juice in a dessert, and one for the use of pineapple spears in a meat dish.

Delmonico Pudding

1/2 cup sugar
Few grains of salt
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice
1 cup milk
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg whites
3 tablespoons sugar
Mix 1/2 cup sugar with cornstarch and salt in the top of a double boiler, stir in pineapple juice and cook over boiling water until clear, about 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Gradually add the milk, cook 3 minutes longer. Then stir the mixture into slightly beaten egg yolks. Return to double boiler and cook 5 minutes longer, or until the mixture

cools the spoon and is of the consistency of custard. Fold in the nuts, raisins and vanilla and pour into a baking dish. Cover with a meringue made by beating the egg whites until peaks will form when the beater is lifted, and adding sugar gradually. Brown lightly in a moderately slow oven (325 degrees to 350 degrees F.). Serve either hot or cold. 8 servings.

Meat Loaf Honolulu

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
2 medium size onions, chopped
4 soda crackers rolled
1 cup seedless raisins
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
3 eggs beaten slightly
1/2 cup grated cheese
6 half slices of bacon
6 or 7 canned Hawaiian pineapple spears

Combine all ingredients except cheese, bacon and pineapple. Grease a deep pan (5 1/2 in. or 6 in. x 10 in.), place 6 or 7 pineapple spears across the bottom and press one-half of meat mixture into pan. Sprinkle with cheese and press in remainder of mixture. Bake in a moderate oven for at least 1 hour. When half done arrange bacon slices across loaf. When ready to serve, turn meat loaf on a platter, pineapple side up, garnish with parsley. Serve with a hot tomato sauce or catsup. 6 servings.

Savoy Pudding

4 egg yolks, slightly beaten
3 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
Lady fingers or strips of cake
1 cup sliced canned apricots
1 1/2 cups shredded coconut
Combine egg yolks, sugar, and milk, in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook until mixture coats spoon, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water; add gelatin and stir until it is dissolved. Turn part into mold, making 1-inch layer, and chill until firm. (Chill remaining custard mixture until slightly thickened; then dip lady fingers into part of mixture and line sides of mold. Fill centre of

mold with alternate layers of apricots, remaining custard, and coconut. Chill until firm. Unmold. Garnish with additional apricot halves and whipped cream. Serves 8.

Daffodil Cake

1 cup sifted flour
1 cup egg whites
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/4 cups sifted sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon orange extract
4 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon-colored

Sift flour once, measure, and sift four times. Beat egg whites and salt with flat wire whisk. When foamy, add cream of tartar, and continue beating until eggs are stiff enough to hold up in peaks, but not dry. Fold in sugar carefully, 2 tablespoons at a time, until all is used. Sift a small amount of flour over mixture and fold in carefully, continue until all is used. Divide batter in two parts. To one, fold in vanilla. To other, fold in orange extract and egg yolks beaten with 2 additional tablespoons sugar. Put mixtures by tablespoons into large ungreased angel food pan, alternating yellow and white. (Pan should be only half full.) Bake in slow oven; after 30 minutes increase heat slightly to 375 degrees F. and bake 50 minutes longer. Invert on rack until cake is cold.

EPSOM SALTS

Epsom salts are so named because they occur in the mineral waters at the town of Epsom on the edge of the Surrey Downs in England. Its medicinal springs attracted invalids till the salts were artificially manufactured. By the way, these breezy downs were long used for horse racing when Edward the 12th Earl of Derby founded the Oaks in 1779 and the Derby in 1780. The Oaks was named after his hunting seat.

Magnesium sulphate, to use the technical term, has a variety of uses, industrial as well as medicinal. It is used in the finishing of cotton fabrics, for weighing paper, silk

and leather, for fire-proofing and as a fertilizer. It is readily soluble in water.

It is imported into Canada in large quantities in the solid form, mainly from Germany. An average yearly import would be about four and a half million pounds.

Besides that we have a domestic production of the mineral, chiefly in the Kamloops district of British Columbia and treated at Ashcroft. These deposits have a high degree of purity. The output last year was about 700,000 pounds which was more than eight times the production in 1934. The mineral also occurs in association with sodium sulphate deposits in Saskatchewan.
