

**THE HOUSEWIFE**

**Spiced Steak**  
2 pounds round or chuck steak  
cut 1 inch thick  
2 tablespoons lard  
1/2 cup vinegar  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1 cup meat stock  
1 tablespoon flour  
Salt and pepper

Cut the steak into pieces suitable for individual servings. Brown them on both sides in hot lard. Add meat stock, vinegar, and brown sugar, and let simmer until tender, forty-five minutes to an hour. Remove to a hot platter and thicken liquid with flour smoothed in cold water.

**Featuring "Lima Night"**  
Many families have a regular "Lima Night"—a certain night each week on which a heaping Lima dish is the backbone of the dinner. This need not be the same dish, over and over. By no means! The Lima bean is as versatile as the potato or onion. In soups, salads, ham loaves and croquettes it feels perfectly at home. The recipes below will prove this:

**Spring Chowder**  
2 cups cooked dried Limas  
2 cups diced potatoes  
2 slices fat salt pork  
1 small onion, sliced  
1 cup boiling water  
4 tablespoons butter  
4 tablespoons flour  
3 cups hot milk  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper

Cut salt pork into dice. Place in a saucepan and cook 5 minutes; add onion and cook until just turning yellow, then add potatoes and boiling water. Cook until potatoes are tender, then add Limas. Melt butter, add flour, stir until smooth, then add hot milk; cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened, then add Lima mixture and seasonings.

**Lima and Ham Loaf**  
1 cup cooked, dried Limas  
1/2 cup ground ham  
1/4 cup chilisauce or catsup  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 teaspoon minced onion

1 tablespoon melted butter  
1 cup cracker crumbs  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper  
Rub Limas through a coarse strainer. Add ham, chili sauce, eggs, pepper, salt, minced onion, butter and cracker crumbs. Shape into loaf, place in a buttered pan in a moderate oven and bake 30 minutes, basting occasionally with the melted butter. Serve with brown gravy.

**Almond Nut Rennet-Custard**  
1 rennet tablet  
1 tablespoon cold water  
1 pint milk  
1/2 cup whipping cream  
7/8 tablespoons sugar  
1 tablespoon almond flavoring  
with few drops Grape Green Food Color  
Almond nuts  
Green cherries

Make rennet-custard according to directions on package, using almond flavoring instead of vanilla and adding food color with 3 tablespoons sugar and flavoring. Chill in refrigerator. When ready to serve, whip the cream. Just before it is stiff add 4 tablespoons of the sugar, and mix thoroughly together. Put whipped cream on top of each dish of rennet-custard and garnish with chopped almonds and green cherries.

**Maple Delight**  
1 rennet tablet  
1 tablespoon cold water  
1 pint milk  
1/2 cup maple syrup  
Make rennet-custard according to directions on package, using 3 tablespoons maple syrup in place of sugar and vanilla. Chill in refrigerator. Before serving, top each dish of ice cold rennet-custard with the rest of the maple syrup.

**Frikadellar**  
1 pound finely ground beef  
2 unbeaten eggs  
1 tablespoon flour  
4 tablespoons bacon drippings  
1 tablespoon grated onion  
1 teaspoon salt  
Pepper

Cream or milk to moisten  
Add flour to finely ground steak and mix thoroughly. Season with salt and pepper and grated onion. Add the eggs and enough cream or milk to

make quite soft. Beat thoroughly—the better it is. Place heaping tablespoons of meat in hot fat and fry until done.

**Mocha Refrigerator Cake**  
2 squares unsweetened chocolate  
1 1/4 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk  
1/2 cup strong coffee  
1/2 cup Brazil nut meats, finely chopped  
24 vanilla wafers

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sweetened condensed milk and stir over boiling water 5 minutes, or until mixture thickens. Add coffee and Brazil nut meats, blending thoroughly. Line narrow, oblong pan with wax paper. Place 8 vanilla wafers on bottom of pan; cover with layer of chocolate. Add another layer of wafers, alternating in this way until chocolate mixture is used, finishing with 8 vanilla wafers. Chill in refrigerator for 12 hours or longer. To serve, turn out on small platter and carefully remove wax paper. Cut in slices or squares to serve. Garnish with whipped cream. Serves 8.

Out of twenty-six vowels and consonants, like so many woodwinds and strings, he has evolved 101 orchestrations in type. Some of them bear his own name, as "Goudy Old Style" and "Goudy Modern."

The first of the 101, called "Camelot," appeared four decades ago from the Camelot Press, his first venture into the printing business. Until then he had been an accountant. The last of the 101, recently completed, is named "Bertram" in honor of Bertha M. Spinks—Mrs. Goudy.

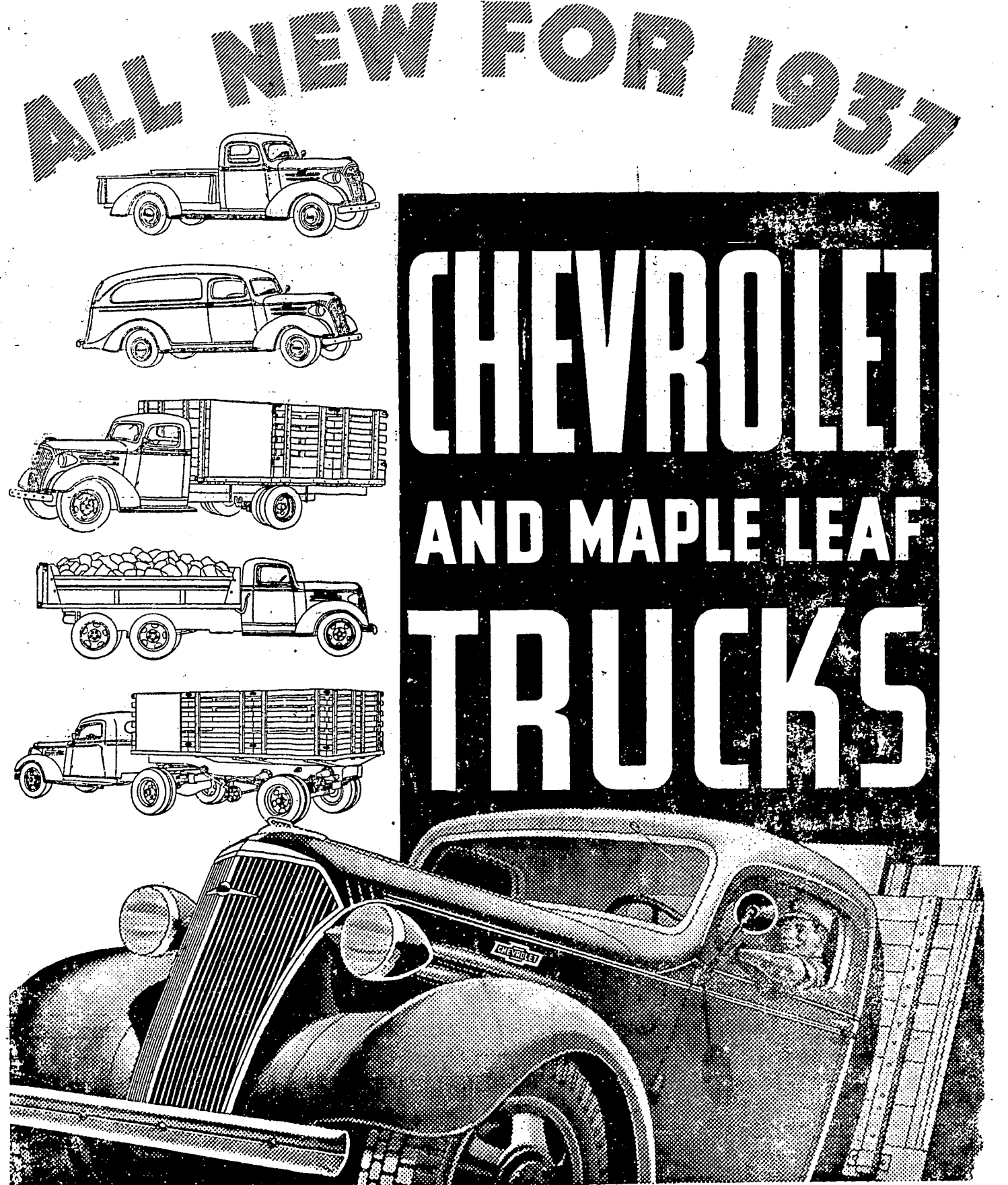
