

THE HOUSEWIFE

In view of the demand for lamb at this time, the following recipes may prove useful:—

Roast Lamb a la Bretonne

Beans form an important part of this recipe. Cook the desired quantity of beans, shelled green ones when in season. Fry 1/2 pound, or the amount desired, of finely sliced onions for five minutes. Add flour, and then milk or water, to make a sauce, and cook for 15 minutes. Pour the water of the beans, and add the onion sauce. After the roast has been prepared for the oven, make four or more incisions with a fork or skewer and place a whole clove in each incision. When the mutton is roasted serve with the beans and sliced tomatoes.

Champvallons (Ontario Style)

This is a recipe for lamb or mutton chops: Pan broil 6 to 10 chops for two minutes. Prepare onions (sliced) and potatoes (sliced or cubed). Place chops in casserole, add vegetables, seasonings, and sufficient boiling water or stock to prevent burning. Cover and cook in oven until vegetables are tender. Serve hot.

Sheep's Heart Stew (Scots Style)

Simmer lamb or mutton hearts until tender. Remove and cut in two-inch squares. Slice onions and fry in cooking fat for five minutes, add hearts and potatoes cut in same size as hearts. Cover with boiling water and cook until the potatoes are done. Thicken liquid and serve hot.

Cooked Lamb en Casserole

3 cups cooked lamb
1 tablespoon cooking fat
1 cup cooked carrots
1 cup cooked potatoes
8 small cooked onions
Left over gravy

Cut lamb in cubes and brown in cooking fat. Cut vegetables in cubes. Put meat in casserole, add vegetables, gravy, and enough hot water to moisten. Season with salt and pep-

per. Cover and bake in hot oven for 20 minutes.

Butter Cake

1-3 cup butter
7-8 cup fine granulated sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon flavoring
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 cups baking powder
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup milk
Cream butter. Add sugar gradually and cream together. Add well beaten eggs and flavoring. Beat well. Add alternately the milk and dry ingredients, adding baking powder with last amount of flour. Bake in a buttered loaf pan in a moderate oven for 45 minutes, or in layer cake pans for 30 minutes.

Butter Icing

4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup icing sugar
Milk, cream or fruit juice
Flavoring
Cream butter. Add sugar gradually. Beat well. Add liquid, drop by drop, until of desired consistency.

Oatmeal Cookies

1 cup butter
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
1 egg
1 1/4 cups fine rolled oats
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoonful soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
Pinch of salt
1 cup cocoanut
Cream butter. Add sugar and cream well together. Add well beaten egg, then dry ingredients and cocoanut. Drop by spoonfuls on buttered baking sheet and bake in moderate oven about 8 to 10 minutes.

Celery and Mushroom Soup

1 medium sized head of celery
1 small onion
1/4 lb. mushrooms
2 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
3 cups milk
Salt and pepper
Chop onion and celery finely and boil until tender. Cut mushrooms in small pieces and boil five to eight minutes in small amount of water. Melt butter, blend in flour. Add milk gradually and stir until mixture

thickens. Add celery, onions and mushrooms with sufficient water in which they were cooked to give desired consistency. Season to taste.

Cabbage Cooked in Milk

2 cups milk
6 cups shredded cabbage
1-3 cup milk or cream
2 tablespoons melted butter
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
Heat milk and cook cabbage in it two minutes. Add milk or cream, flour blended with butter, and salt. Cook for three or four minutes, stirring constantly.

Scalloped Eggs with Cheese

6 hard cooked eggs
4 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
2 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup grated cheese
1-3 cup buttered bread crumbs
Salt and pepper
Cut eggs in half. Place in buttered baking dish. Make cream sauce of butter, flour and milk. Add grated cheese and seasonings. Pour sauce over the eggs. Sprinkle top with the crumbs and bake in a moderate oven until brown.

Coffee Marshmallow Custard

2 cups milk
4 tablespoons ground coffee
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
3 eggs
2 tablespoons sugar
Pinch of salt
Marshmallows
Bring milk and coffee to boiling point. Strain. Beat eggs slightly. Combine sugar, salt, vanilla and the milk. Strain into custard cups. Top each with a marshmallow. Over-panch in slow oven until firm—about 30 minutes.

Croquettes

Any kind of ground beef or poultry (left over), one part mashed potato, or rice and egg, mixed with gravy, stock of white sauce, and fried in deep fat.

Hash

Two parts of any kind of ground beef (left over) and one part of mashed or chopped potatoes.

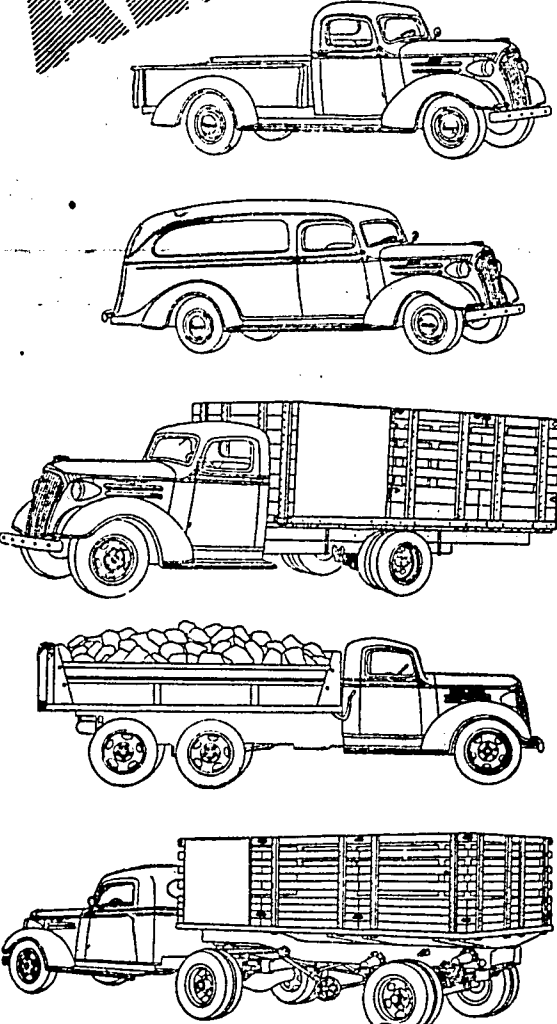

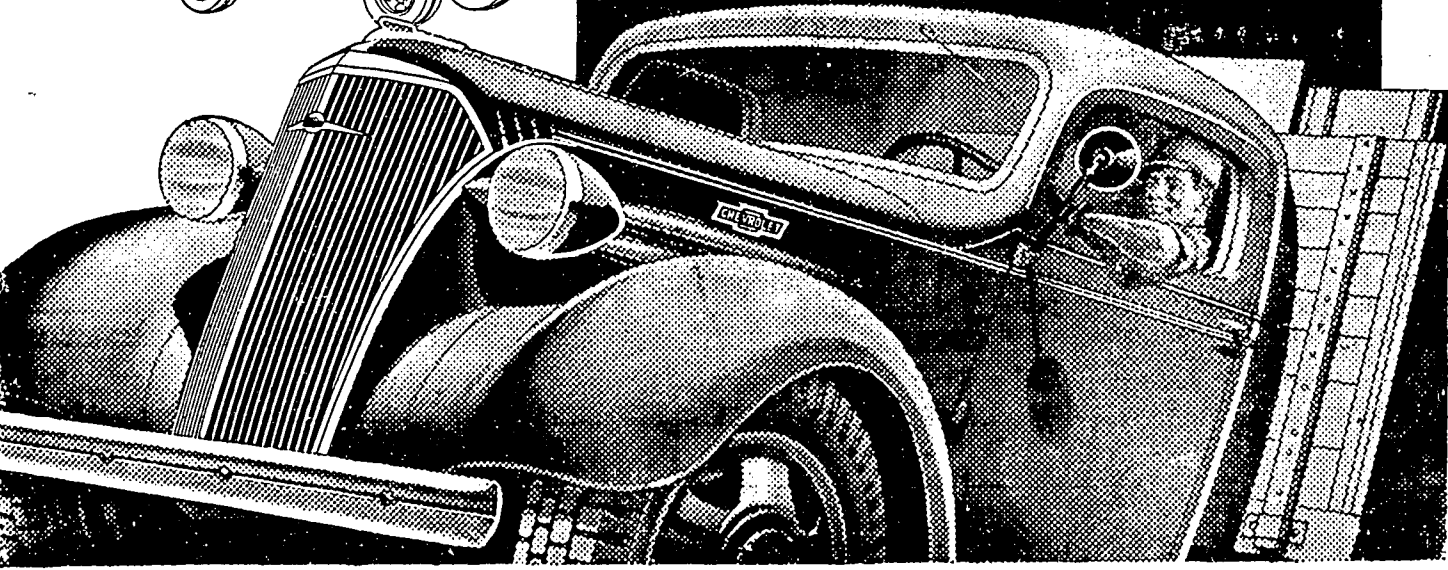

VILLAGE COMMISSIONERS UNEARTH OLD CHESTNUT

gerous, being the busiest in the village. It was noted that there had been a silnet policeman of old type at this corner a few years ago, but that it was being constantly knocked down by trucks with long loads of lumber, pipe, etc. Constable Bradley suggested that the village install a silent policeman of the "button" type, which only rises about a foot from the ground, and is equipped with reflectors on all sides. This suggestion was finally adopted by the Commissioners.

The Old "Cow" Question

Mr. McNeil, of the Avison Law Office, then read a draft of a by-law designed to prohibit the straying of cattle and other animals on the village streets. The by-law is an amendment to the Traffic By-Law, and calls for the prohibiting of cattle and other animals, ad infinitum, from the village streets unless under direct care of the owner or herder, or securely tethered or enclosed by fences. The minimum penalty for an infraction of this by-law is set at \$10 and the maximum at \$100. There was some difficulty in understanding the meaning of the by-law, but upon explanation it was given first and second readings.

The matter of a Milk By-law was brought up, but the draft of this had not been completed by the solicitors. Mr. McNeil explained, however, that

this by-law was being drawn up solely for the purposes of health and sanitation within the limits of the Municipality, and was not being designed to work a hardship on anyone. This by-law will give the Commissioners control over unsanitary stables and barns.

Grant to Library

Mr. Higgs then appealed, as president of the Library Association, for a grant from the Village, and spoke of the fine way in which the library is being built up. The Commissioners authorized a grant of \$50, to be paid in July. The meeting adjourned at 11:30 o'clock.
