THE HOUSEWIFE

CHERRY MACAROONS

1 cup fruit sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
3 egg whites
3/4 teaspoon salt
Mix and sift sugar, salt and cornstarch. Beat egg whites stiff. Gradually fold into them the first mixture. Cook in double boiler about 15 minutes until thick. Remove from heat and add

1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 cup chopped glazed cherries
1 1/2 cups shredded cocoanut
1 cup corn flakes
1 ring green candied pineapple
1 ring yellow candied pineapple
Sprinkle a pan with cornstarch, drop mixture by teaspoon and bake in slow oven 300 deg. F. about 20 minutes.

FRUIT DROPS

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 3/4 cups sifted cake or pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup thick sour milk
3/4 cup coarsely chopped pecan nuts
1/4 cup candied cherries quartered
3/4 cup chopped dates.
Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add well-beaten eggs, mix well. Sift all dry ingredients and add alternately with sour milk. Add nuts, cherries and dates with the last addition of flour. Drop from a teaspoon onto greased sheet and place a pecan nut on top of each. Bake from 15 to 20 minutes.

RHUBRB JAM

3 1/2 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit
4 cups (1 3/4 lbs.) sugar
1 box powdered fruit pectin
To prepare fruit, trim and slice fine (do not peel) about 2 pounds small red-stalked rhubarb. Add 1 cup sugar, mix, and let stand 15 minutes. This cup of sugar is in addition to the 4 cups specified above.

Measure 4 cups sugar into dry dish and set aside until needed. Measure prepared fruit into a 5 to 6 quart kettle, filling up last cup or fraction of cup with water if necessary; place over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, and continue stirring until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once pour in sugar, stirring constantly. (To reduce foaming, 1/4 teaspoon butter may be added). Continue stirring, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard one minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 7 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

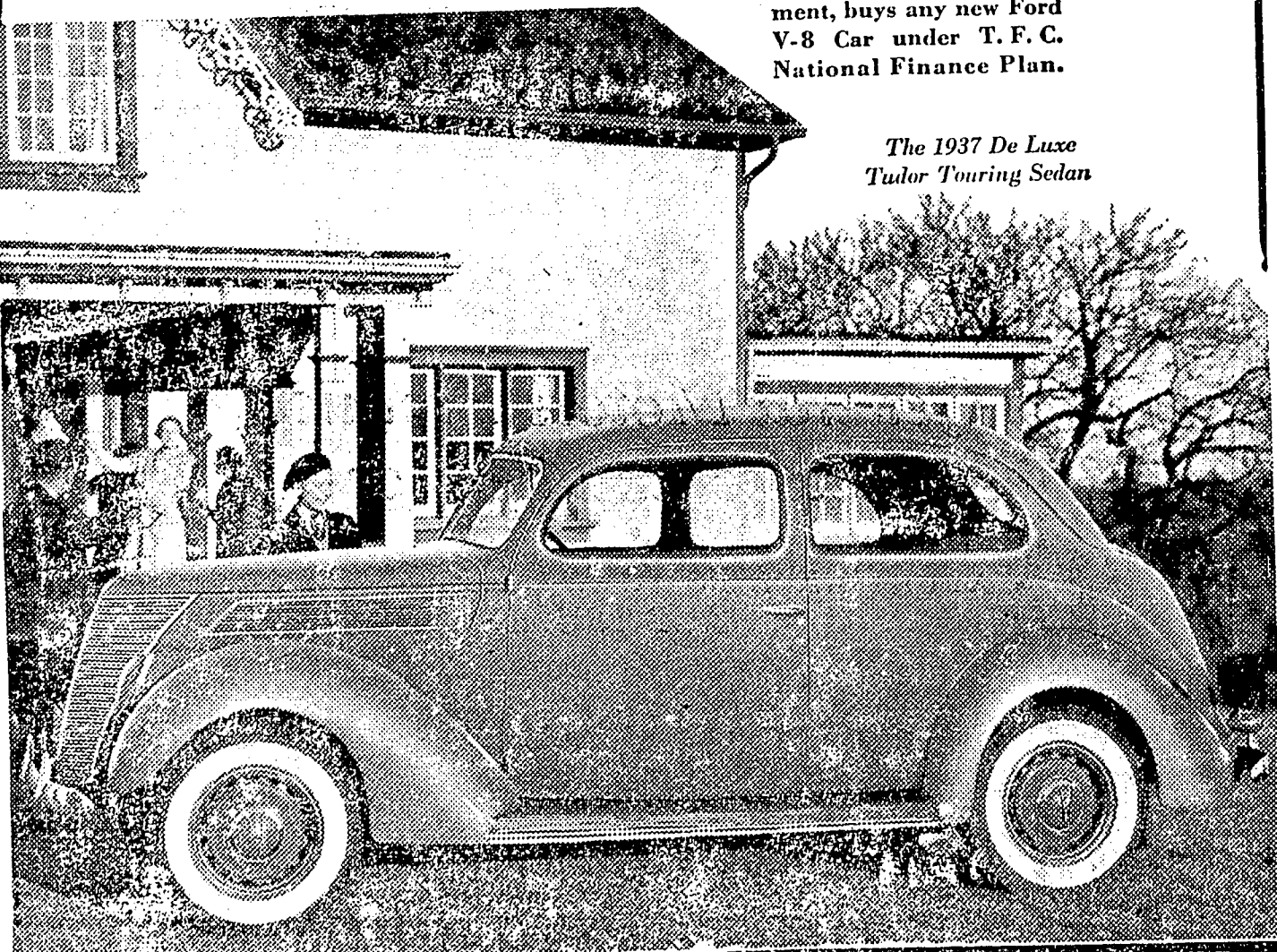

GROWERS ASSOCIATION FORMED

At a meeting of registered growers held at H. Moffat's, Alexandria, Saturday evening, April 3, for the purpose of deciding whether to nominate a candidate for delegate to the annual Board meeting of the B.C. Coast Vegetable Marketing Board, or to support a candidate from Pemberton. After some discussion it was decided that it would be to the best interest of the district to nominate our own candidate. W. A. Johnston, delegate for the past season, was again chosen.

Mr. J. M. Yorston then made a brief address and suggested that a Growers Association should be formed. This met with the approval of the meeting, and D. Melville made a motion to that effect which was seconded by A. Miles, the association to be known as the North Cariboo Growers Association.

Directors—D. Melville, Marguerite, P. Zschiedrich, Kersley; G. W. Armstrong, West Quesnel.

"BEES" IMPROVE SIX MILE HALL

By holding two "bees" during the past week the residents of the Bouchie Lake district have greatly improved the appearance and comfort of the Institute Hall at Six Mile corner. A \$4000 wallscotting has been run around the entire building, with building paper back of same, so there will be no more draughts. The upper part of the walls are covered with a nice white paper, the curtains dyed and re-hung, and "Tom" Norwood has promised to construct some really comfortable benches, with backs. No longer will a public speaker be forced to talk to profiles or the audience be compelled to sit all evening with a kink in their necks. It is possible a re-opening dance will be held shortly.

SLIDE ON FRONT STREET BEING REPAIRED

Public Works Department this week started a cribbing on Front Street, immediately in front of the Liquor Vendor's Store and the Overly's. This piece of road has been slipping into the river for years, in spite of frequent repairs, and the roadway has become so narrow that the street was dangerous for traffic. A cribbing was also placed at this spot some 20 years ago, but within a few years it also slid out. Public Works officials state that the present cribbing will not be permanent, but will last for a time. The road width will be increased eight feet. Cause of the sliding is given as slum under the roadway, which becomes saturated with water when the Fraser River rises, and upon the river dropping to a lower level the water runs off carrying some of the slum and allowing the roadway to drop and slide.

W. G. Gamble of Prince George, inspector of schools for this district, is on one of his regular inspection trips throughout the district.

Alex Moffat of the Northern Hardware & Furniture Co., Prince George, was a business visitor in town for a couple of days during the week.

The fire bell rang its alarm again on Friday evening about 8 o'clock when a small amount of vasoline exploded in Johnston Bros. Garage. The fire department was not needed, as the flames were extinguished almost immediately. C. V. Johnston received slight burns about the hands and face.

Members of the executive of the Quesnel Library Association have been canvassing during the week for donations to replace the library, which was completely destroyed by fire last Thursday morning. To date they report excellent support, and a list of donations will appear in our next issue.

G. E. Malcolm and Dave Grierson returned from Vancouver Monday making the trip via the United States and the Okanagan. On the entire trip, they stated, the best roads they encountered were from the 100-Mile House to Quesnel. They also noticed that the growth from the 100-Mile House to Quesnel was much more pronounced than in the southern part of the Province.
