the baking soda into the cup of liquid, mix well, then gradually add the flour; steam three hours.

LEMON FLUFF PIE

Crust: 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/4 cup cold water. Filling: 3 eggs, 3 tablespoons water, 1 lemon, 1 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Separate eggs. Beat yolks up with 1/2 cup sugar. Add water, grated rind and juice of lemon. Cook in double boiler until thick. Have egg-whites beaten dry; add salt and remaining 1/2 cup of sugar. Pour into this the cooked mixture, blending it well together. Fill baked pie shell. Bake in very slow oven, not more than 10 minutes. Brown lightly under broiler.

PINEAPPLE-RHUBARB MILK SHERBET

Cut up enough strawberry rhubarb to make 2 1/2 cups. Add 1 cup crushed pineapple to it, and cook until rhubarb is tender. Then add 1/2 cup sugar, and stir until dissolved, then press through a colander or coarse sieve. Chill thoroughly, then add gradually about 1 cup evaporated milk, stirring constantly. Freeze in the tray of refrigerator, stirring once or twice during the mushy stage.

WHITE CAKE

Three-quarters of a cup of butter, 1 1/2 cups white sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 2 1/2 cups pastry flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon almond extract, 6 egg whites.

Cream the butter thoroughly, add the sugar gradually, add milk alternately with the flour, add baking powder and salt to flour and sift three times. Then add flavoring and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in well greased cake pan in a moderate oven.

CHEESE SOUP

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
3 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon Worcester Sauce
2/3 cup grated cheese

Melt butter, blend in flour and seasonings. Add milk. Stir until thick. Add grated cheese and cook over hot water for 5 minutes. Chopped fresh spinach or cooked spinach formed into small balls may be added to the soup before serving.

EGGS A LA KING

4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
6 eggs, hard boiled
2 tablespoons pimento, chopped
2 tablespoons green pepper chopped
1 cup mushrooms, cooked
Seasonings

Melt butter. Blend in flour. Then add milk gradually. Stir until mixture thickens. Add eggs, cut in eighths, pimento, green pepper and

FRUIT CUSTARD

2 eggs or 4 egg yolks
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups scalded milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Fruit

Beat eggs slightly. Add sugar and salt. Gradually add scalded milk. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and coats spoon. Cool. Arrange fruit, sprinkled with sugar if desired, in bottom of serving dish. Pour cold custard sauce over fruit. Sectioned oranges, sliced bananas, cooked apples, canned pineapple, canned peaches, or a combination of fruits may be used. Garnish with whipped cream.

LARGE AUDIENCE ENJOYS ARGUMENTS OF DEBATERS

"Programme of Studies," Mr. McNeil showed that the aims of education are directed towards critical thinking, open-mindedness and freedom from prejudice, with knowledge and broad ideas as desirable outcomes. The literature studied is a collection of carefully selected experiences, chosen to inculcate to the student's mental, physical and social development, and to lead to the enrichment of his life, and the improvement of his character. "As the child grows older," stated Mr. McNeil, "one of the requirements of the school is that group discussions of problems of character be held, and in the most advanced grades, more thorough discussions of this nature are part of school life." Summing up his remarks, Mr. McNeil said that definite provision is made in the school for the training of character, and that knowledge is but one of several things taught.

In a two-minute rebuttal period, Mr. Thomson declared that AIMS, worthy though they may be, count for little. "We are concerned," he said, "with results, not AIMS!" He convulsed the audience by his suggestion that past results of the AIMS of experts in high places had not encouraged the public to place a great deal of confidence in them.

After the judges, Mrs. H. Fullerton, Mr. E. C. Lunn and Rev. Evan Fullerton had arrived at a decision, the verdict was announced by Rev. E. Fullerton, as being in favor of the negative. Remarking that a great deal of excellent material had been brought forward, and most ably presented, Mr. Fullerton said that the judges considered that the greatest number of points had been submitted by Mr. Freeman. They particularly liked, he said, Mr. Thomson's rebuttal, but felt that the negative had amassed too great a weight of evidence to be offset even by so vigorous a reply.
