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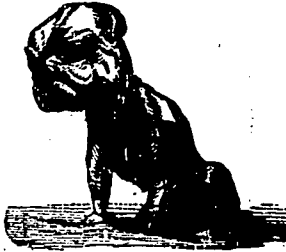

regarded to the laying of the main. This was discussed at length and finally boiled down to the fact that Mr. Grierson would install a two-inch main along the desired route provided the Commissioners would guarantee the company five users of water in that section. This was agreed to. The Commissioners will, according to previous agreement with the company, pay half the cost of three hydrants. Mr. Grierson will pay \$25 towards the cost of digging trench and laying pipe of each water user of St. Laurent Avenue, but wishing to tap that main. To actual users on the street, he will, according to previous agreement, bring the pipe to their property line without cost, and will only charge the customary connection fee of \$10.

The matter was finally settled amicably, after three years' litigation and jangling, and all present expressed their satisfaction.

The petition presented to the Commissioners was then read, and called for their resignation, as in the opinion of the signatories the action of said Commissioners with regard to \$600 tax against the Water Company showed discrimination. There were 48 signatures, which were read out to the meeting. Mr. Clarke then replied that he would not resign, as did Mr. Fraser. Mr. Brown offered to resign his position.

By-Law Amendment Rescinded
 The question of the amendment of the by-law was again brought up, and on motion, was rescinded.
 Mr. Fraser then commended the ratepayers on turning out when matters of interest to the community were at stake, and the meeting adjourned shortly after midnight.
