THE HOUSEWIFE

SALADS AND DESSERTS FOR HOT WEATHER

Salads and desserts which may be moulded or frozen in the refrigerator and which give a somewhat festive air to a simple meal are particularly welcome to the housewife in the hot summer months. It is not hard to prepare such dishes in the cool of the early morning, and it is a great relief to know that a tempting salad or dessert is ready to be served when the luncheon or supper hour arrives.

Cheese Salad

1 1/2 cups cream cheese or creamed cottage cheese
1 green pepper
1 cup crushed pineapples, drained
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup cream, whipped
Salt, paprika, celery salt to taste

Soften cheese with fork. Add green pepper, pineapple, nuts, mayonnaise, whipped cream and seasonings. Pour into freezing tray and let stand four hours. Slice and serve on crisp lettuce leaves. Garnish with watercress. Salad may be frozen in six parts of ice to one part of salad and allowed to stand four to six hours.

The salad may be moulded instead of frozen by using 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine soaked in two tablespoons of water, and dissolved over boiling water. Add with other ingredients to cheese.

Quilled Tomato Cheese Salad
1 tablespoon granulated gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups condensed tomato soup
1 cup cream or cottage cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon onion juice
1/2 cup stuffed olives, sliced, or 1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cream, whipped
Soak gelatine in cold water about five minutes. Heat soup over boiling water, add salt, cheese, onion juice (extracted by grating onion). Heat until cheese is softened. Add soaked gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill, and when partially set, add the mayonnaise, whipped cream and olives or celery. Turn into mould that has been rinsed in cold water and chilled. When firm remove to bed of lettuce, and serve with mayonnaise. Sprinkle with paprika. This salad may be frozen by following directions given for "Cheese Salad."

Fruit Rice
1 tablespoon granulated gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1 cup hot cooked rice
1/8 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons fruit sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup whipping cream
3/4 cup diced or crushed fruit
1/4 cup blanched almonds
Soak gelatine in cold water, dissolve in hot rice. Add salt, sugar and vanilla. Cool and chill. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in whipped cream, fruit and nuts. Pineapple, peaches, bananas, strawberries, marshmallows, cherries, or a combination of fruits may be used.

Mocha Marlow
20 marshmallows
1 cup hot coffee
1/2 cup toasted almonds (may be omitted)
1 cup whipping cream
Pinch of salt
Flavoring

Add marshmallows to hot coffee and stir until dissolved. Chill and allow partially to set. Whip cream and add marshmallow mixture. Add flavoring. Freeze as "Cheese Salad."

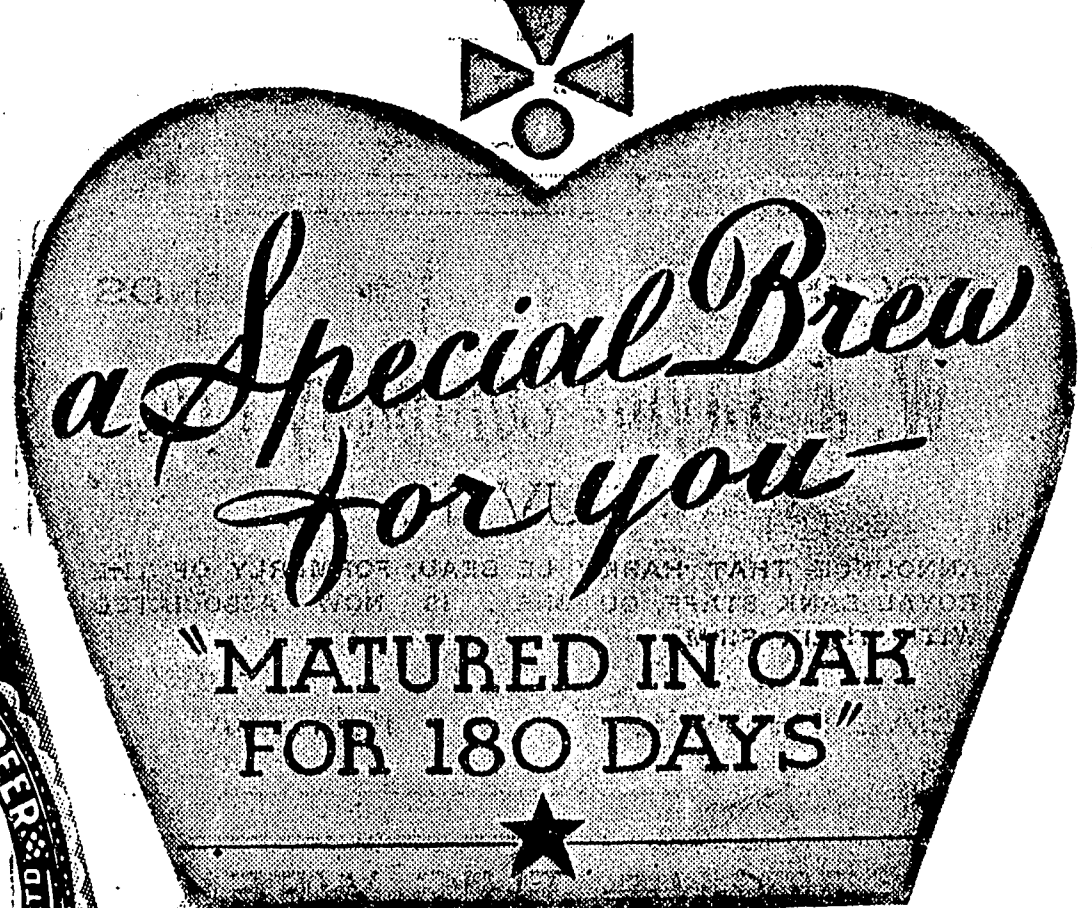

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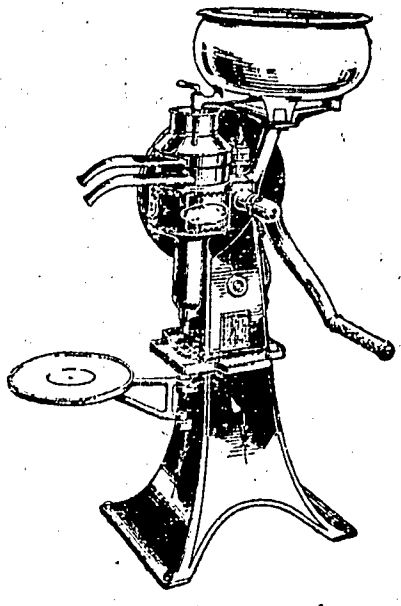

United States buyers were not interested in the Vancouver prices, and heifer prices were about equalling the States prices plus duty, and therefore no bargains. However, the steer market is different with very few moving and there is a strong demand for good type. It is believed that if they are moved only when they are fat the steer prices will be maintained, as latest prices are that Alberta steers in top condition will be very few and far between this year, so it is thought that a large number will go into feed lots and will not move to the markets during the grass cattle season. So unless something unforeseen happens late shippers may be on the right side of the fence this year.
