packet lime-flavored jelly powder, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon white vinegar, 2 tablespoons finely choppe- celery, 1/2 cup cold water.

Dissolve the jelly powder in the boiling water, and add the vinegar and the cold water. Set aside to cool. Flake the salmon, removing any bones. When the jelly is nearly set whip with a Dover beater, and fold in the salmon moulds, and chill. When ready to serve, unroll on to crisp lettuce leaves on salad plate. Serve with sliced tomatoes and mayonnaise dressing.

PEANUT BUTTER AND PRUNE SALAD

Large cooked prunes, slices of canned pineapple, peanut butter, crisp lettuce cream mayonnaise dressing.

Remove pits from prunes and fill the cavity with peanut butter. Place a slice of pineapple on crisp heart leaves of lettuce. Arrange three of the stuffed prunes on pineapple and garnish with a spoon of the mayonnaise.

CANDLESTICK SALAD

Six slices canned pineapple, 3 bananas, 6 maraschino cherries, 1 green pepper, 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Cut each banana in half crosswise and roll in lemon juice. (The lemon juice prevents discoloration of the bananas). Fit a banana half into the hole of each slice of pineapple and decorate the top with cherry to imitate the flame. Cut the pepper into thin strips and place a curved strip at the side of the banana to represent the handle of the candlestick. Arrange on shredded lettuce or water-cress on individual plates, and serve with Frenche dressing.

FRUIT DESSERTS

Fruits are particularly adaptable in making desserts for every day in the year, either as fresh when in season or as canned fruits. In most of the recipes given below other fruits may be substituted for those given

RASPBERRY TRIFLE

2 cups stale cake crumbs
2 cups raspberry juice
2 tablespoons cold water
1 cup raspberries
1 tablespoon gelatine

Soak gelatine in cold water. Heat berry juice and pour over. Arrange cake crumbs and berries in a serving dish. Pour hot jelly mixture over. Set aside to harden. Chill and serve with custard sauce. Serves six.

APRICOT FLUFF

1/2 cups fresh or canned apricots
1/2 cup apricot juice
3 tablespoons sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk

Press the apricots through a fruit press or coarse sieve. Into this fold the whites of the two eggs stiffly beaten. Chill thoroughly. Make a custard sauce using fruit juice, milk, sugar, and the two egg yolks. Chill and serve with the apricot mixture.

PEACH TAPIOCA

1 cup tapioca
1 cup juice from fresh or canned peaches
3 cups water
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup sliced fresh or canned peaches

Soak tapioca in the water overnight. Add peach juice and cook in a double boiler until clear—about one hour. Add peaches and turn into a cold wet mould. Chill, turn out, serve with cream or custard. Serves six.

RASPBERRY JAM

While raspberries are in season, the following recipe for making

raspberry jam may prove useful. Put the berries over the fire in a kettle adding no water, but gently until the juice is drawn out of the fruit, then bring this to a boil, and keep boiling for three or four minutes. Measure the fruit at this stage for the quantity of sugar necessary. Three cups of sugar will be required for four cups of the boiled fruit. Add the sugar to the fruit, stirring until all the sugar is dissolved. Boil gently for twenty minutes, stirring occasionally to keep from burning. Remove from the fire and pour into hot sterilized jars.
