NOURISHING SUMMER SALADS

Golden Glow Salad: 1 package lemon jelly powder, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 cup grated raw carrot, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup cucumber, diced and drained, 1/2 teaspoon minced onion.
Dissolve jelly in boiling water. Add vinegar and salt. Chill. When slightly

thickened, add vegetables. Turn into molds. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. (Serves 6).

TOMATO AND EGG MOLD SALAD:

Six eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-3 teaspoon pepper, 2-3 cup mayonnaise, 3 large tomatoes, lettuce.
Hard-cook the eggs, cool slightly and while still warm shell them and force them through a potato ricer or sieve. Add salt and pepper and pack the ricied eggs firmly into 2 glasses. When ready to serve salad, remove eggs from glasses by running a knife round the edge. It will then be possi-

ble to cut the eggs in slices. Peel tomatoes, cut in thick slices, lay a slice of egg on top, place on lettuce leaves, pour over all a tablespoonful of salad dressing and serve. (Serves 6).

QUICK CABBAGE SALAD

One quart of cabbage finely shredded, 1/2 cup of green pepper minced, 1/4 cup of sweet pickles diced, 1 table-spoon sugar, 2 tablespoons of pre-pared mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 1/4 cup of cream (sour or sweet); black pepper.
Mix the cabbage with green pepper and pickles. Combine the sugar, salt, vinegar, cream, mustard and pepper and pour over the cabbage. Blend well and serve at once. (Serves 6).

COCOANUT MACAROONS

One-half cup white sugar, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 tea-spoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 cups desiccated cocoanut, 1/2 cup of seedless raisins. Beat eggs, add sugar and butter, beat, then add other ingredients and mix well. Drop by tea-spoonfuls on a buttered and floured pan and bake in a moderate oven, till browned, 15 minutes.

JOHNNY CAKE

Three cups cornmeal, 1 cup flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 cup shorten-ing, 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in a little boiling water, buttermilk or sour milk to make a rather stiff dough, salt to taste. Pour into a well-greased pan and cook in fairly hot oven.

CUCUMBER JELLY (Salad)

Soak cucumber in water for 24 hours, then peel and put through chopper; 1/2 cup cucumber, 1/2 cup pineapple, 2-3 cup pineapple juice. Soak 2 tablespoons gelatin in 1/4 cup water. Dissolve in 1/4 boiling water and add 1/4 cup sugar and 1/4 cup vinegar, then pineapple juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, pinch salt. Add cucumber and pineapple and let stand to jell. Serve on lettuce leaf with mayonnaise.

SCONES

Three heaping teaspoons of baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, pinch salt, all sifted with 3 cups flour, 1/2 cup white sugar. Break 1 egg into a cup and fill up with sweet milk. Mix and drop on buttered tin by spoonful.

DATE PUDDING

Two eggs, beaten separately; 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon of butter, 1 teaspoon of baking powder, 2 tablespoons of flour, 1 cup of chopped walnuts and 1 cup of dates.
Bake 45 minutes, and when cool serve with whipped cream.

This can be made several days before needed. I may also add that it will not be as solid as cake.

MAPLE CREAM ICING

Mix 1 cup brown sugar, 3 table-spoons milk, 1 tablespoon butter. Let these come to a boil—no more. Take from stove and put in enough icing sugar to make it right for spreading. Flavor. This will not harden.

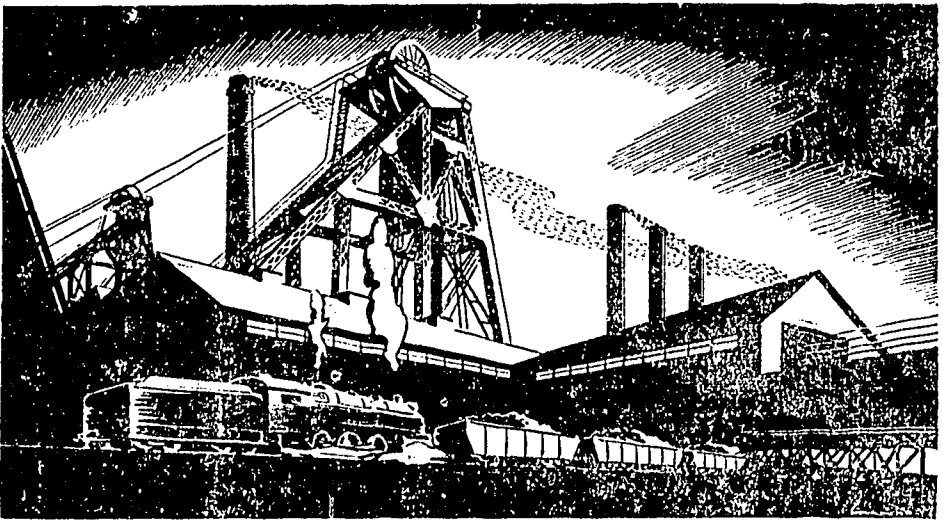

COUPLE MUSH FROM B.C. TO MARITIMES

MONTREAL.—Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Carroll weren't fooling when they set out by dog team from their Ootsa, B.C., home March 9, 1936, to advertise British Columbia's Tweedsmuir National Park.

The Carrolls were in Montreal at the 5500-mile mark in a projected coast-to-coast trip from Ootsa. From here they plan to go east to the Maritimes.

When they left home the Carrolls travelled 500 miles to Quesnel over a heavy carpet of snow. Then wheels replaced runners on their heavily-laden sled and the journey eastward continued.

On the first halt of the journey the dog-sledding Carrolls went into the United States, but the homeward trip will be made in Canada entirely. The Carrolls have had their difficulties since they left home. In Chicago Mrs. Carroll was stricken with influenza during an epidemic there and the trip was delayed a month. At Lake Champlain, N.Y., one of their dogs died of heat.

They went to New York from Chicago and came to Montreal from the United States metropolis via Albany, Saratoga Springs and Rouses Point.

On his return home Mr. Carroll plans to put his experiences into book form. He has already to his credit "The Ditties of a Dog Musher."
