THE HOUSEWIFE

CHEESE SOUFFLE

Two tablespoons butter, 2 table-
spoons flour, 3/4 cup hot milk, 1/2 tea-
spoon salt, Cayenne, 1/2 pound Cana-
dian cheese, 4 eggs. Make a smooth
sauce from the butter, flour and hot
milk and add the seasonings. Remove
from the heat and add the cheese
cut into small pieces. Stir until

cheese is melted, then add the yolks
of the eggs beaten until light. Cool
and fold in the stiffly beaten whites
of the eggs and turn the soufflé into
a buttered baking dish. Bake in a
moderate oven about 50 minutes.
Serve the minute you remove from
the oven. Set the casserole on a large
serving plate or platter and arrange
the cooked vegetables around the
dish.

MEDALLION SUGAR COOKIES

Sift three and two-thirds cups of
cake flour with 2 1/2 teaspoons of
double-acting baking powder and 1/2

teaspoon salt. Cream 2-3 cup of but-
ter or other shortening and add 1 1/2
cups of sugar gradually, creaming
well. Add 2 unbeaten eggs, one at a
time, beating into the mixture well.
Add 1 teaspoon of vanilla and 4 tea-
spoons of milk alternately with the
flour mixture. Chill. Roll about 1-8
of an inch thick, cut with cookie
cutter and sprinkle with white or
colored dsugar. Bake on a greased
baking sheet in a hot oven for nine
minutes, or until done. Makes ten
dozen cookies.

BLUEBERRY CRUMBLE

One and a half cups stewed sweet-
ened blueberries, drained. 1/4 cup
blueberry juice. 1 1/2 cup butter, 3/4
cup flour, 1/2 cup granulated sugar,
1/2 teaspoon salt. Either fresh or
canned blueberries may be used.
Place blueberries and juice in the
bottom of a greased baking dish.
Blend butter, flour, sugar and salt
together. When thoroughly mixed,
sprinkle over blueberries. Bake in
moderate oven for 40 minutes. Serve
with or without cream, as desired.
This makes 6 portions.

BLUEBERRY BRAN MUFFINS

Mix and sift 2 3/4 cups white flour,
5 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup
brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, then
mix in 1 1/4 cups bran. Add 1 3/4 cups
milk, 1-3 cup melted shortening
(more if desired), 2 well-beaten eggs.
Beat thoroughly, then add 2 cups
blueberries which have been dredged
with flour. Place in greased muffin
pans, and bake in a moderate oven
about 25 minutes.

BLUEBERRY ROLL

One cup blueberries, 1/2 cup pow-
dered sugar, 2 teaspoons gelatine, 2
tablespoons cold water, 4 eggs, 1 cup
cake flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking
powder, 1 cup granulated sugar, pinch
salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup whip-
ping cream.
Wash blueberries and drain thor-
oughly. Add 2 tablespoons of the
powdered sugar and crush together.
Sprinkle gelatine on cold water and
allow to stand until softened. Heat
berries and sugar together; then add
gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Re-
move from the heat and cool. Separ-
ate eggs. Beat 2 egg-whites until
stiff, but not dry, then fold into
berry mixture.

Sift, together, flour, baking powder,
granulated sugar and salt. Beat re-
maining eggs and yolks together
thoroughly and combine with dry in-
gredients. Flavor with vanilla. Line
a long, narrow pan with wax paper.
Pour the batter about 1/4-inch deep.
Bake in a slow oven about 30 min-
utes. When done, turn out on a cloth
well dusted with remaining powdered
sugar. Remove hard edges, spread
with filling, and roll carefully. This
must be done as soon as the roll is
removed from the oven for best re-
sults. Serve in slices with whipped
cream. This makes 6-8 portions.

BLUEBERRY UPSIDEDOWN CAKE

Make a plain cake batter, with 1/4
cup shortening, 1 beaten egg, 2 table-
spoons sugar, 7/8 cup pastry flour,
sifted with 1 teaspoon baking powder
and 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup milk
and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Cook to-
gether for 5 minutes 1 1/2 cups clean
blueberries, 3/4 cup sugar and 3/4 cup
water. Place cooked berries in a
greased baking dish, cover in a mod-
erate about 1/2 hour. Serve with
lemon sauce.
