CHEESE MEALS

The following recipes are taken from the bulletin published by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, "Cheese for Better Meals" by Laura C. Pepper, Dairy and Cold Storage Branch. The bulletin may be

obtained on request free of charge from the Publicity and Extension Branch.

Cheese Soup

- 4 cups milk
- 2 or 3 slices onion
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 3/4 cup grated cheese
- Yolks of 2 eggs

Scald milk with onion. Remove

onion. Melt butter in top part of a double boiler. Blend in flour. Add the hot milk and seasonings and stir constantly until mixture thickens. Cook five minutes. Add beaten egg yolks. Cook one minute and add the grated cheese. Beat with egg beater and serve at once. Egg yolks may be omitted but they make a richer and more delicious soup.

Salmon Souffle

Half cup milk; half cup soft bread crumbs; 1 1-pound can salmon; 4 eggs, separated. Scald the milk and pour it over the crumbs. Let stand for a few minutes and combine with the salmon that has been flaked and freed from skin and bones. Add the beaten egg yolks and season to taste, then fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pour into a buttered casserole and bake in a moderate oven about 45 minutes. Serve immediately. Enough for six servings.

Vegetable Bouillon

Two tablespoons butter; 1 small onion; 1 carrot; 1 leek; 1 turnip; quarter pound spinach (chopped); 1 small tomato; half stalk celery; 1 sprig thyme; 1 quart water; salt and pepper to taste.

Melt butter in saucepan; add the onion, sliced, and simmer 5 minutes. Add the remaining vegetables; pour in the water and season to taste. Simmer gently 1 1/2 hours in a covered saucepan. Strain, mashing the vegetables through a sieve back into the soup. Serve hot.

Ham With Peaches

Two-and-a-half-inch thick slices mild cured ham, 8 large peach halves, 1/2 teaspoon dry custard, 1-8 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-8 teaspoon powdered cloves, syrup from the peaches.

Trim some of the fat from the ham and put in a hot skillet for a few minutes to render. Remove the pieces and brown the ham slices quickly on both sides; then decrease the heat and cook until tender. Remove the ham to a hot platter, then put in the peach halves and brown lightly in the ham drippings. Arrange, hollow side up, around the ham. While the ham and peaches are cooking, put the peach syrup and spices in a small saucepan and cook rapidly until the syrup is reduced to a thick sauce. Pour this over the peaches, filling the hollows.

Breaded veal cutlet or roast veal is delicious with hot glazed apricots—either fresh or canned may be used—or with pineapple fritters.

One pound minced steak or Hamburg, 1 small onion, some old bread soaked, a little butter and a teaspoonful of thyme; salt, pepper to taste. Soak bread and mash with fork or potato-masher; use milk or water; do not have too wet. Add other ingredients; always mix a little with the meat. Then put a layer of meat in bottom of small round dish, then a thick layer of stuffing and another layer of meat. Steam two hours or more. Nice hot; nice cold sliced for lunch. Delicious in sandwiches. Steaming saves putting the oven on.

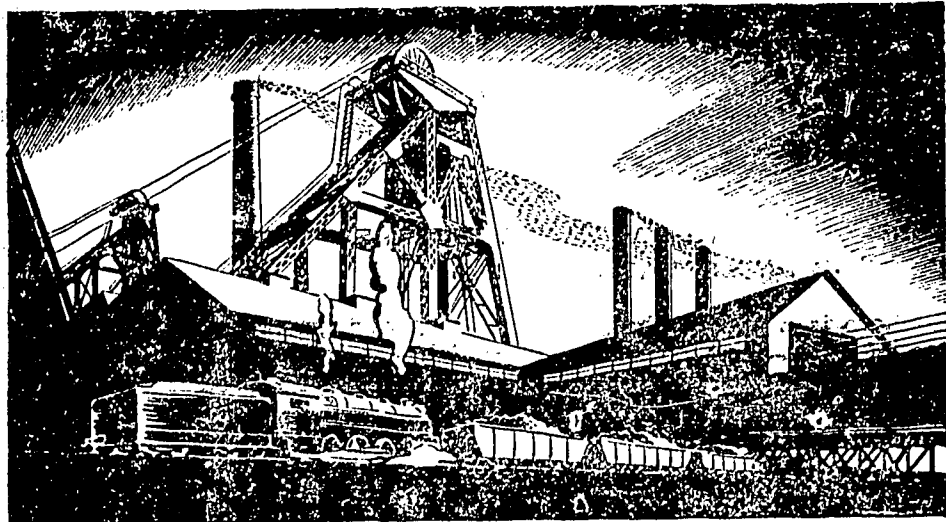

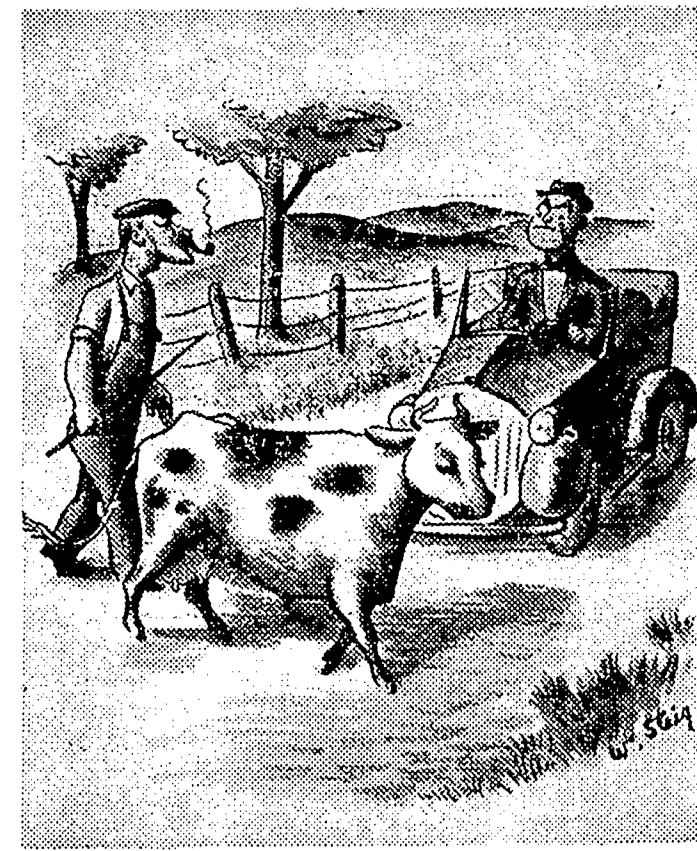
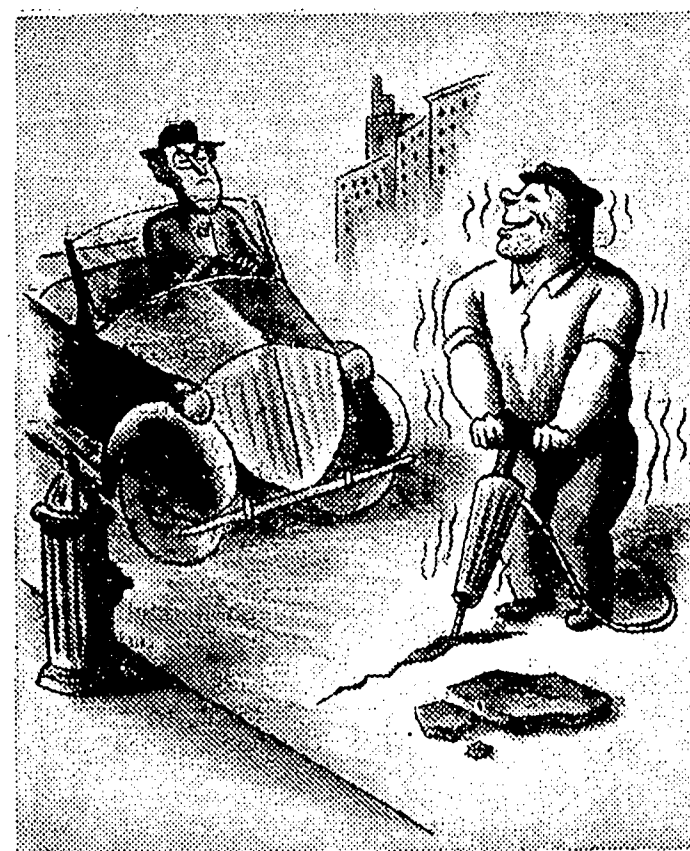
