pepper. Remove skin and bones from
almon, and flake meat until fine.
Add other ingredients and mix well.

Hard cook eggs with grated onion
and mayonnaise. Thinly sliced Cana-
dian cheese. Thinly sliced cold meats
with a dash of mustard, or thinly
sliced meat loaf. Cream cheese with
peanut butter; cream cheese and
chopped dill pickles; cream cheese
with chopped olives; peanut butter
with orange juice, orange rind and

salt—one glass peanut butter, juice
and rind of one-half orange, salt to
taste; cream cheese and orange mar-
malade.

CHICKEN SANDWICH FILLING

Two and one-half pounds of cooked
chicken meat, finely chopped, two
tablespoons chopped parsley, 1/2 tea-
spoons salt, 1 teaspoon cayenne pep-
per, 1 cup mayonnaise, 2 heads let-
tuce. Mince chicken very fine, add
salt, cayenne pepper, parsley and
mayonnaise. Shred lettuce very fine
and fold into mixture. This will make
fifty generous sandwiches.

Plain ham, with horseradish, mus-
tard or chopped parsley added to the
creamed butter before spreading.

SARDINE ROLL

Trim crusts from loaf of bread.
Cut in full lengthwise slices. Mince
and mix Norwegian sardines with
green peppers, pimentos and mayon-
naise. Spread slices, roll. Cut slices
crosswise, garnish with lettuce, and
serve.

GRAHAM-CRACKER SANDWICHES

Graham crackers may be used for
making many crunchy sandwiches.
One cup of peanut brittle crushed to
a powder with a rolling pin and added
to 1/2 cup of whipped cream will sup-
ply filling for a dozen graham-crack-
er sandwiches.

Three tablespoons of currant jelly,
chopped pecans, and a small package
cream cheese, mixed together, also
make a delectable filling. Bits of
banana and chopped walnut may be
used in a cream cheese filling.

For those who are fond of the
malted-milk flavor, a sandwich filling
of 2 tablespoons of chocolate malted-
milk powder and 1 teaspoon of vanilla
added to a cream cheese filling is
delicious.

LEMON PUDDING

Juice of 1 lemon and the grated
rind of 1/2 lemon, 1 cup sugar, yolks
of 2 eggs (beaten well) 1 teaspoon of
melted butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1
cup sweet milk.

Method: Mix together in following
order: Sugar, juice and rind of lemon,
egg-yolks, butter, flour, milk, and,
lastly, fold in beaten whites of eggs.
Pour into buttered pudding-dish, set
dish in larger pan of water and bake
40 minutes.

RHUBARB BAKED WITH RAISINS

For a pound of rhubarb take half
a cup of raisins and a cup of sugar.
Use seedless, sultana or large plump
table raisins. Remove the seeds from
the latter if objectionable. Cover the
raisins with boiling water and let
cook until the pulp is tender and the
water is evaporated to 2 or 3 spoon-
fuls. Sprinkle the rhubarb, raisins
and sugar in a baking dish in layers
and let cook in the oven or on top
of the range until the rhubarb is
tender, but not broken. For a change,
use prunes instead of raisins.

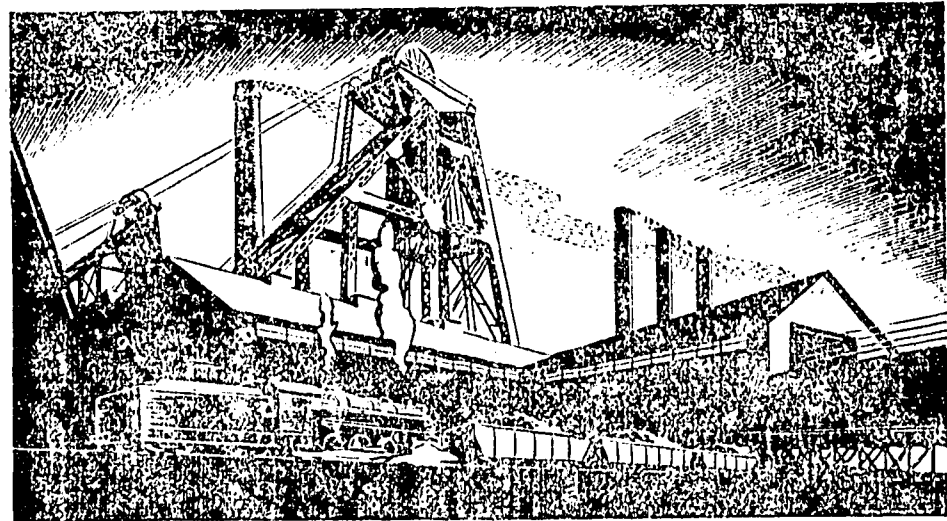

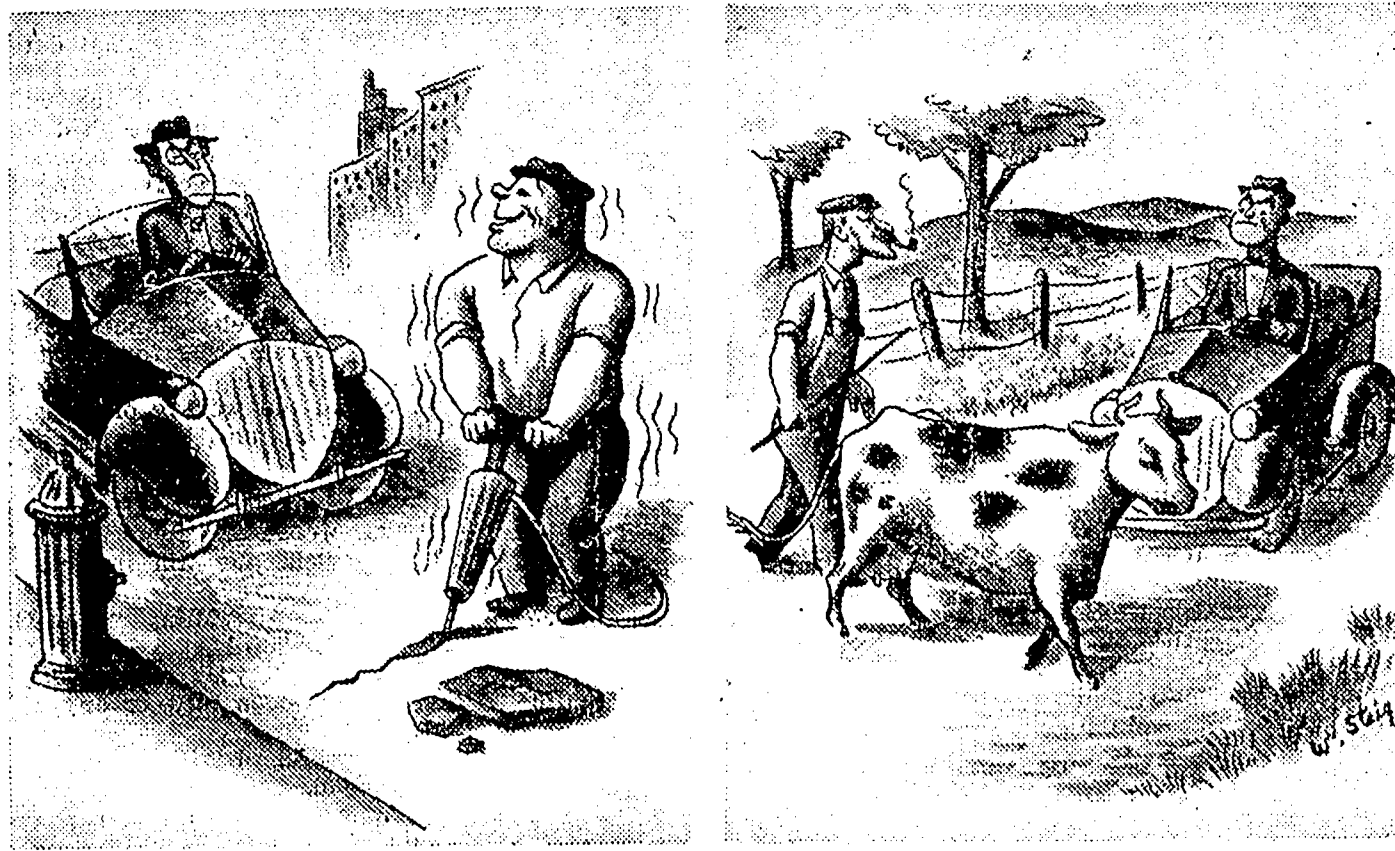

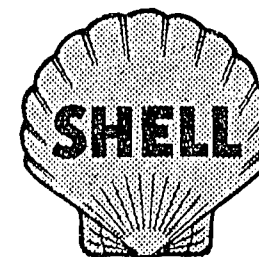
