cream, cool partially and add to the
egg mixture while beating well. Cook
in a double boiler stirring until very
smooth and thickened. With whole
eggs cook slowly to prevent curdling.
Pour into a bowl and whip until al-
most cold. Keep chilled until ready
for use. Add flavoring and other in-
gredients and freeze.

Plum Catsup

Five pounds plums (red ones are
best); 3 pounds granulated sugar; 1
pint vinegar; 1 teaspoon each black
pepper, cloves and cinnamon.

Boil plums in half cup of water;
put all through collander to remove
skins and stones. Add other ingredi-
ents and boil slowly until thick en-
ough. Stir often to prevent burn-
ing.

Patted Butter Cookies

Three-eighths pound butter; 1 egg;
yolk; five-eighths cup sugar; about
1 1/2 cups sifted flour; few grains of
salt; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter; add sifted sugar
slowly; then the unbeaten egg yolk.
Beat thoroughly and add gradually
the flour; salt; vanilla. Chill. Take
up 1/2 teaspoon dough; roll into ball,
then flatten out. Place on a greased
baking sheet; sprinkle with a mix-
ture of cinnamon and sugar—1/2 tea-
spoon cinnamon to 4 tablespoons su-
gar—place a blanched almond in the
centre of each cookie and bake in a
moderate oven until a delicate brown.

Sugar Cookies

Two cups sugar; 1 cup butter; 1
cup sour cream; 1 teaspoon soda; 1
teaspoon baking powder; 1 egg;
flour to make soft dough; nutmeg.

Cream together sugar and butter;
then add sour cream in which soda
has been dissolved. Add well beaten
egg. Sift baking powder and grated
nutmeg with flour and fold into the
mixture. Add enough more flour to
make a dough as soft as can be
handled. Roll thin; cut into fancy
shapes and bake.

Bangor Brownies

One-quarter cup melted shorten-
ing; 1 cup molasses; 1 egg; 2 squares
melted bitter chocolate; 1 cup flour;
1 teaspoon baking powder; few grains
salt; 1 cup nuts.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt
together. Mix the ingredients in the
order given and beat thoroughly.
Sprad the mixture evenly on a cake
pan that has been lined with oiled
paper. Bake about 15 minutes in a
slow oven. Remove the paper from
cake as soon as it is taken from the
oven and cut into small squares or
strips with a sharp knife.
