THE HOUSEWIFE

Ham and Chicken Souffle
 Four tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon chopped onion; 1 cup milk; 1 cup chicken stock; 1/2 cup ground cooked ham; 1/2 cup finely cut cooked chicken; 2 tablespoons chopped parsley; 3 egg yolks beaten; 3 egg whites stiffly beaten.

Combine tapioca, salt, onion, milk and chicken stock in top of a double boiler. Cook over boiling water from 5 to 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from boiling water, combine with beaten egg yolks, and then add the finely cut chicken, ham and chopped parsley. Fold in beaten egg whites and turn into a well greased casserole. Bake in a moderate oven from 35 to 40 minutes. This is a good way to use any left over meat.

Scalloped Rice and Cheese
 Three tablespoons butter; 3 tablespoons flour; 1 tablespoon salt; 1 1/2 cups milk; 1 cup cheese (grated); 3 cups cooked rice; 1/4 cup buttered crumbs.

Melt butter; add flour; stir until well blended. Then pour on gradually the milk; bring to boiling point; add salt and grated cheese. Mix rice with this cheese sauce; pour into buttered casserole; cover with the buttered crumbs and bake in a slow oven for about 30 minutes, or until a delicate brown.

Boiled Dinner
 Boil a piece of corned beef or cured ham or pork shoulder. About 3/4

Jellied Veal
 One knuckle veal; 1/4 teaspoon of pepper; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon paprika.

Cover veal with cold water, bring to boiling point and simmer until the meat drops from the bone, or about 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Season at the end of the first hour. When done remove the meat and strain the stock. Return the stock to fire and boil until it is reduced to 2 cups. Add the meat, very finely shredded. Pour into loaf pan and chill. Serve in thin slices.

Cream Rice Pudding
 Half cup rice; 3 cups boiling water; 1 teaspoon salt; 3/4 cup sweetened condensed milk; 1/2 cup raisins; 2 eggs (optional).

Wash rice thoroughly and place in top double boiler with water and salt. Cover and cook over boiling water about 40 minutes or until rice is tender. Add sweetened condensed milk and raisins. Continue cooking 10 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

Note:—If eggs are used beat well and add with sweetened condensed milk and raisins.

Coffee Custard
 Two cups milk; 2 to 4 tablespoons of ground coffee; 3 eggs; 1/4 cup sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1-3 teaspoon vanilla.

Scald milk with coffee and strain. Beat eggs slightly; add sugar, salt and vanilla; slowly stir in coffee-flavored milk. Strain into individual moulds. Set in pan of hot water.

Rhubarb Puffs
 One cup flour, one level teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, two tablespoons melted fat, one egg beaten, rhubarb sauce.

Combine all the ingredients except the rhubarb in the order given and beat the mixture until it is smooth. Grease individual moulds or cups and into each put three tablespoons of rhubarb sauce and then one tablespoon of butter. Steam the puffs for twenty minutes and serve them warm with cream and sugar.

LONDON, Eng.—New hopes for world peace are spreading among democratic nations because leaders have called a conference to enforce respect in the Far East for the Washington Nine-Power Treaty and the Pact of Paris. Seventeen nations have been invited to assist in ending the war in China and all Europe, with the exception of the Dictatorship countries, welcomes the move as proof that the democratic countries can once again cope with international banditry.

TOKIO—Japanese statesmen held an emergency session when they heard the news from Washington that the United States had condemned the Japanese invasion of China as a violation of her treaty obligations. It was made clear that Japan would boycott and international conference in connection with hostilities in China, and here is more than a possibility that Japan will denounce the Nine-Power Treaty under which such a conference is being arranged. The Japanese foreign office, Domei said, felt certain that the Washington powers would meet in answer to a call from the League of Nations, "in the event of such convocation Japan will not participate." No matter what decision such a conference may take. According to Japanese foreign office officials, whether moral pressure, concrete measures or material sanctions against Japan, the Empire's fundamental policy will remain unchanged.
